The semi-annual meeting of the Provincial Girl Guides Association was held in the Clover Club yesterday afternoon and was well attended. The Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. F. G. Hutcheson presided.

A financial report was given by Mrs. D. M. MacGuire, chairman of the financial committee in which she outlined the Raisin Day results showing a net profit of \$759.42.

Miss Suzanne MacKinnon, Provincial Camp Adviser, gave a splendid picture of the camps held at Fernwood and North Rustico last summer. 124 girls attended these camps.

There was an exchange of Guides with New Brunswick when two patrol leaders, Freda MacCallum and Dawn Messer, were privileged to attend a camp at Grand Lake, N. B. Miss Lucille MacQuaid, a Summerside Guide, attended a Girl Scout camp in Florida and had the unique experience of being an American camp counsellor.

Mrs. F. G. Hutcheson reported on the annual meeting of the Dominion Guide Association which was held in Toronto last May. The report appears elsewhere in this paper.

Miss Lucille MacQuaid, guest speaker, gave a report of her experience as a camp counsellor at Camp Chownowen, Jacksonville, Florida. One of the points stressed by the speaker was the large number of married women in the United States who devote considerable time to girl scouting and particularly its camping program.

Experiences were varied and exciting and the days were filled with well rounded programs including hikes, tent work, outdoor cooking, swimming and boating. Overnight hikes were looked forward to with anticipation by all campers.

A vote of thanks to the guest speaker and hospitality committee was moved by Miss Iphigene Arsenault and seconded by Mrs. E. M. Bagnall.

PROVINCIAL COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

Following is the report of the Provincial Commissioner Mrs. F. G. Hutcheson:

Forty years of Guiding in Canada was highlighted at the Canadian Council Girl Guides Association annual meeting in Toronto from May 19-23, 1950.

The first day was devoted to Provincial Commissioners meeting with the Chief Commissioner, Mrs. Wishart whom we all remember so well since our meeting with her in October last year, and her inspiring talk at our last semi-annual meeting.

The day's discussions were of invaluable help to us all, as many problems which we thought peculiar to our own province were the same ones bothering others as well; with a feeling of oneness we talked over and in some cases solved our difficulties.

Saturday morning we had an open discussion on "Training new Guides and Guiders with some experience in Rural and Urban areas" led by Mrs. H. R. Howden of Toronto. Many helpful ideas were put forth at this time.

Sunday afternoon a panel discussion on "How we can help our Guiders teach a Guide's duty to God" was very thought-provoking. The Guide law is the practical example in company life and in this workaday world of ours; let me emphasize that no theoretical Guide law can take the place of the example shown by the ex-cutive members, the council members, and the Guiders all of whom should always be conscious that the Guide law is a definite way of life and an expression of practical Christian and Democratic living.

Sunday evening a "Guide's Own" led by Mrs. Ratcliffe continued the theme of thoughtful living on our Sabbath day at St. Hill's College.

Monday was devoted in the morning to a business session and in the afternoon to an open session of the annual meeting, where reports were heard from each of our provincial commissioners as well as affiliated and co-operating societies. Following these reports Mrs. Wishart presented awards to several members of the Guide family, and she, in turn was presented with the Silver Fish by Mrs. Nesbitt, Deputy Chief Commissioner. This is the highest possible award for good service to Guiding. Mrs. Wishart's complete surprise was very obvious and she was quite speechless for a few moments. I think everyone felt her service to Guiding has been of a very high order and we all had a feeling of gratification for the honor bestowed upon her.

Miss Beth Riddoch, Diploma'd Guider and Field Secretary for Alberta was the main speaker at the meeting, her subject being "Guiding in Yukon and Northwest Territories." She and the Field Secretary for Boy Scouts in Alberta had made the trip to the Yukon and Northwest Territories by plane earlier in the year. Mr. George MacMillan, of Cornwall, with only a couple of entries, placed tenth in the senior yearlings in milk class.

Jester's Standard Dreamer, Grand Champion and senior champion male at the Provincial Exhibition last August, placed second in the two year old class for Mr. Mutch. The bull's full sister, River North Jesters Maid, won second place honors in the three year old class. Mr. Mutch had a fourth placing in the aged bull class with Jesters Standard Lloyd who was reserve grand champion at Charlottetown last August.

River North calves won fifth and twelfth placing in the junior bull class of fourteen entries. Mr. Mutch won a fourth in the senior bull calves in a class of twelve and seventh in the junior yearlings.

He had a sixth placing in a class of thirty junior heifers and a sixth and a ninth in senior yearling heifers. He also placed ninth in the junior get-of-sire. The Jersey judging will be completed today.
