N.Y. Rangers Tie Red Wings 2-2

DETROIT (AP) — New York Rangers came from behind twice on goals by Andy Hebenton and Camille Henry and tied Detroit Red Wings 2-2 in a National Hockey League game Tuesday. The tie clinched a playoff berth for the Rangers and mathematically eliminated last place Chicago. The tie kept the Rangers unbeaten on Detroit ice this season — first time any Detroit foe has succeeded since Montreal did it 14 years ago. New York has won four and tied three here at Olympia Stadium. The point was enough to assure New York it cannot be overhauled by the fifth-place Toronto Maple Leafs. The Rangers are in the playoffs for the third straight time after missing five years in a row.

Ch'town Abbies Score 4-3 Overtime Win Over Tigers

The Charlottetown Abbies defeated the Campbellton Tigers 4-3 after six minutes and eleven seconds of sudden death overtime last night to even up their best of three series for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Junior Hockey Title, at one game each. The game showed some of the best hockey seen here this winter and was close and thrill-packed all the way. The two teams battled to a 3-3 draw in the regulation time and fought through a scoreless 10-minute overtime period and into six minutes of sudden-death overtime before Eustace Reeves scored the winner. Reeves picked up the puck just inside the Campbellton blue-line and faked a shot to draw out the defence before letting fly a

screen shot that the Tiger goalie had very little chance on. The players that the Abbies had secured for last night's game produced all the scoring. Vince Mulligan fired two goals while brother Billy Mulligan fired one to set the stage for Reeves' dramatic tally. Vince Mulligan put the Abbies into an early first period lead with a little over the three-quarter mark when his hard shot rose over a mass of sprawled bodies into the net. Freddie Burke another player who was playing his first game assisted on the goal as did Billy Mulligan. Mulligan's goal came while a Campbellton player was in the penalty box. In the second period, The Tigers roared back and tied up the game at the 3:03 mark with LeBlans getting credit for the goal. Two minutes later, Bill Mulligan teamed up with Freddie Burke to put the Abbies into a 2-1 lead as penalties again counted their toll of players. Vince Mulligan scored his second tally early in the third period the give the Abbies what looked like a safe 3-1 lead. Both teams started to press hard as the game wore and several minor fights broke out. At one stage in the period almost the whole two teams were mixing it up. The Tigers again bounced back into contention with Payne scoring at 17:49 with help from the hard working LeBlanc. The Abbies still pressed deep into Campbellton territory and kept the Tiger goalie busy but to wards the end of the period the Tigers swarmed around the Abbies' goal looking for the tying tally. Just as the final whistle started to sound Payne poked the puck into the net. Both teams started to rough each other up while the two referees were deciding the goal would count or not. The goal was finally allowed with the time being registered as 19:59. The teams then moved into a ten-minute overtime period which produced plenty of action but no scoring as both goalies pulled off some great saves. In the sudden-death overtime the two teams were about even until Campbellton was handed a

penalty then the Abbies buzzed around the Tiger like bees. Campbellton goalie, Picard, made some great saves that kept the large crowd on their feet all through the session. Three minutes Reeves fired his shot through a crowd of players and Picard, didn't have very much of a chance on the goal.

Doctors worked on the leg for six weeks in an attempt to avoid the amputation but Monday night finally decided on the operation.

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP)—A thrilling clutch performance by skip Steve Stratford of Virginiatown in the final two ends enabled Ontario to defeat British Columbia 8-6 here Tuesday for its third straight victory in the Canadian Legion curling championships. Stratford scored two shots on the 11th end to come from behind, then made a perfect draw with his last stone on the 12th to cut out three British Columbia stones. The B.C. skip, Buck Glover, missed a take-out try with his last stone. In other matches Tuesday Alberta won its second game by defeating Quebec 13-4. Manitoba won its second, downing Prince Edward Island 8-6, and New Brunswick won its first by beating Nova Scotia 15-7. Saskatchewan's entry, skipped by John Dipple, drew a bye in Tuesday morning's round and remains unbeaten in two outings. Saskatchewan was to meet Ontario, the only other team with a perfect record, later Tuesday.

Dunlops Got Real Thing In Trophy

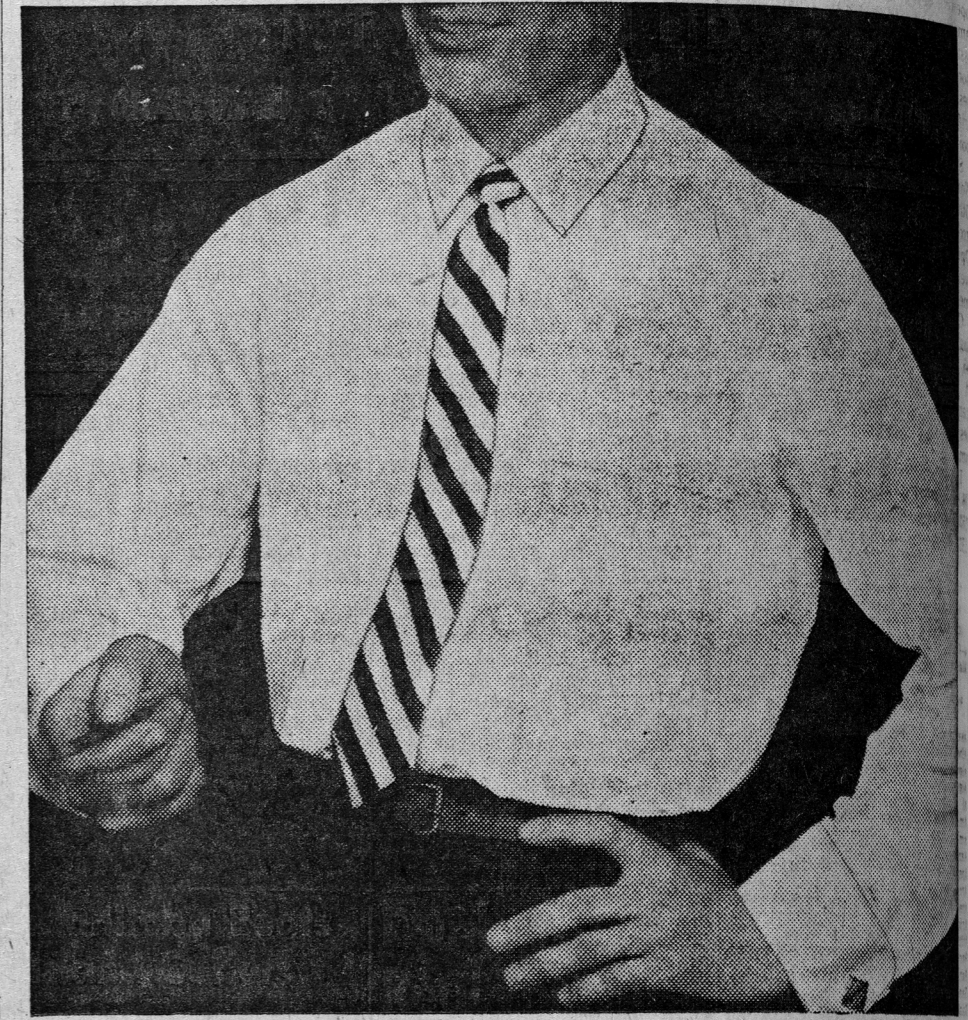

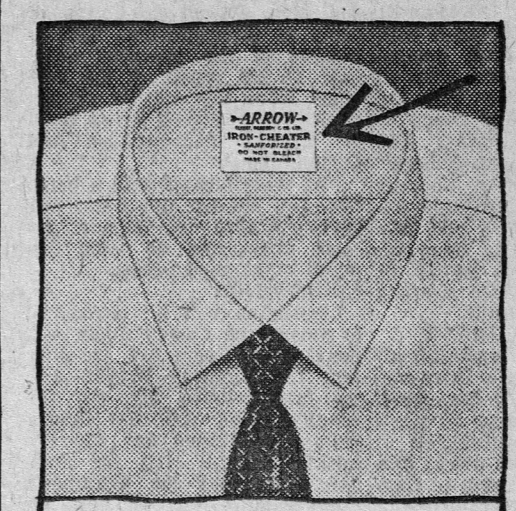
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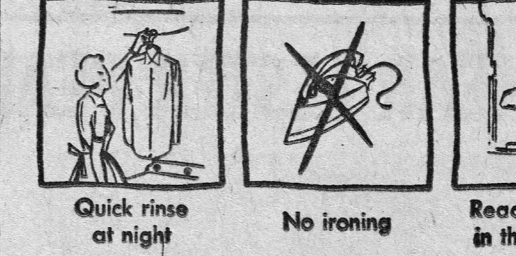
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
