FAMILY DIE SUDDENLY—Samuel Doyle, twenty-two years old, died suddenly from heart disease last week at his home in Athens, N. Y. Doyle was the last member of a family of three generations, all of whom have died suddenly within a year. The others were Doyle's grandfather, his grandmother and his father and mother. Death in each case was caused by heart disease.

OVER A HUNDRED—Lacking but a few days of 106 years, Mrs Catherine Dillon, of Bristol Pa, the oldest woman in Buck's County, is dead. She was born in Ireland July 27, 1793, and came to this country early in life. There are living four of her children, ten grand children, and fifteen great grand-children. Grief over the recent death of a daughter is supposed to have hastened her end.

A PLUCKY ACT—Two masked men entered the house of Mrs. Jacob Fisher, near Webster, Mass., one night last week, and pressing a revolver against her head demanded that she open a trunk, which contained \$300. Mrs. Fisher was forced to do so and the robbers secured the booty. When the men were leaving the yard Mrs. Fisher fired upon them and a bullet struck one of them. He was traced by blood and captured.
