An editor at Cape Town has been arrested charged with seditious and criminal libel for having stated that British troops had destroyed the houses of Boer women as punishment for their not disclosing the whereabouts of hidden arms. It is satisfactory to learn that even one of the army of liars in South Africa is to be punished.

The New York Tribune says that thorough search is being made among the ruins of the church of St. Spridon, in Missolonghi, for the urn in which Byron's heart was contained. The town was long ago destroyed by the Turks, and not until this year has an attempt been made to rebuild the church. If the famous urn can be found, the authorities wish to place it in a prominent position in the new church. It is thought unlikely, however, that it will be discovered.

A correspondent writes: "At the political meeting at Mount Stewart on Tuesday night, when S. C. Clarke, Esq., one of the Opposition candidates for the second district of King's, entered the hall, he was greeted with a perfect storm of applause, the cheering, in which not a few Liberals joined, lasting several minutes. The electors of the second district are to be congratulated on their choice of a candidate, and will return Mr. Clark and Mr. McIsaac by handsome majorities on the 12th December."

It need not be said that Lord Roberts can talk as well as fight. He is reported to have said at Durban: "When blessed peace is restored, you will tell the Boers we are one in one country, that we have one interest, and that we honor them. They have been fighting for a wrong cause, having been induced to do so by their misguided leaders. Nevertheless, we honor them for fighting for the liberty we ourselves so thoroughly believe in. And now, in the spirit of liberty, truth, justice and freedom, we are prepared to extend these privileges which every Englishman values to those who have been fighting against us." These words have the right ring.

CECIL RHODES, as the pacifier of South Africa, promises to be one of the realities of the near future in British Imperial affairs. It is reported that his scheme of concentration and pacification offers the belligerent Lutch terms of settlement so liberal that its author believes they would readily and gladly enrol themselves under the British flag in accordance with its provisions. Mr. Rhodes is now engaged in working out the details of his programme. He expects to have them completed in the course of a few weeks, when he will forward to England a draft of his scheme and ask Her Majesty's Ministers to make it the Government's policy in South Africa. It is likely that many people in all ranks and parties will join in the scheme.

COMMENTING upon the political situation, the Calgary Herald says: "The political leader of the future must discard the beating of tom-toms, and use instead the calculating, exact businesslike methods of the general manager of a railway. He must either reorganize or abolish the party's campaign literature. It costs thousands of dollars and probably never won a vote. The same amount of money spent in getting a good Conservative newspaper into every home in the country would accomplish a thousand-fold more." Many Conservatives think it a matter of indifference whether they read their own side of the case or not, and frequently they imbibe the unwarranted view which the other people are interested in impressing upon the public mind.

MR. JOHN POND has laid down the editorial pen. In the course of his farewell address to the readers of the Pioneer, Mr. Pond says: "We came to P. E. Island as a stranger, and we leave it with more and a better class of friends than we can hope to make in life again. It is a beautiful country and the people are the most hospitable, loyal and kindly of any amongst whom our varied lot has been cast. The farmers of P. E. Island especially have our true respect. Wherever we have gone in the country we have found the people all alike—hospitable to a degree, and, though far above the ordinary intelligence, just the kindly, every-day folks that it does one's heart good to meet and one's mind good to converse with."

This is pleasant reading. We should have been well pleased if the writer had remained among us. While he was a vigorous supporter of a very bad Government, his labors on behalf of agriculture were always beneficial to the Province.

Local and Other Items

—Look out for the defaulters list.

—Neither the Northumberland nor the Princess moved out today on account of the stormy weather.

—Four years more of corruption and extravagance if you don't vote out the Farquharson boodlers on Wednesday.

—It is expected that the manufacture of coke will begin at Sydney Mines about the first of March. —Sydney Record.

—No long speeches in the Lyceum tomorrow, but a pleasant spirited meeting, and cheering prospects for good results on election day.

—The funeral of the late Mr. John King will be held to-morrow (Tuesday) morning, leaving his late residence, Euston street, at 8.45.

—Come to the Lyceum tomorrow night (early) and spend a lively evening and brighten up for a solid day's work at the polls on Wednesday.

—A contract given by the Government to the Kingston Locomotive Co., for engines for the I. C. R. will keep five hundred men busy for a year.

—There will be a special midnight service in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at New Year similar to that of last year. There will be no midnight service at Christmas.

—Come to the polls early. Stand at your post till the last vote is in. If you work as you did in the various bye elections it will give a sweeping victory for the Opposition party.

—Citizens of Charlottetown, do you want to send two men to fill Opposition seats in the House. If not, send Dr. Jenkins and Mr. Paton to support the Hon. Mr. Gordon's incoming Government.

—The Benevolent Irish Society, of which Mr. Patrick McCarey was for years an active and valued member, turned out at the funeral on Saturday afternoon, leading the procession. The society presented a splendid appearance.

—At the services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday a pastoral letter was read from His Lordship Bishop Macdonald having a special bearing upon the advent of the twentieth century and the work of the church during the century that is about to close.

—The Nova Scotia Steel Co., are placing new machinery in their mines. The company will endeavor to raise at the least 300,000 tons of coal, which will be the largest output in the history of Sydney mines. Had the company secured enough labor this year the output would probably have reached this figure. Two hundred more men are needed in the pits this winter.

—In Nova Scotia the police sometimes find it difficult to arrest a man. Recently two of them went to Harrigan's Cove, Halifax County, to arrest a man for selling liquor without a license. They failed, because the man, his mother and the hired girl prevented them from entering the house, using pistols and cordwood. An attempt was made the next night with the same result. The man has not yet been captured.

—The funeral of Mrs. T. B. Riley was held this forenoon, and notwithstanding the stormy weather a great many mourning citizens followed the hearse to the Roman Catholic cemetery where the burial took place. The pall bearers were W. W. Clarke, Charles Lyons, S. A. McLeod, Alexander Macdonald, William Wyatt and J. J. Johnston. The mass of requiem at St. Dunstan's Cathedral was celebrated by Rev. J. E. Johnston, who also officiated at the grave. Some very handsome floral tributes were sent in by Captain T. G. and Mrs. Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Macdonald, Mrs. J. D. Mason and other friends of the family.
