Any time is a good time to have a holiday by car, chasing the cooler spots in the summer and the warmer spots in the winter.

Yanks End Chisox Streak

The New York Yankees wove their inevitable spell over the Chicago White Sox Thursday, 10-3 uncorking a six-run fourth inning to back White Ford to his sixth victory and end a six-game pale hose victory streak.

It was the only day game scheduled for the major league, but five nighters were on tap.

It was the season's sixth complete game in six starts for Ford, who gave eight hits.

who made the most of 12 hits and weak support which plagued five Sox pitchers, thus inflicted Chicago's first home defeat, in six Comiskey Park games. The loss, charged to starter Jack Harshman (now 1-2), left the third-spot Chisox 2½ games behind the Yanks, who remain in Chicago for a Friday night game and a Saturday matinee.

The first run in New York's third straight conquest of the pale hose this season came in the second as Yogi Berra led off a three-tally frame with his No. 11 homer of the season.

Yankee shortstop Phill Rizzuto made three throwing errors, two of them accounting for all three unearned runs. But the veteran Scooter got three singles and drove across two runs.

However, the White Sox were much more tense collectively, both

field and at bat, where they wasted virtually all of their eight hits.

NEW YORK (AP) — Crafty Warren Spahn, winning his third straight, tossed in an eight-inning effort while not walking a man Thursday night as the Milwaukee Braves thumped the New York Giants 7-3 to bolster their slim National League lead.

Spahn, who has lost only one this season in his four decisions, gave up a run in the third but kept the Giants' hits well scattered until the ninth when Willie Mays doubled and Don Mueller sent his second home run of the year smashing against the facade in right field.

The third-inning run by the Giants—on a single by Ray Katt, a sacrifice and Al Dark's single—snapped the 35-year-old southpaw's shutout string at 21 2-3 innings while he hung up his 186th major league victory, tops among active National League hurlers.

The Braves, snapping a two-game losing streak, swung for 10 hits while packaging the victory in a four-run seventh that chased starter Ruben Gomez to his second defeat in three decisions.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The second place St. Louis Cardinals kept pace just behind Milwaukee Thursday night with a 5-4 victory over Philadelphia and former Cardinal pitcher Harvey Haddix despite a ninth inning Phillies rally.

power at the plate. The third baseman banged out a home run in the sixth, a double in the eighth to break a 2-2 tie and a single in the ninth. His blows brought in three runs.

But the Phillies rebounded in the ninth for two runs. Willie Jones came home on Frank Baumholtz's fly ball after Jones had been moved to third on Jim Greengrass's single and Marv Blaylock came in from second on Richie Ashburn's single.

It was the first appearance for Haddix, traded last week to the Phils, against his former teammates. The southpaw was lifted, with credit for 71-3 innings, and was replaced by righthander Ron Negray.

Haddix scored the Phillies' first run, however. His double to the left field wall in the second inning scored Jones from second.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Catcher Hobie Landrith drove in three runs to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 4-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday. Pitcher Russ Meyer of the Cubs gave up only four hits until the ninth when he allowed two singles but Turk Lown came on to retire the last two Pirates on an outfield fly and an infield out.

The victory ended a four-game losing streak for the last place Cubs. It also snapped a four-game winning streak for the Pirates.

The only run off Meyer, winning his first game against one defeat, came in the seventh inning when

Frank Thomas doubled and came home on Lee Walls' single. In the eighth inning an error and a walk got Meyer in trouble with two out, but he struck out first baseman Dale Long and thereby snapped Long's nine-game hitting streak.

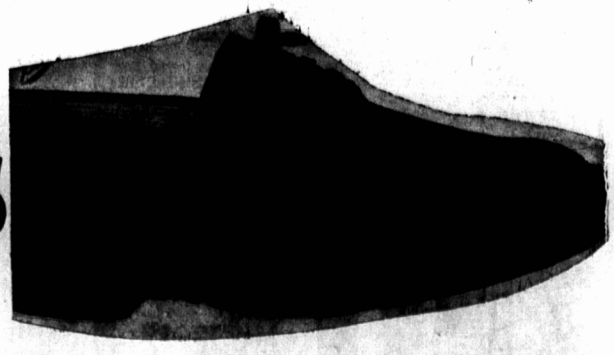
