Fire Losses in New Brunswick.—A meeting of insurance underwriters was held in St. John on Monday. One of the papers was it was disclosed that the total fire losses of the year in New Brunswick were \$700,000 or \$800,000 and the amount of insurance paid about \$400,000, which was almost the exact amount of premiums.

Week of Prayer.—Last night the week of prayer services was held in the First Methodist Church. The speaker, Rev. Mr. Fullerton, gave an address on "Foreign Missions." The body of the church was well filled. The city ministers, as usual, were present. To-night's service will be held in Zion Church, the speaker, Rev. G. C. Palmer, and the subject "Home Missions."

Successful Island Students.—The result of the Christmas examinations at the Agricultural College, Guelph, Ont., are published in the Toronto papers. It is interesting to observe that Mr. John F. Clarke, of Bay View, in this Province, passed in all subjects in the first year class, and is ranked No 1 according to standing in general proficiency. In the second year class A. E. Simpson, of Hamilton, P. E. I., also passed in all subjects.

Nova Scotia Girl's Death.—A young girl named Lizzie Corrigan, an employe in Frank E. Wade's house at Albany, a suburb of Providence, R. I., died on Monday morning from the effects of inhaling gas. She was engaged to work by the family on Saturday, and during the night either blew out the gas or turned it on again after she had properly extinguished it. Her condition was discovered late on Sunday morning. She did not recover consciousness.

Medical Council Meeting.—A meeting of the Provincial Medical Council was held last evening to discuss the matter of reciprocity in the medical profession throughout the provinces. The reciprocity proposed in the adoption of one law governing the study and the qualification to practice medicine throughout the Dominion. Communications bearing upon the subject from the Medical Councils of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were read and discussed, and after the adoption of some suggestions were approved and ordered to be returned. Dr. McLeod occupied the chair, and there was a full attendance of members.

An Islander Injured.—The Truro Headlight says: A painful and what might have been a very serious accident, occurred on Prince Street, Tuesday evening. Mr. Stead, of P. E. Island, who is in town with a number of horses, was driving along when a double team containing a number of young men dashed into his sleigh, the end of the pole catching it and tearing off one side. Mr. Stead was thrown violently out and sustained a painful shaking up, from which he is at present confined to his room at the Parker House. The occupants of the double sleigh did not stop to see if Mr. Stead was killed, painfully injured or what, but leathenshly drove on.

They Wink at the Men.—A sensational episode occurred at the prayer meeting at the South Street Methodist Church, Campello, Mass., a few evenings ago. The pastor, Rev. G. W. Hunt, while advancing reasons why there should be a revival of religion in Campello, stood on tiptoe and with outstretched arms, exclaimed in tones that electrified the audience: "When young girls of Campello stop by the side of our streets and conduct themselves like the most abandoned women, is it not time that there was a revival of religion here? When daughters of respectable families here stand upon the corners of our streets and beckon to depraved men and with them, is it not time for a revival of religion?"

The Grip.—This epidemic is still prevalent. In some cases whole families are prostrated. Premier Peters has been laid up with it for several days, and Councilor McKay is also confined to his home from the same cause. Market Clerk Dillon is out today for the first time since Saturday, and Policeman Doyle, who has been off duty for nearly a week, is still unable to leave his house. Policeman Carter resumed duty yesterday. Mr. John Wheat, one of the Grand Jurymen, was obliged to leave the juryroom for home on Wednesday owing to an attack of the disease, and he is still suffering from its effects. Mr. James H. Good was out yesterday after being confined to his house for several days.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

There are nine hundred and sixty four places in Montreal licensed to sell liquor.

There are in London, Ont., 1,065 women entitled to vote, yet only 383 exercised their privilege in the plebiscite vote, and of these 45 opposed Prohibition.

The Belgian Consul General has asked the Dominion Government to co-operate in collecting statistics relating to mining in Canada for a European syndicate.

Spain, in consequence of the Melilla trouble, wants 30,000,000 pesetas from the Sultan of Morocco, and the occupation of a part of Morocco until the cash is handed over.

The Massachusetts Supreme Court has decided that if she is attacked by a pack of dogs, the owner of any one of the dogs is liable for all the damage done to the sheep.

George J. Gould has transferred his residence in New York to his wife. The consideration named is "natural love and affection and one dollar." The property is valued at \$500,000.

Daniel Moore, a lumber boss at Trenton, N. J., committed suicide by throwing himself between two huge cogwheels in Wilson's mill. He was ground to pieces. He had been sick with the grip.

A terrific prairie fire has been raging in the extreme western counties of Oklahoma territory for several days. Scores of farmers lost everything. It is feared several isolated families have perished.

One of the results of the Prohibition plebiscite in Ontario is a project among the Aldermen to reduce the number of saloons in Toronto, and it is also proposed to pass a law closing the saloons at 9 p. m., instead of 11 as at present.

She was Mrs. Johnson at the time of her death in Hopkinsville, Ky., last week. Her first husband was named Williams, the second Tucker, the third Troxel, the fourth Coe, the fifth the same Coe after a divorce and a year or two spent apart—the sixth Johnson.

One night last week, Jack Kilroy, of Tusculum, Ala., went to bed drunk, with a lighted pipe in his mouth. The bed clothing took fire and the house was burned. Kilroy was roasted alive. His wife escaped and rescued one child. Two others, aged three and five were burned to death.

Three men entered the pawn shop of Stanley Greenburg, West Randolph Street, Chicago, on Monday morning, and bound and gagged Greenburg's nephew, who was in charge of the store. They then robbed the safe and show cases, and it is claimed by Greenburg, secured about \$1,000 worth of plunder.

An Indiana woman, who hadn't spoken a word for 23 years, aroused her husband just before the dawn of 1894 by screaming aloud his name, since when she has talked volubly. How grimly sarcastic wishes for "A Happy New Year" must seem to that man when he feels that his wife will now endeavor to make up for lost time.

Destroying flames were busy in the United States last year, more than \$150,000,000 worth of property going up in smoke and ash. Boston occupies an unenviable position at the head of the list of cities suffering losses, her share of the total damage being \$5,300,000. And the Hub has started the new year with the disastrous Globe Theatre fire.

Arthur Hamilton, of Alfred Centre, N. Y., suffered with neuralgic toothache, and on Tuesday went to a dentist and had several teeth extracted. The hemorrhage following the operation was very severe, and it was some time before it was certain that he would not bleed to death. He was taken home when the hemorrhage began again, and continued until he became totally blind.

A stout Holly, N. J. despatch says:—The question as to whether it is a misdemeanor to wink at a pretty girl in church will probably be decided in a few days by a local justice of the peace, who issued a warrant for the arrest of Frank Taylor, a young man nineteen years old, charged with the offence mentioned on Sunday at the Baptist church. Taylor's young lady at whom the wink was directed resented it, and as a result one of the elders entered complaint against Taylor, who was arrested and ordered to pay a fine of \$10 or go to jail. He demanded a hearing and claimed that the wink was involuntary. The justice is holding the matter under advisement.
