The rock bottom price prevailing the past six years for long haired furs such as wolf, coyote, fox, raccoon, skunk, wild cat, etc., has resulted in a tremendous increase in those predatory animals. In our own Province for instance red fox fetched as high as \$21.00 per pelt on our own local market although the average price paid by local buyers ran from \$15.00 to \$17.00. Today local fur buyers refuse to handle red fox pelts as they are either unskilled on the fur sales or bid in at twenty-five or fifty cents per skin.

This situation has resulted in an alarming increase in game and wildlife losses. For instance: At one time the English Ring Neck Pheasants were as thick in North Dakota as at the Jack Miner Bird Sanctuary where predators are controlled.
