

Ottawa Roughies, Lions Fight For Playoff Spots

OTTAWA (CP)—The teams that began the Canadian Football League season as odds-on favorites to meet in the Grey Cup tackle each other in an interlocking game here tonight after recent dismal showings by both clubs.

Ottawa Rough Riders began the season with a rush but have lost four of their last five starts and trail Hamilton Tiger-Cats by four points in the eastern conference. Riders' sole hope for first is to win their three final games while Hamilton manages no better than ties in its final two games.

But the visiting B.C. Lions, Riders opponents tonight, have an even tougher task. The defending Grey Cup champions are tied with Saskatchewan Roughriders for third and last playoff berth in the west, and after tonight will be even in the number of games played.

The Lions fell apart in the fourth quarter in Hamilton Sunday to drop a 25-7 decision to the Tiger-Cats, but coach Dave Skrien hopes for better things in tonight's encounter which will be televised on the CTV network at 8 p.m. EDT, (9 p.m. ADT).

"We've got to start making the big play, something we haven't done all season," Skrien said in an interview.

He also is looking for an improved effort from his offensive line.

"We're not nearly as aggressive enough."

Skrien's defence may have problems, too, as Ottawa coach Frank Clair has changed his earlier decision to bench halfback Bo Scott.

But now Clair has decided to dress Scott along with fullback Jim Dillard. Rick Black may start in Scott's place and till in both positions to give them a breather.

Skrien was sure of one thing—quarterback Joe Kapp was not to blame for the Lions' weak offense.

"Kapp has done a fine job for us but too many of his passes have been dropped."

Riders' quarterback Russ Jackson has had problems with passes also, although the Riders' biggest problems are caused by fumbles or defensive lapses.

The Riders' defence should be bolstered by the return of line-backer Mike Blum, an early season star before he was slowed by injuries.

MOSCOW (Reuters)—Russian author Mikhail Sholokhov said Monday he would go to Stockholm to accept the Nobel Prize for literature, the Soviet news agency TASS reports. Tass said Sholokhov said in the Swedish Academy a telegram in which he said: "I heartily thank you for the high appraisal of my literary work and the award of the Nobel Prize. I also gratefully accept your kind invitation to come to Stockholm for the ceremony," the telegram said.

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TORONTO (CP)—Defenceman Carl Brewer of Toronto Maple Leaf in the National Hockey League Monday quit hockey. His decision was announced by coach Punch Imlach of the Leafs after the two held a 10-minute meeting.

The 26-year-old player quit the Leaf training camp in Peterborough, Ont., last week during an exhibition game between Leafs and Boston Bruins.

He said at the time that he hadn't been feeling "up to par lately" and that he would take a few days off to think it over and "discuss the future with my wife."

The Toronto-born player went up to the Leafs from Toronto Junior Marlboros, a Leaf farm club, in the 1958-59 season, and has been with them since.
