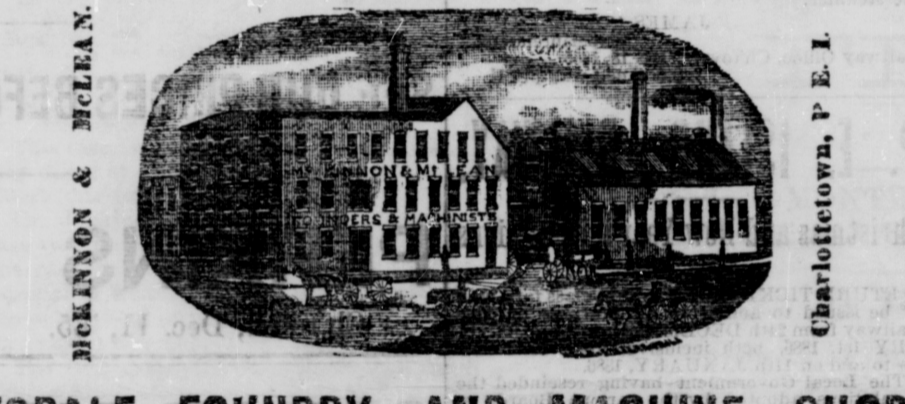

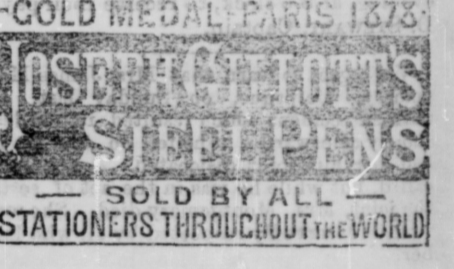

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has this day paid into the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island the sum of Two Hundred and Forty-seven Dollars, with six months' interest thereon, being a sum, in his opinion, a sufficient compensation for all that piece of land and premises, situate at Souris, in King's County, in said Island, which said land and premises are described as follows, that is to say: Commencing at a post set on Barr's Point, five chains and twenty-five links south, five degrees east from the centre of the road at the head of Souris' Breakwater, and fifty-one links north, eighty-two degrees east from the top edge of the bank, and running thence north eighty-two degrees, east eighty-five feet, thence at right angles south eight degrees, east forty-five feet, thence south eighty-two degrees, west eighty-five feet, thence north eight degrees, west forty-five feet to the place of commencement.
