

# L.A. Whips Giants 11-3; 15th Win For Drysdale

Los Angeles Dodgers handed four home runs Thursday, blasting San Francisco 11-3 and boosting their National League lead over the Giants to 1½ games.

Fireball right hander Don Drysdale became the first major league pitcher to win 15 games this season. He checked the Giants' power on eight hits as the Dodgers won their seventh straight game.

Drysdale struck out eight Giants, including Orlando Cepeda three times and Willie Mays twice. The hurler missed serious injury in the sixth game when he got his glove in front of his face just in time to knock down a line drive by Jimmy Davenport. He also made the loss for a forecourt.

Don Fairly triggered the firing against lefty Mike McCormick with a solo homer 370 feet to right in the second inning. Willie Davis hit one farther in the same direction with Maury Wills on base in the third. Tommy Davis slugged one 350 feet to left in the fifth and Frank Howard followed immediately with another in that direction, a 390-foot clout.

McCormick left for a plach-hitter in the fifth. Five of the

six runs off him were by homers.

The homers were the seventh for Fairly, 13th for Willie Davis.

Drysdale committed his fifth straight game, matching his record of 15-4 as the Dodgers won their fourth victory in five meetings with the Giants this year.

A crowd of 24,915 in sunny, windy Candlestick Park witnessed McCormick absorb his third defeat against four victories.

Right hander Jim Duffalo relieved in the sixth. The Dodgers added a pair of unearned tallies in the seventh after an error by second baseman Chuck Hiller but Willie Davis on base.

Two games were scheduled in the American League, both at night. Detroit was at Cleveland and Baltimore was at Chicago.

## Susman, Sukova Breeze Into Tourney Finals Tues.

WIMBLEDON, England (Reuters)—Karen Hanitz Suman, ranked No. 2 in the world, and unseeded Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia Thursday breezed into the final of the women's singles event at the all-England lawn tennis tournament.

Mrs. Suman, of Chula Vista, Calif., will meet Mrs. Sukova Saturday in the final. The men's singles final today pits top-seeded Rod Laver against a fellow Australian, unseeded Jimmy Mulligan.

Both the Sukova-Bueno and Suman-Hayden matches were marred by errors, with little in the play to stimulate centre court spectators on one of London's coldest days this century. The mercury hung in the mid-50s most of the afternoon.

Mrs. Sukova, who held second-seeded A. P. R. Hard of Montebello, Calif., and first champion Angela Mortimer of Britain to gain the semi-finals, threw her usual caustic and acid wind against the Brazilian.

The Czech's more daring game, marked by some spectacular passing shots, appeared to unsettle the Brazilian girl, who won the women's singles title here in 1959 and 1960—but was sidelined with jaundice last year.

Mrs. Suman's net game helped her regain a recent defeat by Miss Hayden in a Wimbledon Cup match.

The contracts are set and everything's ready to go," said McLellan.

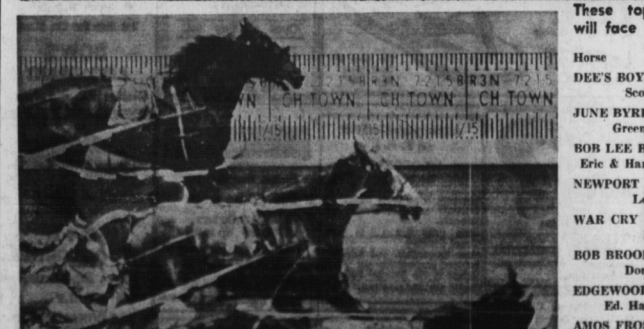
The fight has been approved by the Canadian Boxing Federation. McLellan announced that Greaves, a native of Edmonton, has been named a flat \$5,000 plus expenses for three.

The Emery-Richardson match was in Halifax last month.
