OF the five, two were convicted and fined \$30 each, two were dismissed for lack of evidence, and one was adjourned until to-morrow owing to the absence of a witness. Another prosecution has been entered against one of the parties dismissed.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Huge Bribery Sensation.

MONTREAL, Aug. 18. A great sensation has been caused in business circles here by an alleged attempt to bribe the Customs officer, who discovered and unearched the Ayer frauds. An insurance agent is charged with offering the officer \$10,000 for possession of the books, \$25,000 to keep important witnesses away, and \$25,000 for the officer himself. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Walters, the agent implicated.

John Savage, who has been brought into this city in the custody of Detective Fahey, has been an employee of Stove and Wellington, the well known nursery-men of Toronto, as a special agent at Windsor, N. S. The firm, suspecting him of embezzlement, put Fahey on his tracks, and Savage was soon discovered—not at Windsor, N. S., but at Brockfield, Ont., where he was arrested and pleaded "not guilty" to forty or fifty charges of embezzlement and forgery, which had been laid against him.

Roberts Sentenced—His Wife Dies of Grief.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 18. In the Circuit Court yesterday, Beckingham pleaded guilty of larceny. Oulton, who was indicted for wounding with intent to kill, was found guilty of common assault. Roberts, convicted of indecent assault, was sentenced to imprisonment for one year, and to receive twelve lashes at the expiration of nine months of the term. His wife died of grief about twenty minutes previous to the sentence. She was all alone with her small children.

Parnell Summons His Forces.

LONDON, Aug. 18. Parnell has summoned all the Irish members to be present at the opening of Parliament on Thursday, on account of the grave and pressing condition of public affairs.

The Freeman's Journal says that Parnell will not await Tory convenience in dealing with the Belfast riots and the alarming condition of the Irish farmers, and that Lord Salisbury will have to explain the intentions of his Government.

Self Government for Ireland.

LONDON, Aug. 18. It is the intention of the Government to introduce at the next session of Parliament, a measure giving local self-government to Ireland. The bill will be founded on the basis of the plan prepared by Lord Randolph Churchill. The party led by Hartington will support the scheme.

How the Money Goes.

BOSTON, Aug. 18. Gray, the missing Treasurer of the Atlantic Cotton Mills, who confessed to being a defaulter to the extent of \$500,000 to \$600,000 and disappeared, spent the money in building operations and fast living. His bondsmen are good for \$70,000.

Another Cricket Match.

MONTREAL, Aug. 18. The cricket match between the West Indians and the Montrealers yesterday ended in a draw. In the first innings the Montreal team scored 112 and the visitors 62, while in the second innings the Montrealers scored 130, and the visitors 101 for four wickets.

Train Wreckers in Jeopardy.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18. The perpetrators of the attempt to wreck an Orange excursion train whilst returning from Kingston, Ont., on the night of July 13th last, have been traced to Montreal and prove to be ex-employees of the C. P. R. It is probable that arrests in connection with the affair will be made to-day.

Banqueting the Victors.

LONDON, Aug. 18. At a banquet given to the Dominion Artillery Shoeburyness Team last night, Sir Charles Tupper and many other distinguished guests were present.

A Disturbed City.

BELFAST, Aug. 18. This city was the scene of more rioting yesterday, which was quickly suppressed by the military.
