Shanty Town, Jamaica, where the best grass in the world sells for two dollars an ounce in the street, where shooting a film can be held up when an actor is shot, (two have died since it was completed), where people sing in church until they have an orgasm. Nothing expresses that life better than the music in this film, for here is hope and deep depression, anger and love. Every day hundreds of kids flock into the slums of Kingston from the hillsides of Jamaica, drawn by the promise of the transistor, sure that they can get it if they really want. Jimmy Cliff was one of those kids and that dream is at the root of his music. For him the dream came true. But for most many rivers to cross is a prelude to drowning in the ocean of dust and zinc and joblessness of a place and time that increasingly needs people who can at least read and write. This is the first feature from Jamaica to receive a wide playing in Canada. We are pleased to make it available to you.
