Local and Other Items.

THE BIG FIRE.—The "big fire" in Charlottetown occurred on the 15th July, 1866, just thirty-two years ago on Friday last.

A GOOD MOVE.—Efforts are being made to start a boot and shoe factory in Bridgetown, N. S. Already a large number of shares have been subscribed for.

ANOTHER DISCOVERY.—The discovery of a genuine placer is announced from the Michipicoten district, Ontario. It is said to be located on the shores of one of the many lakes in the district.

BAD NEWS.—According to a despatch sent to Quebec by Mgr. Guay from the North Shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence some thirty or forty families of Indians belonging to Moisie, Seven Islands and Muigan, died in the woods last winter for want of provisions.

KILLED IN BOSTON.—Joseph Revell, 45 years of age, of Cambridge, Mass., was killed last week at the upper section of the cofferdam for the new southern union station. Revell was crushed by a falling piece of timber. He leaves a wife and family in P. E. Island.

CORNER STONE LAID.—The corner stone of the new library building of Pine Hill College, Halifax, was laid last week by Rev. Principal Pollock. The building will be of brick and will cost \$18,000. Nearly \$6,000 of the cost has already been raised.

A STRONG TEAM.—Arrangements are being made to send from this city a team of athletes who will, at the championship sports in Charlottetown, do St. John credit. Among others who will go are Coombs, DesBrisay, J. M. Robinson and Fairweather. These men should have no trouble in taking the jumps, the pole vault, the hurdles, and some of the sprints.—St. John Telegraph.

MASONIC VISITATION.—The Masonic Grand Lodge of Michigan will pay an informal visit to the Grand Lodge of Canada at its session in Toronto this week. The members are arranging to take with them to present to the Canadian brethren a specially made gavel that will be unique. If possible, the gavel will be made of wood taken from the Maine, and it will be a handsome affair. This will be the first time in the history of the country that a Masonic Grand Lodge of any state of the Union has visited a Grand Lodge in any foreign country, or vice versa.
