BARRENTINE "Erema," MacMahon, to Peake Bros. & Co., with limestone, from Plymouth, arrived here the 21st inst.

DURING the month of June, there were shipped from Montreal to Britain 9,281 head of cattle, and 7,91 sheep.

LIQUOR LICENSES.—There have been 129 liquor licenses issued in St. John, N. B., since May 1st.

The Convention of the Y. M. C. A. will be held this year at Charlottetown, commencing on Thursday the 12th August next.

Two men named Laboute and German were drowned by the capsizing of a boat at Gattineau Point, Ont., on the 18th inst.

MRS. BULLOCK is said to have sold the patents of her late husband on all his printing press inventions to Hec & Co. for \$2,000,000.

HIS HONOR the Lieutenant Governor gave a ball at Government House last evening. We learn that it was well attended and exceedingly enjoyable.

The excursion to Murray Harbor and Picton on board the "Princess of Wales" was attended by two hundred and thirty-four persons. The steamer returned to the city at 4 o'clock this morning.

DR. TANNER continues his fast and is apparently showing no signs of weakness. He drinks a good deal of water, and his nutritive powers, thus proved, must be a source of pride to the cold water army.

EXTENSIVE preparations are being made in Montreal for a Dominion Exhibition, to be held in September. The city council has added six acres to the grounds, valued at \$10,000, and \$20,000 is to be distributed in prizes.

Two hundred and sixty-four thousand immigrants were landed in New York in the year ending June 30th, against ninety-nine thousand in the previous year. The total arrivals at all ports during June were 72,000.

A SUSPICIOUS looking youth was to-day discovered in a jewelry store, trying to sell an elegant silver mug. On seeing the police he made a speedy exit, and being pursued, dropped the mug. The officers held it at the station awaiting the claims of the owner.

One hundred and forty excursionists left by train to-day to attend the tea at Alberton. These were joined by over five hundred others at different stations along the line—one hundred and eighty leaving Summerside. The Tea Party was a success.

CONVICTION.—On the 20th inst., before James H. Bourke, J. P., Michael Stewart of Lafferty's Road, Lot 49, was convicted and fined in the sum of fifty cents for encroachment upon the public highway by fencing thereon.

THE Princess Louise, it is semi-officially announced, will embark at Quebec on the 31st inst. for a tour in England and Germany, for the purpose of restoring her health, which has been affected by the injuries received during the accident of last winter.

THE Toronto Globe of the 16th inst., says editorially: "Every true Canadian will rejoice with us at the favorable change which has appeared in the money market. Bank stocks, which for nearly two years have been falling in value, have now commenced to appreciate."

THE first god of the new Baptist College, to be erected on the University grounds in Toronto was turned, on the 15th inst., by the Hon. William McMaster, who, with his usual liberality, has donated a sum sufficient to erect a handsome structure which, with the ground, when finished will cost \$75,000.

THE HALIFAX SUGAR REFINERY.—The directory of the Halifax Sugar Refinery have decided upon issuing \$100,000 more stock, in addition to the original amount of \$300,000. Four calls have already been paid up, leaving a balance of 25 per cent., which is payable in August. The additional stock will probably be taken up by the present shareholders.—Times.

THE railway employees will hold their annual picnic at Beech Grove, Freetown, on Thursday, the 5th of August next. A meeting was held last evening, when the arrangements for the picnic were fully discussed. Mr. D. M. Fraser was appointed Chairman, Mr. John Braen, Treasurer, and G. A. Sharp, Secretary. Committees for the management of games, etc., were also appointed. Picnics heretofore held by the Railway employees were most enjoyable, and the coming one will doubtless be the best ever given on the line.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

HALIFAX, July 19.

The mercantile community were startled to-day by the announcement of the suspension of Robert Beak & Sons, West India merchants, of this city. The firm is composed of Messrs. John A. and E. B. Beak, President of the Legislative Council and a prominent bank director, and the business has been carried on by the father and sons for over a quarter of a century. Some three years ago, Hon. Robert Beak withdrew. The firm has met with heavy losses during the last few years, but it was thought that, having pulled through the critical period, they were all right now. They received news on Saturday night, of heavy losses on fish sent to the West Indies, and this morning decided to make an assignment to their father. The liabilities are stated to be \$220,000, the largest creditor being the Hon. Robert Beak who holds security on all the assets of the firm. About \$30,000 are scattered among the mercantile firms of the city.

NEW YORK, July 19.

John Gaffney was killed and two miners seriously injured on Saturday night by an explosion of gas in the steel pit at Harrisburg.

George Lee was shot dead by Chas. Ranales in a fight about a white woman in Chicago on Sunday morning. Both were negroes.

Mrs. Mary Frye, while insane, hanged her baby to a bedpost yesterday at Fort Madison, Iowa.

A despatch from Noank states that seven bodies were found in the hull of the Narragansett when at Oyster Bay and only one since its arrival at Noank. It will take three months to rebuild the Narragansett.

Fifty-three children died in 24 hours, ending at noon on Sunday, from summer complaints.

LOUISVILLE, July 16.

C. Davidson, a wealthy farmer, while drinking last night, drove Alex. Taylor out of a grocery store and shot him dead. He then fatally beat the negro with his gun, jumped into a buggy and drove off.

TOLEDO, O., July 19.

An excursion train from Toledo to Indianapolis, via Wabash railway, jumped the track near Knox's siding, Ohio, to-day. Five coaches were upset. Edward Stuart, of Noblesville, Indiana, was killed, and nine others were wounded. Cause—a broken rail. Among the fatally injured are Walter H. Rivers, Indianapolis, private secretary of Hon. W. R. English; John Mann, Westfield and Seward Hursh, Peru, Ind.

PITTSBURG, Penn., July 19.

Justice Hoffman, a German shoemaker, shot his wife and baby this evening, instantly killing the baby, and fatally wounding his wife. He was immediately arrested and there was strong talk of lynching him, but the police safely conveyed him to the county prison at Wikesbarre.

NEW YORK, July 19.

A fire involving a loss of \$300,000 occurred to-night in a block fronting on First Avenue, between Twenty nine and Thirtieth streets, owned by Herman Kohler, a brewer.

LONDON, July 19.

The agent of Lloyd's telegraphs the loss of an Austrian liner. The 'Hydaspes,' from London for Melbourne, with cargo and passengers, was run into on the afternoon of Saturday, during a fog, while in tow, three miles east of Dungeness, by the British steamer Centurion. The Hydaspes sank in a few minutes in 16 fathoms. The passengers and crew were saved and landed at Dover. Both the crew and passengers lost all their effects. The Centurion arrived at Gravesend with bows damaged. The Hydaspes was an iron ship of 2,093 tons gross register.

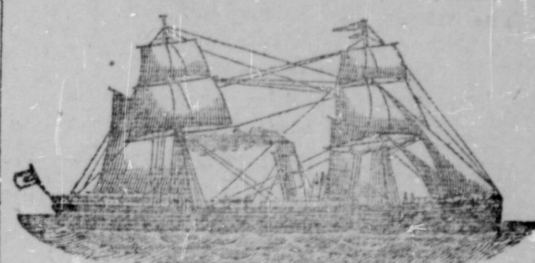

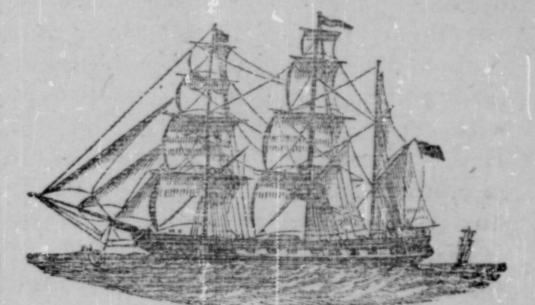
