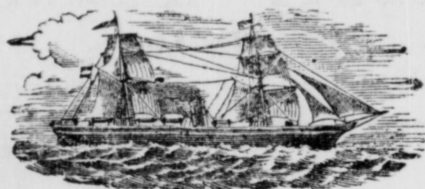

**THE INDIAN UPRISING.**

Village Captured and Buildings Destroyed.

Afridis Driven Back With Heavy Loss.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—A special from Simla says that the Daulatzi tribe of Afridis near Kohat descended from the hills in strong force during Thursday night and attacked and captured the village of Ublan setting fire to the buildings nearly all of which were destroyed.

General Biggs commanding the forces at Kohat, having heard of the Afridis plans prepared a force and went out on Friday morning and attacked the enemy. After sharp fighting the Afridis were driven back to the hill with heavy losses. The British loss consisted of one Sepoy killed and a native officer and two Sepoys wounded.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—In an interview General Sir Robert Gow who commanded the Chitral relief expedition says the British have plenty of men to quickly recapture the Khyber Pass but a delay for three weeks will be wise till the climate becomes healthier.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—2nd Queen's County P. E. Island Battalion of Infantry, Lieut. Col. Francis Dougherty is retired and permitted to retain the rank of Captain, and Brevet Major Eliah Purdy is retired and permitted to retain the rank of Major on retirement 28th July 1897. Paymaster and Honorary Major John McPhail is retired with rank.

**LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL**

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 26.—Steamer Topeka, returned from Alaska, reports that one man has cleaned up \$100,000 and another 50,000 at Klondyke. Three tons of gold are expected by the next steamer.

TORONTO, Aug. 26.—"The affair is some what serious one, and as sad as it is serious." Such was the opinion expressed by Sir Geo. Scott Robertson, defender of Chitral, who is now in Toronto attending the meeting of the British Association. Sir George expressed the belief that the uprising was due to a general outburst of fanaticism, and continued: "This is not a rebellion. Afridis and Swatis are both independent tribes, over which England has not even a protectorate. They dwell beyond the Indian frontier, and we never pretended in the least to dictate to them. The Afridis are subsidized by the English to keep the Khyber pass open and are generally treated well. That is the extent of our dealing with them. The Swatis are similarly situated with regard to the English."

DUBLIN, August 26.—The Irish National Federation held a meeting in this city yesterday, at which John Dillon, M. P., presided. A resolution was adopted which after expressing deep disappointment that the rumors that amnesty would be granted to the Irish political prisoners had proven false, said that on the strength of these rumors the Irish had been appealed to abstain from making demonstrations of their feelings of detestation of English rule during the visit to Ireland of the Duke of York. While the Federation did not desire that personal discourtesy should be shown a stranger who was on a professedly non-political visit to the country, it was impossible to share in honoring the representative of a power which, while preaching humanity to foreign powers, cruelly and venally retains the Irish political prisoners in dungeons for years after humanity and statesmanship ought to have prompted their release. It may be pointed out in connection with the above resolution that there has been no official appeal to the Irish to abstain from showing their animosity to the British government during the Duke's visit.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 26.—There was no food in Camp Isolation at slum Creek for the strikers' breakfast for the first time since the camp was inaugurated. The absence of provisions was due to a break in the arrangements. Dinner was served in the camp as usual. Camp Isolation is in a very quiet state. Both sides are confident and awaiting developments. The men at Center were out at an early hour doing active missionary work. The deputies were not taken out to the Cross roads at 4 a. m. as usual, and the road was left completely unguarded. Supt Samuel De Armit said they did not need to stop the marches any longer. The deputies would hereafter be used only to guard the property of the company.

**ORIGIN OF THE POSTER.**

A young artist, says the New York Journal, whose tendency toward open air effects was so strong that he always wore his shirt open at the neck, and painted a landscape that for fidelity to nature was almost as good as a photograph. It was a thing anyone could admire, which proved its great commercial value.

Unfortunately as the artist turned to wipe his brushes, an aged cow, dissatisfied with her faithful representation in the picture, switched her tail across the canvas, utterly commingling the colors. The artist was about to commit suicide when a friend approached him. Gazing at the the canvas, the latter opened wide his eyes. Then he placed his hand solemnly on the artist's shoulder.

"My boy," he said, "it's the hit of your life."

The friend was a heavy advertiser, and thus the poster came into being.—Oakland Printer.
