# 'Front Page Challenge' Features Premier Shaw

Premier Walter R. Shaw of Prince Edward Island stated that he could see many advantages for the island due to the construction of the \$148,000,000 causeway which will link this province with the mainland when he appeared on the CBC television network program "Front Page Challenge" last night.

When asked if this could have any effect on Maritime union by columnist Pierre Berton, Mr. Shaw briefly discussed points on Maritime provincial governments and could see no immediate effects.

Panelist Betty Kennedy brought up the point of the turning of the sod in New Brunswick and asked the premier if he received an invitation to the ceremonies. Mr. Shaw said that he did not remember receiving one and refused to give any further comment on the subject. However, when asked if he thought if the result of the last federal election in Prince Edward Island, had any reflection on the timing of the announcement by the Dominion government about the causeway project, he answered that he did not think that there was very much difference in the election. He did not think that the people on Prince Edward Island voted against a tie government because it appeared that they were being given a handout.

Gordon Sinclair followed on the topic of government but he dealt on entirely different aspects of it. Mr. Shaw could not see any great disadvantages in not having a member of Parliament from P.E.I. who belongs to the Liberal government. He referred to provinces in western Canada who also do not have any Liberal members of Parliament.

Mr. Sinclair asked a few personal questions and then returned to the topic of the causeway. The sound due to network difficulties made it impossible to make out what the Premier was saying when he began to discuss a bit of the history on why the causeway was to be constructed.

Lister Sinclair, more interested in the arts on the island, asked for Mr. Shaw's views about the Charlottetown Festival. Premier Shaw said that he attended it and that he enjoyed it very much. When asked if it was worth the cost, he remarked that it would take some time for it to work up to the cost, but continued by saying that he thought that the festival was an advantage for the citizens and he was most enthusiastic about it.

## Fined \$100 For Pollution

**SUMMERSIDE** — Everett Martin Mulligan, now a resident of New Haven was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in County Court yesterday on a charge of permitting a chemical substance to pass into water frequented by fish.

Bernard St. Clair McCabe appeared and acted for the accused.

The accused had previously pleaded not guilty to the charge and evidence was given at previous session by fisheries officer C. Lloyd Heckbert, Warden Jack A. Yeo and Rev. R. Duffy of Charlottetown, a chemist at St. Dunstan's University who tested several samples of the brook water and the insecticide which the accused was using to spray a field.

Arthur Gordon Andrews, Free-town, charged with capital murder was further remanded to Thursday, Feb. 3.

An appeal to have the Andrews case transferred back to Juvenile Court was granted last week by Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan of the Supreme Court.

Lester Sheldon Jenkins, Summerside, was found guilty of illegal parking and was fined.

Davis Enman MacNeill now a resident of Charlottetown charged with non-support of a dependent had the case against him dismissed for lack of prosecution.

Edwin Joseph Perry, North Bedeque, charged with impaired driving had his case adjourned to Feb. 8.

## Village To Get Bridge Lights

**ST. PETERS** — The 1966 budget for the village of St. Peter's was set at \$2,500 at the annual meeting of village commissioners of St. Peter's last night.

It was learned at the meeting that revenue totalled \$3,117.89 while expenditures amounted to \$4,454.52. Included in the expenditures was \$2,000 paid out for the construction of a new library.

A decision was made to install a new street light at the end of Greenwich Road and to repair other lights in the village. It was also decided to install lights on the St. Peter's bridge.

The annual report was read by Mrs. Eileen Jackson who submitted her resignation as clerk.

In the firemen's report, Fire Chief D.S. O'Hanley recorded 17 house calls, five forest fires and two grass fires. Plans were made to overhaul the fire truck.

R.B. Pratt was re-appointed commissioner. Other commissioners are Stewart MacEwen and Joseph Lewis, chairman.

## Bobsled Run Gets Better

**CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)** — The mercury dipped Tuesday night at the slowly thawing bobsled chute and competitors got in their first practice runs for the world four-man championship.

Rising temperatures the last two days also away at the walls of the 1,720-meter Ronco chute and forced cancellation of Monday drills.

The situation threatened the championship scheduled for Saturday and Sunday nights under the floodlights.

The temperature fell from a high of 46.4 degrees during the day to 33.8 at sunset. Two hours later, the competitors were permitted to try the chute.

## Wilmot Sewage System Planned

**SUMMERSIDE** — The annual meeting of the Wilmot Village ratepayers was held in the Athena Regional High School last night. The meeting was chaired by William Lefurgey.

It was decided at the meeting that a street lighting agreement would be made with the town of Summerside to have installed 125-watt vapour lamps in the Wilmot district to Read's Corner instead of the present lighting fixtures.

The chief concern during the past years has been the need of a sewage disposal system in the district. The estimated cost of this system was \$125,739. It is expected that work on the system will begin in the spring. The contract has not been given as yet.

The following commissioners were elected: For a three year period, Joe Murphy and Earl MacEachern; William LeFurgey for two years and Parvein Cass for one year. Mr. LeFurgey was appointed chairman for the ensuing year and Russell Phaneuf was appointed as village clerk.

## Two Honorary Aides Named

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Two Canadian forces officers have been appointed honorary aides - de-camp to Governor-General Vanier, the defence department announced Tuesday.

They are Commodore R. J. Pickford, 45, of Montreal and Halifax, chief of staff for logistics at Maritime command headquarters, and Group Capt. G. A. Berry of Lloydminster, Alta., commander of the RCAF station at Summerside, P.E.I.

The department also announced that Col. G. P. Marriott, 51, of Montreal, commander of Camp Shilo, Man., will become acting commander of Manitoba area with headquarters at Winnipeg Feb. 7. He will continue in the Shilo appointment.

Col. Marriott succeeds Brig. H. W. Sterne, 53, of Brantford, Ont., who will join the exercise planning staff at Canadian forces headquarters here.

Cmdr. H. H. Smith, 45, of Youngstown, Alta., and Victoria, B.C., will take command of the Halifax-based repair ship Cape Scott in April. He will succeed Cmdr C. A. (Tony) Law, 49, of Quebec City and Ottawa who will retire from the navy.

## DECLARES EMERGENCY

**OSWEGO, a city of 23,000,** declared a state of emergency, with all 87 miles of its streets blocked solid, some by 20-foot drifts.

Normal industrial and business activity halted in Rome, Utica and throughout Onondaga, Oswego, Madison and Cortland counties.

At least 16 deaths were attributed to the storm.

Oswego's big fall began last Thursday.

Mayor Ralph Shapiro declared a state of emergency Monday night and warned that unless supply routes soon were opened meat, milk and bread might have to be rationed. Shapiro said meat was in especially short supply.

## Patricia Lawford Granted Divorce

**SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP)** — Patricia Lawford, sister of the late president John F. Kennedy, was granted a divorce Tuesday from actor Peter Lawford on grounds of mental cruelty.

Mrs. Lawford, who established Idaho residence at the Sun Valley resort Dec. 20, was given custody of their four children. He was given visitation rights.

The Lawfords were married 11 years ago. They were legally separated since early in January but had lived apart for some time.

No financial arrangements of the decree were disclosed.

Mrs. Lawford, 39, is a Roman Catholic. Lawford, 41, is a Protestant.

## Former Frigate Reported Adrift

**HALIFAX (CP)** — One of two former Canadian frigates being towed to the La Spezia, Italy, scrapyards Tuesday broke away from a tug and is adrift 180 miles west of here.

The 220-ton Polish tug Jantar reported that the former navy vessel La Hullose broke her tow line in heavy seas for the second time since Sunday.

## SURPLUS FOR 1965

**Village Of Parkdale Tax Rate Unchanged**

A surplus of \$191.27 was realized for the year's operation at a meeting of Parkdale commissioners held in the Parkdale institute hall last night. It was also noted that the tax rate in the village would remain the same at \$1.05 for 1966.

The revenue realized for 1965 amounted to \$91,764.70, while the total expenditure for the year was \$91,573.43.

Included in this expenditure was general government, \$48,562.56; fire protection, \$6,884.80; police protection, \$5,065.91; law enforcement, \$89.50; public works, \$27,500.87; and other expenditures amounting to \$3,000.

The expected revenue for 1966 is \$92,024 while the total estimated expenditure amounts to \$101,943.20.

Included in the 1966 expenditure is general government amounting to \$32,293.20; fire protection, \$6,880; police protection, \$7,200; law enforcement, (dog licenses) \$100., and public works, \$35,500.

Nelson Good (sewer and water) reported that the total expenditure for the water and sewer system amounted to \$13,947.82. This included sewer mains, entrances, water mains, pumps and wells.

**OTHER REPORTS**

Reports from other committees included public works, George Newman; public property, fire and police, Harvey Douglas; finance, Fred Wotton; fire protection, Fire Chief Dan McAskill; police protection, Police Chief Warren MacKenzie.

An election was held to replace two commissioners. One whose term expired and the other who resigned. Elected were George Newman, Fred Wotton and Roddie Hickox.

## Victoria Meeting Is Well Attended

**VICTORIA** — Almost every home in Victoria was represented at the annual meeting of village commissioners held in the community center last night.

Chairman H.B. Wood reported a successful Victoria Day in conjunction with the official opening of the Victoria seaway last summer by Premier W.R. Shaw.

Improvements during the year included construction of a sea wall, paving the wharf and decorating federal buildings on the wharf.

Other improvements included renovating the community center, maintaining recreational facilities at the rural school and repairing the fire truck.

## SNOW SEVERS FOOD SUPPLY

**OSWEGO, N.Y. (AP)** — Oswego, on the southeastern shore of Lake Ontario, remained under a weather siege Tuesday, wearing a mantle of more than 100 inches of snow.

Mayor Ralph Shapiro declared a state of emergency Monday in the city of 22,000. He said meat, milk and bread might be rationed if supply routes could not be opened speedily. Winds of 60 miles an hour created huge drifts.

Meat was in particularly short supply, Shapiro said. Schools were closed. The local Palladium-Times was unable to publish Monday for the first time in 120 years.

**PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)** — Golf's longest tournament—five days, five rounds and 90 holes — is scheduled to start today when a select field of professionals and a small army of amateurs tee off in the \$100,000 Bob Hope classic.

Play is spread for the first four days over four luxury country club courses—Bermuda Dune, Indian Wells, La Quinta and Eldorado.

The final round will be played over Indian Wells, the host club for this year's tournament.

Defending champion Bill Casper is on hand as are the winners of the other tournaments in this young 1966 winter schedule: Arnold Palmer at Los Angeles, Don Misasengale in the Bing Crosby and Ken Venturi in the San Francisco Lucky.
