"PRINCE OF FOXES" AT THE CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE

Although Cesare Borgia may have removed a record number of victims from the land of the living, his methods left a great deal to be desired as far as imagination and distinctive touches were concerned.

That is the opinion of Lyle Wheeler, who with Mark-Lee Kirk, functioned as art director on "Twentieth Century-Fox's" "Prince of Foxes," an exciting historical drama of Borgia's nefarious intrigues, coming to the Capitol Theatre, where it will open its engagement on Monday.

For the picture, filmed in its entirety in Italy, which stars Tyrone Power, Orson Welles and Wanda Hendrix in one episode in the life of the notorious 15th Century adventurer, Wheeler had to brush up on the ruler's evil talents.

"As murderers go," asserted the art director, "Borgia was strictly small-time: all he knew was poison. Since he never varied his technique it's a wonder the intended victims didn't catch on."

Borgia, portrayed in "Prince of Foxes" by Orson Welles, administered slow doses of a white powder called at that time, canterella, which produced death throes which have enabled contemporary scientists to determine that the fatal poison was arsenic.

In his lengthy career as a movie art director during which he has won several Academy Awards, Wheeler has been called upon to arrange many spectacular deaths.
