"Ace" Foley Has Great Praise For Don MacLeod

Ace Foley, sports writer of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald, had high praise for Don MacLeod in his column in yesterday's edition.

He said about "Duck": "His pitching form is superb. His delivery is smooth, everything comes from the same motion and, as the radio announcers are wont to say, 'He gives the batter the bird motion, then takes something off the pitch.'

"He sorts them out — a fast ball here, a letpitch, a good curve. He has the follow through the poise and the confidence. Showing in Halifax for the first time last Saturday in a relief role he stole the show.

"In the four innings he struck out eight. Several of them came with the tying and winning runs on base. He was wild with runners on first and second base but never with a man on third. Four of his pitches were wild, but a glance through his record showed it was strictly an off day in that department. In seven games he has wild-pitched only six times.

"In seven games he has pitched 37 2-3 innings, given up 10 runs, 19 hits, struck out 32 and walked 17.

The 1955 all-star game will bring a lot of new faces into the foreground. Only five on last year's star are repeaters. Duke Snider and Roy Campanella of the Dodgers, Ted Kluszewski of the Reds in the senior circuit and Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra of the Yankees for the American League.

The 1954 runaway version of the Cleveland Indians and the Giants who clobbered them in the World Series were almost overlooked completely placing only one player between them on the "dream team", Giant rightfielder Don Mueller, whom manager Durocher considers the most "alert" batter in the game.

Willie Mays, last year's most valuable player and hitting king in the National League and Bobby Avila, who won the American League batting title, were turned out in the cold by the voting public, as were sluggers Stan Musial and Al Rosen, which all goes to prove the ancient bromide that "fame is a fleeting thing".

The American League still have a good edge on their senior brothers in all-star games played to date, with a won-lost record of 13-8. Previous to last year's game, won by the Amers, the Nationals had run up a string of four straight from 1950 through '53 and brought their record up from a dismal 4-12 to a more respectable 8-12.

Cobey McCluskey, getting in shape for his July 12th go with Jimmy Skinner at the Forum, battered Johnny McDonough of Boston around for eight rounds at Dartmouth Monday night. Roberts Gains 12th Victory As He Bats And Pitches Phillies To Win Over Brooks

Philadelphia, (AP)—Robin Roberts pushed one run across by walking in the second inning and doubled two more in the sixth Tuesday night as the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 5-4. Righthander Roberts picked up his 12th victory of the year although he needed help in the ninth inning.

Duke Snider homered for the Brooklyn, clubbing the first pitch of the sixth inning over the rightfield wall. It was Snider's 28th round tripper of the season and the 24th of the year off Roberts. It also was Duke's third homer in two days.

Roberts, who has lost seven, fanned six and allowed 11 hits.

Andy Seminick hit his sixth homer for two Philadelphia runs in the eighth.

Roberts went out after giving up four straight Brooklyn hits in the ninth, good for two runs. Jack Meyer took over on the mound and put out the fire.

Karl Spooner, who was relieved by Ed Roebuck in the sixth, was charged with his second loss against two wins.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Southpaw Johnny Antonelli hurled a four-hitter and Willie Mays smashed two home runs as the New York Giants easily defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 11-1 Tuesday night.

The feat marked the fifth time this year that Mays has belted two circuit clouts in one game. That's tops for the majors. Mays, who also hit two homers in Monday's twin bill with the Pirates, now has 25.

Don Mueller, who had two of the Giants' 12 hits, came through with a triple in the ninth for his 10th safety of 10 men and walked four in winning his seventh game against 10 defeats.

Dick Littlefield, who hurled superlatively in getting out of a first inning jam, was the victim of Mays' first homer. Relief pitcher Laurin Pepper gave up the second.

Littlefield came on with the bases loaded and a non-starter Paul Martin, a 21-year-old pitcher now has 25.

Chicago Cubs Provide Surprise Of Ball Season

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Cubs, who haven't finished in the National League's first division since taking third in 1946, have parlayed home runs and a share of luck into a comeback that could well be tops in sports for the year.

Running in second place most of the campaign, the Bruins—no better than seventh the last two years and 100 to 1 shots for the pennant on the early 1955 form sheet—have provided as big a surprise as the Brooklyn Dodgers' first-place stampede.

With a 44-36 record and a two-game bulge over the third place Milwaukee Braves, who open a two-game series in Wrigley Field today, Stan Hack's cubs are headed for their winningest season since capturing the pennant with 96-56 in 1945.

Foremost in the resurgence is 24-year-old Ernie Banks, slender Negro who will be starting shortstop for the Nationals in the all-star game at Milwaukee Tuesday.

Banks hit .275 as a rookie last year and has ignored the so-called sophomore jinx this season with a blistering pace of .301 and 21 home runs.

Hailed as the best Cub shortstop since the days of Bill Jurgis, he already has surpassed his homer total of 19 in 1954 and will set a National League record for shortstops when he blasts No. 23.

Durocher Names Starters For N. L. All-Star Team

CINCINNATI (AP)—Manager Leo Durocher of New York Giants at short-stop, Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee at third, Del Ennis of Philadelphia in left field, Duke Snider of Brooklyn in centre, Don Mueller of New York in right and Roy Campanella of Brooklyn as catcher.

Campanella has been sidelined with an injury and it is not yet known whether he will be able to play.

To fill out the catching staff Durocher named Del Crandall of Milwaukee and Smoky Burgess of Cincinnati.

Filling out the outfield will be Willie Mays of New York, Hank Aaron of Milwaukee and Frank Thomas of Pittsburgh. Aaron never has played in an all-star game.

Spare infielders will be Gene Baker and Ransom Jackson of Chicago, Johnny Logan of Milwaukee, Stan Musial of St. Louis and Gil Hodges of Brooklyn. Baker and Logan have not seen previous all-star competition.

Under that setup, Milwaukee will have five players on the squad, Brooklyn, Chicago and St. Louis four each, Cincinnati three, Philadelphia and New York two each and Pittsburgh one.

A. L. Announces Full Squad For All-Star Game

CHICAGO (AP)—The American League Tuesday announced the regular season squad for the all-star game at Milwaukee July 12.

The starting eight players, pitchers excepted, were voted on in a ball poll in which 6,562,064 ballots were cast.

Al Lopez, manager of Cleveland Indians who will command the American League team, selected his pitchers and alternate outfielders, infielders and catchers.

Lopez named nine pitchers, including rookies Dick Donovan of Chicago White Sox and Herb Score of Cleveland. Others are Herb Ford and Bob Turley of New York, Early Wynn, Cleveland; Bill Hoelt, Detroit; Billy Pierce, Chicago; Frank Sullivan, Boston, and Jim Wilson, Baltimore.

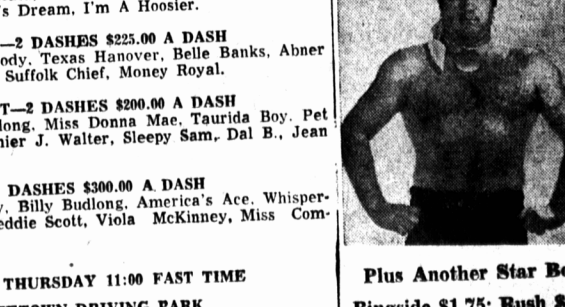
