



The libellant, Frances Krumm, was granted a divorce from her husband, Charles K. Krumm, of Charleston, South Carolina for cruel and abusive treatment. No defence was offered by the husband, and the wife was allowed to resume her maiden name. The libellant is the daughter of Howard and Esther Pursey, prominent citizens of Medford, former residents of Charlottetown.

Crop Report

Throughout the Prairie Provinces conditions are favourable and crops making good headway. Wheat seeding is completed and seeding of coarse grain is nearly finished. Weather warm and moisture ample. In Ontario seeding was carried out under ideal conditions, fruit trees have abundant bloom and hay promises to be a large crop. In Quebec seeding is being completed. Prospects are fairly bright for a good hay crop, but more rain is needed. In the Maritime Provinces the season is two weeks late; fruit trees in Annapolis Valley show heavy bloom. In British Columbia the season is two weeks late; crops are in fair condition.

Province of Ontario—Wheat seeding completed, growth two to four inches; oats, seventy-five per cent seeded; fall rye, winter killed at some points; rainfall general the last ten days. Calgary—Wheat seeding completed, growth good; oats twenty-five per cent seeded; some soil is drifting; grass hoppers threaten, but Municipalities are prepared to combat this pest. Lethbridge—Fall rye looking well; wheat seeding completed and oats about sixty per cent; pasture good; moisture sufficient; acreage wheat in Alberta largely that of last year. Saskatoon—Wheat practically all seeded, acreage slightly less than last year; increased acreage expected in oats and barley; seed bed in excellent condition, ample moisture, no insect pests. Regina—Wheat seeding completed; acreage estimated fifteen per cent less with corresponding increase in coarse grains; moisture abundant and no soil drifting or insect pest. Winnipeg—Conditions continue favourable; wheat shows good growth, and oat seeding nearly finished; good crop fall rye promised; pasture good. Warm weather and plentiful rains have given crops an excellent start.

Province of Quebec—Seeding nearly completed in some sections and in others is well under way. Prospects for a good hay crop are fairly bright and with warm rains these prospects should be improved; this also applies to grass pasture. The season is late throughout the Provinces.

Province of Ontario—Recent general rains and warm weather have proved very beneficial. Seeding conditions have been ideal. Fall wheat has greatly improved and a good average crop is indicated. Spring wheat, oats and barley are well up and looking promising. Hay, a large crop in sight; grass in splendid condition. Fruit trees have had abundant bloom. The general reports is that prospects are bright and that the present condition of the crops is well up to, or above average.

Maritime Provinces—Seeding is well advanced and general conditions are good, although the season is one to two weeks late. Hay promises well everywhere, fruit trees in Annapolis Valley show heavy bloom. A somewhat smaller acreage of potatoes is planted in New Brunswick than was the case last year. In Cape Breton conditions are very backward as the ice has just moved off the coast.

Province of British Columbia—Season two or three weeks late; moisture everywhere sufficient; grain generally growing rapidly; hay just under average; alfalfa sixty per cent winter killed; potatoes good average. Okanagan apples, judging from blossoms, will be seventy five per cent of last year's crop. Stone fruits above average. Damage by frost to small fruits in Fraser Valley is offset by increased.

Ninth Good Roads Congress Opens In B.C. on Monday

DELGATES FROM ALL OVER CANADA NOW TRAVELLING WESTWARD FOR NATIONAL CONVENTION.

The ninth annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association, opens on Monday, June 12 at the Empress Hotel, Victoria, B. C. and just now there are scores of delegates from the eastern part of the Dominion who are travelling westward to participate in the four day gathering of road experts from all parts of the North American continent, and learn the latest methods of road construction and maintenance in order to aid their own governments and municipal bodies to build better highways than in the past. Enthusiasts from Prince Edward Island, headed by Premier Bell, left at the beginning of the week being joined en route by others from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and linking up with the Quebec pioneers of improved highways who started from Montreal on the Trans-Canada Limited on Tuesday evening at five o'clock. The delegates from Toronto left at nine o'clock the same night, and en route to the west the different parties will link up so that when Vancouver is reached there will be several special cars containing delegates to the convention.

The various committees that have been at work during the past few weeks have completed all arrangements for what promises to be one of the highest and most successful conventions in the history of the national association. The program of speakers comprises the greatest experts on road building in Canada and the United States, who will not only contribute practical papers during the convention but will be ready to assist delegates in solving any of the many problems that arise in construction and maintenance work. The climate and soil conditions in each province are so varied that long and costly experiments have had to be made to ascertain the most economical and efficient methods of highway work. Delegates will be able to make the fullest advantage of the information thus gained, and thus save their own municipal rates large sums of money in the future. The whole object of the Canadian Good Roads Association is educational, and while a most generous program of entertainment has been provided for the delegates and their wives, nothing will be allowed to interfere with the business sessions of the convention and the dissemination of useful information.


Every phase of road construction and maintenance will be covered by the speakers and the fullest opportunity given for discussion on the subjects dealt with.

There are quite a number of ladies accompanying the delegates and they will be well taken care of by the special reception and entertainment committees. The opportunity afforded of visiting the West under the most pleasant climatic and soil conditions in many of the subjects dealt with.

The third annual inter-provincial conference of highway officials will be held in conjunction with the convention thus giving the officials of the various governments an opportunity of more intimately exchanging knowledge and ideas on the problems confronting them. While officials of the various good roads associations will also have a special conference during convention week. The officers of the Canadian Automobile Association left for the West in advance of their colleagues in order to hold meetings in several centres en route in connection with their organization prior to their annual meeting held during convention week at Victoria.

Six official delegates will be present from Ottawa representing the Federal Government and the City of Ottawa, and the Hon. J. J. Ferron, Minister of Highways in the Quebec Government, is also on the way to the convention city. A. P. Sandles, of Columbus, Ohio, who is in the race for the governorship of the State of Ohio, is attending the convention with Mrs. Sandles, and many other prominent delegates and speakers are coming from across the border. A lecture illustrated with moving pictures by Germain P. Graham of the Asphalt Association of Albany, New York, has been added to the program which is full of interest to all who desire to see the rapid development of the country by the provision of improved means of inter-communication between provinces and between centres of population.



This couch hammock is exactly what you want


