P.E. Fats Short of Butter Mark

Prince Edward Island dairy men fell slightly short of a bid for an all-11me butter production record in 1962, but the 5,927,200 pound made was only 197,875 pounds below the 1953 record year when 6,125,277 pounds were recorded. The 1961 production was 5,808,300 pounds.

The province was on the way to a record with production slightly ahead of the record year until the cows fell in on the lush pastures of summer months, when they produced 124,421 gallons of the previous year for an increase of slightly from one of the most difficult

harvesting years ever known. The December production of 266,575 was well below the 302,200 of a year ago, and the November production was 266,575 pounds below the 1953 record year when 6,125,277 pounds were recorded. The 1961 production was 5,808,300 pounds.
