

President Of CMA Describes Objections To Medical Plan

The essential requirement for any compulsory medical health plan is its attraction for future doctors, Canadian Medical Association head Dr. R. O. Jones said when he addressed a luncheon gathering yesterday of delegates to the P.E.I. Medical Association annual convention.

Dr. Jones devoted almost his entire talk to the unfavorable aspects of the proposed medical plan for Canada.

His objections to the proposal as presently set up were in the three fields of its universality, compulsion and administration by a government agency. He said his profession was greatly concerned with the physician's and patient's right to give and receive medical care outside the plan without any loss of benefits.

He asked which was better, to use public funds to provide a high-quality service for those who are not able to pay for those of their own, or to provide a minimum service for everyone? He would submit that the provision of a minimum service for everyone is one of the reasons why the mental hospitals of this continent have fallen into disrepute.

He emphatically stated any plan should not gain merely grudging acceptance by this generation of health personnel, but should provide enough attractions to bring an ever-increasing number of the best young people into the field. However, it was not the financial field to which he referred as he had earlier stated there have

been no suggestions by responsible persons for any system of medical insurance which would do anything but improve the incomes of Canadian doctors.

This was not causing concern, it was the question of maintaining present high-quality service and improving that where there are admittedly poor areas and his insistence was on the principle that arrangements must be satisfactory to the recipient and supplier of medical services.

He specifically urged all provincial associations to bring

immediate attention of provincial governments. This is necessary, he said, in view of the immediately forthcoming meeting of provincial ministers of health to work out details of the plan. Dr. Jones remarked that though this meeting next month would be concerned with the way the services of the medical profession should be made available to the people of Canada doctors are not to be allowed to have representatives present.

Lois Raymond Bell of Murray River changed an earlier not guilty plea to one of guilty on a charge of driving while his license was suspended and was fined \$50 and costs or 15 days.

Alonso John Acorn of Peters Road, who earlier pleaded not guilty to using marked gasoline and also pleaded not guilty to displaying upon a vehicle a num-

ber plate not issued for such vehicle, had both charges against him adjourned to Sept. 8 to fix a date for hearing.

A charge of failing to walk on the left side of the highway against John Walter Livingstone of Brudenell was withdrawn by the Crown.

One person was fined \$20 and costs for being in an intoxicated condition in a public place, and five persons were each fined \$20 and costs for illegal possession of liquor.

P.E.I. Poultrymen Win Top Rating At Exhibition

Five firsts, three seconds and three thirds place groups were won by Island chickens in the egg competitions at this year's Canadian National Exhibition.

Entries from the Summerside Co-op won two of the first placings. Other first place groupings went to Fulton Cousins, Kensington, Rayners' Poultry Farm, Mr. Herbert and to B.B. Jones, Rimby.

Second place awards went to Mr. Jones, the Rayners and to Arnold Friends, Covehead and two thirds went to Friends.

The Island poultrymen scored five firsts out of 10 entries. There were 90 entries in all from Canada and 29 of them scored first so the Island showing is well above the Canadian average.

First places in groups are given for entries meriting that award. The same applies to second and third place groupings.

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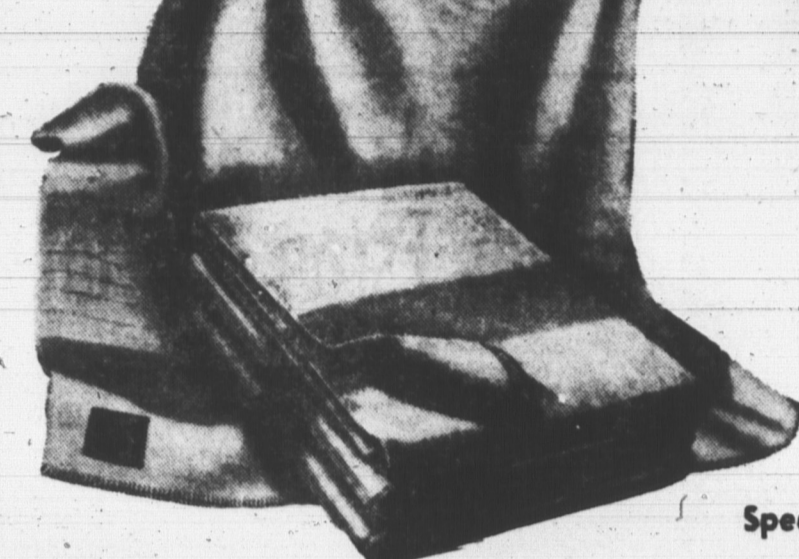
