EATON HERD CAPTURES MAJOR HONORS IN SHORTHORN CONTESTS

The herd of Cyrus Eaton from 3rd H. L. Boswell 4th Athol Road Deep Cove, N.S., took the lion's share of championship honors in yesterday's Shorthorn Show at the Provincial Exhibition. Their entry of seven cattle walked away with a grand championship, two reserve grands, three championships and one reserve championship. They were also the winner of the Rogers Hardware prize for the best junior champion female, to finish off with five firsts.

Mr. Athol Roberts of Southport was winner of the grand championship with his senior female "P.E.I. Teekaydee 4D" which is now a three time winner of this distinction in Charlottetown as well as having won twice at Amherst winter Fair. This cow was also champion in her class yesterday.

Mr. Roberts also had the reserve junior champion male and reserve champion female and was winner of the Cyrus Eaton prize of \$25 for the best beef type shorthorn owned and bred by a P.E.I. breeder.

The show was very close throughout and judge Trueman from Aulic, N.B., had a difficult time in making his selections. Speaking after the show he stated that in some instances he could have taken the animals from either end of the line-up and not be too far astray. Mr. Trueman was particularly impressed with the bull show which he termed the finest he had ever seen.

Dan Jewell from North River did pretty well for himself with a reserve championship which he won with "Chestnut Royal Drynie" a two year old bull. He took home, besides the reserve championship, a first, three seconds, a third and several other prizes.

H. Lyle Boswell, of Marshfield made a creditable showing in this last company by taking two firsts, five seconds, five thirds and two fourths as well as several others. Leigh Brown of New London had two entries and with these he took a second and a third prize. Mrs. Blake Wood of Southport took a third prize for her single entry in the Junior Male Yearling class.

FLYS UNDER BRIDGE

LONDON (Reuters)—A pilot tentatively identified as a tall, young and "thoroughly nice" American flew under London Bridge Wednesday as lunch hour crowds on the Thames embankment gaped.

The single-engine Auster sports plane from a private flying club zoomed beneath the bright pylons of Tower Bridge, 12 feet above crossing traffic, flew low over the river—which was at its highest level—and darted under the main span of London Bridge.

Holding Period On Potato Shipments

A ten-day holding period on all potatoes harvested becomes effective today and remains in operation until further notice. This announcement is made officially by Mr. W. P. MacLeod, District Inspector, Fruit and Vegetable Division in this issue.

The reason for the action is the threat of blight, due to continued wet weather. Mr. MacLeod states that shippers must consider the great damage that would occur to the potato industry should blight be found at destination points. It is felt that by precautionary measures now, the future will be safeguarded.

It was stated that potatoes already dug will be given consideration provided no blight can be found by the inspector, either in the field or in the tubers.

Mr. MacLeod recalls that the co-operation received last year during the holding period produced good results and many farmers have this year expressed their concurrence in this move to protect the industry as far as possible.

British Delegation To Visit Moscow

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain will send a parliamentary delegation to Moscow soon following an invitation from the head of the Soviet state, Marshal Kliment Voroshilov, it was learned Wednesday night.

The parliamentary delegation will visit the Soviet capital at the end of September or the beginning of October.
