Pretty Nurseries With New Fabrics

It's so easy, these days, to make Baby's nursery a pretty and cheerful room. Fabrics are colorful and come in delightful weaves and prints, and nursery furniture is as charming as it is practical.

For floor covering, a wise choice is rubber tile, which is easy on the feet—an important consideration when so many trips must be taken to and from the crib — and also muffles noise. Easy to keep clean, too, with a quick once-over with a damp mop and there's no need to wax it.

Another advantage is that rubber flooring is slip-resistant, also eases the bumps, should Baby take a tumble while learning to creep.

Installing rubber tile is a relatively simple job that you can do yourself. If Baby shares his room with other children, protect his corner from light, as well as drafts, with a movable screen, and, for convenience, equip the side toward his crib with a drop leaf shelf to hold his special things.

Fry together, then drain well 8 slices cut-up side bacon ½ cup freshly-chopped onion Sift together once, then into bowl 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour or 1½ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour 4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder ½ tsp. salt few grains cayenne

Cut in finely ½ c. chilled shortening Mix in ¾ c. shredded cheddar cheese 2 cups, freshly-chopped parsley Rub well in dry ingredients; add ¾ c. milk and mix lightly with a fork, adding milk, if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead 10 seconds on floured board. Roll out to 9- x 16-inch rectangle. Combine bacon slices, onion and ¼ c. chili sauce

Spread on dough, beginning at a long edge, roll up jelly-roll fashion, bring ends together to form a ring and seal. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Cut 1-inch slices almost through to centre with scissors; turn each slice partly on its side. Bake in a hot oven, 450°, 15 to 20 minutes. Yields 1 ring.
