

The Debats thus sums up what has been doing lately in France:—The National Garde Mobile has been organized; the whole of the army has been armed with Chassepots which have no reason to dread a comparison with the Zandnoddeggewhr; the fortresses on the eastern frontier have been put into a thorough state of repair; and, in order to dispel any apprehension, it is announced that this year five camps are to be formed simultaneously. In short, France is prepared for any contingency, and the Power which assumes an aggressive attitude will be very ill-advised.

The Ottawa Times says that John O'Farrell, a well known Quebec lawyer, declares that there is no evidence to convict Whalen, and that, if he had an Upper Canada diploma, as barrister, he could clear him. The Times further says the Quebec Fenian sympathisers are about to raise a subscription for Whalen's defence, and funds to purchase O'Farrell's diploma.

The Montreal News says:—We are requested to state that an authorized edition of the 'Poetical Remains of the late Hon. Mr. McGee,' edited by Mrs. Sadler, of New York, will shortly issue from the press of Mr. John Lovell. The proceeds which may be derived from the sale of this edition will be appropriated to the use of the deceased statesman's family.

It is stated in some of the papers that a Mr. Brega, from Washington, is in Ottawa, with the view of bringing about a renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty. We sincerely hope that these preliminary negotiations may be so successful, as to speedily place the matter in the hands of the Imperial and American Authorities for final action.

The P. E. Island Steamboat Company have purchased a large steamer called the General Whiting, for service in the Gulf. Some of the officers of the Company are now in St. John for the purpose of accompanying the steamer round to Charlottetown.

The officers of the Volunteer Militia force of Queen's County propose giving a farewell dinner to Colonel Smith, the Inspecting Field Officer of Militia, previous to his departure for England to rejoin his Regiment (the 4th) in June.

Mr. WALLACE McLEOD has been appointed assistant Postmaster General, vacant by the death of the late E. F. Byrne, and Mr. Daniel McDonald, of East Point, has been appointed junior assistant in the Post Office.

Her Majesty the Queen has sent an autograph letter to Mrs. McGee, sympathising with her in her bereavement, and expressing a high opinion of Mr. McGee's services to the Throne.

By our latest despatches it will be seen that the scoundrel O'Farrell, who attempted to assassinate H. R. H. Prince Alfred, was executed at Sydney, on the 22nd of April.

The Dominion Parliament was prorogued on the 22nd inst. The Bill to reduce the Governor General's Salary, was reserved for the consideration of Her Majesty the Queen.

Mr. POPE HENNESSY, Governor of Labuan, is mentioned as a probable successor to the late Sir Dominick Daly, in the vacant Governorship of South Australia.

The Sandwich Islands have been terribly convulsed by volcanic eruptions in the Island of Wawai. Several lives were lost and much property destroyed thereby.

The Steam Navigation Company of this Island, have purchased the Steamer General Whiting, which was one of the blockade runners during the American war.

There has been an immense loss of shipping, and of human life around the Newfoundland and Labrador coasts during the past winter.

An English Mail, with dates to the 10th inst., was received at the General Post Office, Charlottetown, on Friday evening.

The barque Constance, from Liverpool, with a general cargo of merchandize, arrived at this port on Friday morning.

The United States Senate voted yesterday, on the second and third articles of Impeachment, and acquitted the President—the vote standing 19 to 35.

YESTERDAY afternoon, the office of the Hon. J. C. Pope was robbed of a cash box, containing about £12. Verily, Charlottetown is progressing!

About one hundred and fifty young girls received their first Communion at the Convent, on Monday morning last. The Very Rev. Dr. McDonald officiated.

The Prussian Diet was closed by the King, on the 25th inst. A general disarmament in Europe is recommended by England and Austria.

An extensive Copper Mine is being worked in Charlotte County, New Brunswick.

The mortality in Peru during the month of April has been fearful, owing to the general prevalence of fever. The Canadians are anticipating another Fenian raid this summer.

The Sackville, N. B., Borderer says the herring fishery in the Gulf has been very successful this season.

The steamship Alhambra, from Boston and Halifax, arrived at this port last night.

The ship Clara Novella, from Liverpool, G. B., with a general cargo of merchandize, arrived this morning. Jeff. Davies, and other prominent Southerners, are to spend this summer in Halifax.

Some two hundred and fifty persons were confirmed, and received first communion yesterday, at the Cathedral from His Grace the Archbishop. In the course of an eloquent and instructive discourse His Grace exhorted the boys to become members of the Juvenile Temperance Society, and to resolve to abstain from the use of spirituous liquors until their twenty-first year. After Vespers nearly all the boys took the pledge; and have thus from early youth resolved to avoid the source of so much evil.—Hr. Express.
