SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Canada's Financial Standing.

OTTAWA, July 5. The net debt of Canada on July 1st was \$233,500,000, showing a decrease of \$900,000 during the past month. The revised revenue statement to June 30th shows a surplus for the last fiscal year of \$5,700,000. It is probable that after subsidy and interest payments are completed, the net surplus will amount to one and a half million. In view of the large additions to the free list and the reduction canal tolls, this showing will reflect great credit on Hon. Mr. Foster's financial management.

The Wimbledon Team.

LONDON, July 5. The Wimbledon team is securing excellent practice at Cambridge. This being vacation the customary match with the University team is impossible, but a contest was held yesterday with the third Cambridge battalion in which the Canadian total was 906, being 90 3-10 per man. The Cambridge score was 805. Sergt. Mitchell scored 97 and Capt. Rogers 98. Col. Bayon writes in the hope that this presages a good future for Wimbledon, where the team arrived on Saturday.

Stabbing Affray.

QUEBEC, July 5. Fred Letourneau, bar-keeper of Lachine d'Or, opposite the post office, was stabbed almost to death last night. Six fellows started a row in the place, and wounds were inflicted by one of the party with a knife, a reward for Letourneau's trying to pacify them. The police have made arrests, but whether they have the right party is uncertain.

Suit Against a Railway.

HALIFAX, July 5. A writ has been issued against the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, claiming \$20,000 damages for the death of Dr. Benjamin Fraser at Windsor, on July 4th, 1888, who was run over by a train. The action is brought by the executors for the benefit of the heirs of the deceased and the children and heirs of Benj. D. Fraser.

To Investigate the Seizure.

EASTPORT, Me., July 5. Special Treasury Agent F. Aubrey Byrne arrived June 30 to investigate the seizure of the schooner Edna May, made June 29, and after a thorough investigation left yesterday. The vessel will be dismantled and libelled. This case is expected to lead to the exposure of extensive smuggling.

No Hopes of Recovery.

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 6. Deep gloom fell upon the immediate circles of Mayor Barker's friends last night when it became known that he had had a sudden relapse and that his condition was critical in the extreme. At 3:30 this morning his Will was pronounced to be without hope of his recovery.

The Decision Given.

MONTREAL, July 5. The Harbor Commission gave their decision to-day in the case of the late disastrous collision between the Cynthia and Polynesian, in which both pilots, over whom alone the Commission have jurisdiction, are reinstated and exonerated from all blame in the unfortunate matter.

Fire in Halifax.

HALIFAX, July 5. Geo. Forsythe & Co.'s wholesale grocery warehouse was badly damaged by fire and water this morning. The loss on stock is \$6,000, covered by insurance in the Phoenix and Brooklyn. The building is insured in the Halifax for \$4,500.

The Behring Sea Trouble.

LONDON, July 5. The Daily News says communications between the English and American Governments have resulted in an understanding which will avert any collision in Behring Sea during the seal fishing this season.

The Rate of Interest.

OTTAWA, July 5. After the 1st October next, the rate of interest allowed in the post office and Government saving banks will be 3 1/2 per cent., a reduction of a half per cent., as compared with the existing value.

Drowned in Picton Harbor.

PICTON, July 5. William McQuarrie, son of Rev. Allan N. McQuarrie, formerly of Kingston, Ont., was drowned in the harbor last night while out with an excursion party of local artillerymen.
