

5th Signals Rifle Team Win Final Match Of Maritime Indoor Shoot

The 5th Signals Regiment rifle team of Charlottetown won the final shoot of the Royal Canadian Signals Maritime Rifle League fired at Moncton, N. B. on Saturday, but placed second to Eastern Command Signals "A" of Halifax in team aggregate scoring for the year.

The match was held over the indoor range of the 4th Independent Signals Squadron at Moncton, with the Charlottetown Signals team winning the match with a total of 480 points against 473 for Eastern Command Signals, the latter winning the League Championship for the year with an aggregate score of 3,788, just 26 points better than the local team.

Other teams competing in the League were Eastern Command Signals Regiment, team "B", Halifax, Eastern Command Signals Regiment, East Coast Signals Regiment, and "A" and "B" teams of No. 4 Independent Signals Squadron of Moncton.

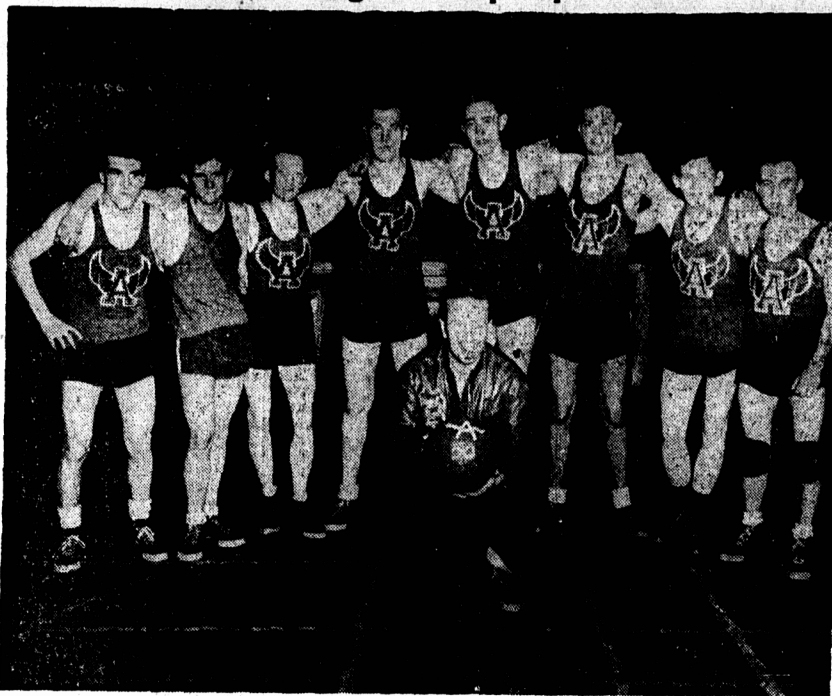

New York Yankees Cut Five Men From Roster Including Johnny Mize

NEW YORK, May 15 (AP)—The champion New York Yankees today cut five players loose - two of them by outright sale - and they still haven't landed that additional starting pitcher Manager Casey Stengel has been yelping for.

It begins to appear, in fact, that the other clubs in the American League have no intention of bolstering the Bombers' hill staff. Now the champs are down to size - inside the 25-player limit which must be met by Wednesday night - and they have little left to offer in swap other than George Stirnweiss, a somewhat patchy infielder, and a spare catcher or two.

Three excess Yanks-headed by big Johnny Mize, long the terror of National League pitchers - were shipped to the club's Kansas City farm team in the American Association on a 24-hour recall basis. Duane Pillette, a 26-year-old pitcher, and Al (Billy) Martin, a 22-year-old infielder, headed for future greatness with the minor affiliate.

John Lindell, the big outfielder, left the bombers for good - waived out of the American League and sold to St. Louis Cards at the waiver price of \$10,000. Failure to hit this spring cost John his last chance with the Yanks, who are well loaded with outfielders.

Clarence (Cuddies) Marshall, right-handed pitcher, was sold to St. Louis Browns for an unannounced sum. He, along with Lindell, Stirnweiss and catchers Ralph Houk, have been offered to other American League clubs - especially Washington - all spring in exchange for a proven pitcher.

As Mize, now 37, has been in the majors over 10 years he had to give his consent to the Kansas City deal. He could have insisted on his outright release, allowing him to deal with another big-league team.

Under this arrangement, however, Jawn can continue to draw his Yankee salary, believed to be close to \$25,000 a year, and perhaps return to the big team before the season is out if he can work a kink out of his throwing arm.

Musial Tops National League Sluggers With Powerful .461 Average

Dimaggio Takes Over Two American League Batting Departments

CHICAGO, May 15 (AP)—Boston's Donnie Dimaggio has taken over two American League batting specialties in the young 1950 season.

The Red Sox outfielder has collected most hits, 36, and the most runs, 26, in the 24 games in which he has played. In addition, his .371 batting average through games of Sunday was good for a tie for fourth place with Paul Lehner of Philadelphia.

Dimaggio has played in more games this season than any of the other American League leaders. His team-mate, Walt Drape, has a .400 average after 14 games and stands atop the leaders' list.

Larry Doby of Cleveland is in second place, only four points behind with .396. Other leaders are Cliff Mages, New York, third with .373; Walt Evers, Detroit, sixth with .367; Victor Wertz, Detroit, seventh with .364; Ed Stewart, Washington, eighth with .352; Ed Yost, Washington, ninth .349; and Tom Henrich, New York, 10th .340.

Three players - Boston's Al Zarilla and Vern Stephens, and Dick Kryhoski of Detroit - are tied for most doubles, eight. Four others are tied with four triples apiece; Henrich and Mages, Bob Doerr of Boston and Bob Dillinger of Philadelphia.

Ted Williams of Boston has the most homers, nine. Stephens has batted in the most runs, 29, and Dillinger and Herb Adams of Chicago are tied with three stolen bases each.

Charles Stobbs of Boston is the leading pitcher with two victories and no losses. Mel Parnell of Boston and Art Houtteman of Detroit each have won four and lost one. Bob Lemon of Cleveland has the most strikeouts, 28.

This represents a gain of 1 point for "The Man" and put him 85 points ahead of his closest rival in the National League, Dick Sisler of the sizzling Phillies.

Musial's total of 35 hits is matched only by Sam Jethroe, Boston Brave's sensational rookie outfielder who played with Montreal Royals last year. His 11 doubles are two more than have been whaled by runner-up Jackie Robinson of Brooklyn.

Third behind Sisler's .382 mark comes Andy Arko of Chicago Cubs, who dropped abruptly from his towering average of .439 only a week ago to .375.

Jethroe stands sixth with .343. The league-leading Philadelphia Phillies have three batters in the select group but their Willie Jones leads in runs scored with 24 and Ennis is tops in runs batted in with 26.

Sid Gordon of Boston hammered his eighth home run to take the lead in that specialty, followed by Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh and Jones of the Phils, each with seven. Jethroe and Buddy Kerr of the Braves each have belted three triples. Peeewe Reese of Brooklyn continues to lead the base-stealers with five.
