FAST TRAVELLING.—Road masters of the United States and Canada who have been holding a convention in Detroit made a flying trip over the Michigan Central Railway on the 11th. The train consisted of five cars, and made the run to St. Thomas, 111 miles, in 114 minutes, including one stop.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

News From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14. Sir Ambrose Shea arrived last evening, and will impress on the Government the necessity of tapping the Bahamas by a Canadian steamship line. He is enthusiastic in his description of the enterprise of his colony. Among the new schemes lately decided being a local steam connection between the islands and a cable to Florida. Baden Powell is announced as coming here in connection with the Behring Sea matter, but the Government have no knowledge or instructions to that effect. The announcement that Dryden has been appointed Minister of Agriculture, Harcourt Provincial Treasurer, and Bronson Minister without a portfolio, is causing considerable murmuring among the Ottawa Grits. It was considered certain that Ottawa members for Lowertown should get the Provincial Treasurership, but despite the large majority which he obtained in two wards of the city, it is quite evident that Mr. Mowatt would not risk an appointment involving the necessity of an election here.

The Southampton Strike.

SOUTHAMPTON, Sept. 14. Journeymen trimmers and boys employed in the dockyards now demand an increase of wages. The seamen and firemen support them, and decline to return to work unless the demand is granted. The employers decided to resist the desired increase, and will lock out the dockmen unless the others continue at work.

SOUTHAMPTON, Sept. 15.

All the dock companies have decided on a general lock out until further notice. This has caused much irritation. The strikers have received only half a crown to four shillings strike pay, instead of half a guinea which they expected. Many were so angry at receiving the smaller amount that they destroyed their tickets.

Methodist Conference.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13. This morning was given to committees, upon one or other of which every member of the Conference found himself placed. In the hands of the committees the real work will be prepared for Conference action this afternoon. The eastern section delegates from Newfoundland, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, held a meeting to consult as to what action they should take in reference to University Federation. This is felt to be the most important matter upon which legislation will be taken, and as it will influence the educational institutions in the Maritime Provinces, no little anxiety is manifested. It was decided to await the finding of the educational committee.
