NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Military Map of Canada

Minister of Customs on a Holiday

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—A military map of Canada is under way. It will show minutely the character of the country, the fordable streams, the bridges, roads and lanes, blacksmith shops, where grain is stored, and all that character of information which a commander in taking troops across the country would desire to know. Mr. J. W. Russell has been appointed collector of customs for Ottawa city in place of the late Mr. Watson. The Minister of Customs has gone to Nova Scotia for a few weeks' holidays.

THE LAMBETH CONFERENCE.

Fears Are Not Realized.

Character of the Conference Unchanged.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—A cable despatch from London to the Tribune says: The Lambeth Conference holds its final service on Monday.

The fears of timorous churchmen that the Archbishop of Canterbury would be transferred into an Anglican Patriarch or pope have proved entirely unfounded.

The trend of the proceedings has not been in the direction of absolutism or centralization. A proposal for creating a tribunal of reference has been dropped. The character of the conference as a voluntary body, without the power of enforcing its resolutions, has not been changed.

UPRISING IN INDIA.

Reinforcements of the British

SIMLA, August 2.—Despatches to the Government show that reinforcements with abundant supplies and ammunition arrived at Dargai at noon yesterday. The march was forced and very rapid, and nineteen Sikhs died from sunstroke on the way.

Colonel Reid, with large reinforcements, has reached Camp Malakand.

FIGHTING IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The Rebels Badly Defeated.

THEIR SURRENDER EXPECTED.

CAPE TOWN, Aug. 2.—Serious fighting took place on Friday in the Langebe district. The British loss was trifling. The Government troops have captured all the enemy's positions north of the Twaikloof. Among the British losses were Sergeants Hall and Merce, who were killed.

Chief Lukajantjes, who led the rebels, was killed with many of his followers. A general surrender of rebels is expected.

HALIFAX, Aug. 2.—Albert A. Ruggles, son of ex-alderman Ruggles, was drowned in Bedford Basin last evening.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

OTTAWA, July 31.—The jubilee stamp issued has added nearly a quarter of a million dollars to the revenue of the country.

LONDON, July 31.—The Times this morning editorially congratulates its readers upon the fact that the negotiations regarding the question of pelagic sealing in the Behring sea have resulted in an agreement for an international conference on the subject to be held at Washington in October.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Information that an attempt will be made by a gang of pirates, said to be Chinese, to seize an American steamer laden with \$2,000,000 in gold dust from the Klondyke has been received at the Treasury Department, and the officials there are considering the advisability of sending a revenue cutter to convey the vessel to a place of safety.

OTTAWA, July 30.—The new mining regulations for the Yukon, imposing royalties of ten and twenty per cent, on yields of \$5,000 and over per week, respectively, and reserving alternate claims for the government, have been printed. The penalty for trespass on the reserve claim is the cancelling of the trespasser's own claims, disability from registering any other claim and ejection from the country.

TORONTO, July 29.—The Evening Telegrams special cable says: Sir William Whiteway, premier of Newfoundland, was today given the freedom of the Old Borough of Totnes in Devonshire. In accepting the honor Sir William said that Newfoundland had suffered from the stupidity and ignorance of British diplomats in giving to the French fishery rights that had been won for the colonists by the sword in the past.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—The steamer Excelsior, chartered by the Alaska Commercial Company, left yesterday for St. Michael with 110 passengers. This is the last of company's fleet which will connect with the Yukon river steamers this season. For hours before the departure of the steamer the wharf was thronged with people. Three times the original price was offered for tickets. One passenger accepted an offer of \$1,550 for the passage for which he had paid but \$150.

LONDON, July 30.—The emigrants' information office, has, through the Colonial Office, issued an urgent warning to persons contemplating a journey to the Klondike, pointing out that "both routes are long and expensive, and can only be used during the summer. Intending gold seekers should not start before April." Few people, indeed, show any inclination to do so. A lot of mushroom companies are springing into existence to participate in the work of gold fields exploration, but individuals confine their enthusiasm to talk. Most will wait to see how matters plan out.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 30.—Exchange has advanced to 122 and 125 per cent premium. Bankers believe there will be a better price for silver soon, but there is a growing sentiment that silver will have to wait some months before circumstances shape themselves so as to materially aid it. Some people hold the theory that bankers in Europe are hammering down silver in order to show the United States Bi-metallic Commissioners that Europe has an answer to the Dingley Triff bill. Importers will be compelled to bring in goods with the greatest caution for the time as they do not dare risk ordering largely with prospects that the exchange may grow even worse against them.

OTTAWA, July 30.—Shipments of lumber from this district to the United States have practically ceased since the new tariff of \$2 per M. came into effect. The officials of the Canadian Atlantic Railway, the great highway to the United States market, say that within the last few days the lumber traffic has greatly decreased; car loads are standing along their various sidings, which have not been moved out, nor are they likely to be for some time. At the C. P. R., where all was hurry and rush a few weeks ago in the lumber line, everything is now quiet. One cause of this is that, while the duty has been rated at \$2 per thousand, a great many of the lumbermen believe that it will not remain at that. Another and, perhaps, the principal cause is that a large quantity of pine has been shipped across the border for storing, and every available space at Oswego, Albany and other distributing points has been taken up.
