Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause of death. He belonged to Newelton, N. S., and was a prominent member of the Masonic fraternity. There was no inquest.

TOO MUCH TAFFY.—At Ottawa, on Thursday last, a little boy named William Kelly went into a store, and having bought some candy proceeded to eat it in front of his father's house. Suddenly he became black in the face, and the boy's mother rushed to his assistance and endeavored to remove the candy from his throat, where it was stuck fast, by slapping him on the back, but without avail. The little fellow, after suffering the most acute agony for some time, expired, being choked to death. The candy which choked the boy was manufactured from molasses, and is commonly called taffy.

THE Newcastle Advocate says: "The case against the Salvationists for making unusual noises, etc., in the streets of Chatham has been dismissed by Magistrate Murray. This is a victory for the Army, and one which will be of great benefit to them if it will force them to consider the amount of opposition the hearing of the big drum in the streets has created among the best sentiment of the community, and that its continuance is only creating a further hostility in public feeling and throwing more obstacles in the way of their success. Let the Salvationists celebrate their victory by moderating some of those practices to which the public are beginning to take objection."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Church Disestablishment.

LONDON, Oct. 19.

The Congress of Liberal Federation at Nottingham to-day resolved unanimously that when the first question was settled, the disestablishment of the Church in Wales should be made the leading point in the policy of the Liberal party.

The Chairman made a speech in which he declared that the Government's attempt on the liberty of the Irish people was not intended to end there. The Government, he said, meant to interfere with the liberties of Englishmen.

Resolutions heartily welcoming Gladstone, expressing confidence in his leadership, and declaring that the Congress anticipated an early settlement of the Irish question on the lines of the ex-Premier's policy, were unanimously carried amid tremendous cheering.

Rioting in London.

LONDON, Oct. 19.

This afternoon thousands of the unemployed gathered in Hyde Park, and finally sallied into the street, followed by a force of policemen. The crowd paraded the streets in the West End, and made riotous demonstration. In Berkeley Square the police charged upon and scattered the crowd.

The crowd again assembled and proceeded along Piccadilly, where the police once more attacked it and a sharp fight took place. Several persons were injured and many rioters were taken into custody.

The Cattle Market.

DUBLIN, Oct. 19.

At the Tuam Fair to-day thousands of cattle and sheep were offered for sale at ruinous figures. Despite the exceedingly low prices there were no purchasers. Large graziers declare they cannot continue business any longer, and must take advantage of the bankruptcy law.

A Good Move.

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.

At a meeting of the French Board of Trade to-day it was decided to send a delegate to Japan to investigate how a market for Canadian goods could be formed, and to develop a large trade between Yokohama and Montreal.

Henry Mason, editor and proprietor of the Trade Bulletin, was arrested to-day on a charge of criminal libel made by John B. Poeting, a customs officer. He was bailed.
