At a Cabinet Council, to-day, it was resolved to adopt a more moderate tone toward Russia and seek to conciliate her.

The Duke of Cleveland writes to the Times arguing against a war between England and Russia.

The North German Parliament was opened today. King William addressed the deputies, congratulating Germany on the victories achieved, and says that peace would be certain if France had leaders who could identify their future with that of their country.

Advices from Paris are to the 18th. There had been no distribution of meat for four days. Cats, rats and guinea pigs were being consumed for food.

Lord Lyons, at Tours, has given the government to understand that Mr. Odo Russell is instructed, not only to demand explanations on the subject of the new attitude of Prussia, but also to firmly demand a bona fide armistice which will permit France to hold elections.

A telegram from Berlin, says a German mail conveyer from Cologne to Sedan was attacked by the forces under Gen. Manstein, and hurrying up from the Northern Departments.

The Prussian bark Iphigeneia Hellespontus, was blown up by a French frigate, off the coast of Ireland.

The German ship Estafete, returning from South Sea, entered the Port of Havre, where she was promptly seized, the officers not having heard of the war.

The Russian authorities have warned the Russian papers not to publish anything favorable to France or against Prussia, as the interests of the latter Power demand from Russia a favorable view of Prussian public affairs.

The Russian forces are being concentrated heavily at Odessa and near the Austrian frontier.

The King of Bavaria, last night, signed the Treaty of Union between that State and the North German Confederation.

Despatches from Tours state that the intention of the immense force of Prussian soldiers now concentrated at Montargis, 38 miles east of Orleans, to march on Tours and cut off General De Paludine's communications with that city.
