S'side Minister Named Principal Of Alberta College

Rev. M.L. Breakenridge, minister of the Summerside Church of Christ has received an appointment as principal of the Alberta Bible College in Calgary, Alta. It was learned last evening. The Summerside congregation has granted him release and has issued a call to the Rev. William O. Weale, minister at Greenmount, P.E.I. which has been accepted.

Rev. Mr. Breakenridge has been in Summerside for the past sixteen months and is leaving on September 20th. He will preach his farewell sermon on next Sunday. The request to the Summerside congregation for his release came from the college which was desirous of obtaining his services as principal.

The Alberta Bible College is the Western Canada ministerial training unit of the Churches of Christ in Canada. In taking this position in Calgary Mr. Breakenridge will be returning to his home city.

Rev. Mr. Weale will take up his duties in Summerside on October 1st. He is a native of Wales and took his ministerial training at the Alberta Bible College. He is married and has three children. TOKYO, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Seventy-five days after fighting broke out in Korea, the United Nations force still can play only the role of fireman.

It hasn't as yet been able to take the first real forward step toward carrying out its announced intention of acting as a policeman to enforce peace in "The Land Of Morning Calm."

That is the blunt truth today, nearly 11 weeks after the battle for Korea began.

Bland confidence that the war will soon be over can be based only on two things:

1. A blind hope that the North Koreans have been so worn down that their front will collapse.

2. A belief that the United Nations soon will throw into action a tremendous ground force able to overwhelm the enemy quickly.

Unfortunately, there is no trustworthy evidence along the battle front that the enemy is weakening. He appears, if anything, to be getting stronger. And there is as yet no sign here that the United Nations has massed—and ready a single knockout blow.

The sad truth is that the Reds still are conducting a siege perimeter. Since the Allies withdrew to the Naktong River line Aug. 1 the Communists have been able almost at will to start a major fire anywhere they choose along that 120-mile defensive perimeter. And they have done so.

Time after time it has taken the utter strength of the United Nations fire department to clang up and stamp out or try to contain these blazes.

In some cases the U. N. fire department itself has been all but engulfed by the bandit arsonists from the north.

There has been no faltering of the enemy to console those who feel that this will be merely a war for the sunshine soldier and the summer patriot.

On both sides it is growing in depth and bitterness.

It may have a wintry decision or—as some veteran combat officers fear—the final outcome may be postponed until spring or even next summer.

S'side Station To Observe Battle Of Britain Sunday

The annual Battle of Britain Sunday ceremonies to commemorate the gallant defence of Britain in the air in the fall of 1940 will be held in Summerside on next Sunday. Similar ceremonies are held wherever there are R.C.A.F. bases.

At two o'clock in the afternoon R.C.A.F. personnel will attend church services at St. Paul's Catholic Church and St. Mary's Anglican Church. These services will be followed by a parade to the Memorial Square when there will be a ceremony at the war memorial including the placing of wreaths.

ZANUCK PRODUCTION AGAIN BLAZES NEW SCREEN TRAIL

Paradoxical as it may seem, Darryl F. Zanuck began another trend with his major production of "Pinky" which opens at the Capitol Theatre today, even though two other movie producers beat him to the nation's screens with similar pictorial themes.

Nearly three years ago, when the Twentieth Century-Fox vice-president in charge of production purchased film rights to the novel, "Quality" he was reasonably certain this would be the case.

The reason was that it had happened before. Zanuck spent more than a year on his production of "Gentleman's Agreement" only to see "Crossfire" reach the public earlier. However, his win the Motion Picture Academy Award as "the best picture of the year."

So Zanuck was not concerned when various Hollywood executives pointed out to him that "Pinky" would not be the first film on the Negro problem. It was enough for him to know that his purchase of the Cid Ricketts Summer novel had already started others thinking in the same direction. He feels that while "Pinky" is entertainment, it will attack bigotry that should have been uprooted from the American scene a long time ago.

The noted production chief has seen the strong entertainment possibilities in the raw materials of contemporary life since his production of "I Was A Fugitive From A Chain Gang," and has followed the same course ever since with films that influenced American thinking.
