

# Canada Soon Will Have Own Youth Peace Corps

A new service group, to be called the Company of Young Canadians, is on the threshold of organization in Canada.

The company was proposed in the speech from the Throne on April 5, which said in part that the establishment of a company of Young Canadians is one through which energies and talents of youth can be enlisted in projects for economic and social development both in Canada and abroad.

Assistant Secretary Stewart Goodings, Ottawa, said yesterday that the company will seek projects of social, economic and cultural development at home and abroad in which young people may help to build a more just and democratic society by concrete and meaningful involvement with other people.

"When formed, the Company of Young Canadians will seek opportunities for action through the fullest possible co-operation with government departments, voluntary organizations, youth movements, universities, and other agencies. While the company intends to help existing programs, it will also look for new ways to undertake social action projects," said Mr. Goodings.

variety of projects — from teaching retarded and culturally deprived children to searching for the elimination of poverty and inequality in urban slums. It will seek effective ways for working with Indian and Eskimo communities, and will enlist the skills of young Canadians in many different forms of community development work.

An organizing committee has been established by Prime Minister Pearson to recommend how the company should operate and how young Canadians can most effectively participate in its work. Its report will be completed by early fall and the company is expected to be fully launched by the end of this year. Recruiting will take place during the winter months, with the initial projects beginning next spring.

Almost any Canadian who has a genuine desire to give his community or country in some useful and challenging way will be welcomed in the Company of Young Canadians. There will be no rigid age restrictions and Canadians of all sorts of educational and occupational backgrounds will be able to participate. Volunteers will be required to pass a selection of process before taking part in training programs appropriate to each project.

## Inquest Jury Named In Death At Clermont

SUMMERSIDE — Donald Francis Cameron, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Everett Cameron of Summerside, died in Prince County Hospital Tuesday night following an automobile accident at Clermont earlier that afternoon.

The youth was a passenger in a late model 1954 Buick driven by Robert Boyd MacDonald, 16 of Summerside, which went out of control and rolled on a dirt road at approximately 3 p.m. The car was extensively damaged.

The deceased was attended at the scene by Dr. L.K. Zielinski, then transferred to Prince County Hospital by ambulance from Compton's Funeral Home. Later he was attended at the hospital by Dr. J.K. Beer. It is understood plans had been made to have him transferred to Halifax, but he died before the transfer could be made.

The body was taken to Charlottetown early this morning for autopsy by an ambulance from the Bonness Funeral Home. An inquest will be held later.

Coroner is Dr. C.A. Coady of Charlottetown. A jury was picked in Charlottetown.

Surviving the deceased along with his parents are four sisters and three brothers — Anne, 14, Valerie, 12, Arlene, 11, Teresa, 9, Michael, 7, George, 4, and Robert, 3.

## P.E.I. Captures Team Rifle Shoot

CONNAUGHT RANGES, SOUTH MARCH, Ont. — Island marksmen continue to make their presence felt among more than 600 riflemen across Canada as the Dominion Rifle Association's annual prize meet here moves into the third day of competition.

High point of P.E.I. shooting Tuesday came when a four-man team captured the Barlow team match with a comfortable 10 point margin. The Islanders registered 191 out of a possible 200 points.

Individual scores were: Capt. Roy McCabe, 50; Lieut. George Rogers 48; Lieut. Ralph Jenkins, 47; and Lieut. Al Mutch 46.

# Shaw Views Meetings With Much Interest

Premier Walter R. Shaw, due to previous commitments, was unable to attend this year's conference of Canadian Premiers being held this week in Ottawa, but is following this week's discussions with a great deal of interest.

Also missing from the conference was Newfoundland's Joey Smallwood.

The premier said he was particularly interested in the conference discussions on education and said he agreed with the premiers that a uniform standard for university entrance among the provinces was desirable. He said "I don't think, however, that completely uniform standards can be achieved as conditions vary in the provinces but the move toward more uniform standards is one with which I am sympathetic."

Commenting on conference discussions of portable pension plans, Premier Shaw said "each province is making a careful study of this proposal, working out any difficulties that may exist in the way of a flexible and easily administered plan. Such a plan is under study in this province and I believe in September a meeting of federal and provincial officials will be held to iron out difficulties that may exist."

Regarding conference discussions on cultural exchanges among the provinces, Premier Shaw said "this is something I have been emphasizing right along. The provinces should be coming closer together in exchanging cultural events such as music and drama so that all of us would be more familiar with the cultural background of each province. By an exchange of ideas and cultural life we should come to a more complete understanding of each other's heritage and background."
