

Stars Score In Ninth To Edge Dodgers 2-1

The City Baseball League play-offs stand even-to-even today following Michael's Stars 2-1 victory over Barbour's Dodgers in Memorial Field yesterday afternoon.

The younger Stars won the game in the last on the ninth with Bill Purcell scoring an unearned run as the result of three Dodger errors—the losers only errors of the ball game.

It was a heart-breaking loss for Dodgers pitcher Phil Murphy who allowed only three singles over the nine inning route. Don "Duck" MacLeod, who relieved Lorne MacDougall, at the start of the ninth inning, was the winning pitcher.

But it was MacDougall who kept the big bats of the Dodgers in check throughout the afternoon. He relieved the first old Roger MacLeod in the first inning with the bases loaded and two out. He got Charlie Ryan on a grounder and then held the intermediates scoreless for seven complete innings.

The best of three series is tied one-one. The Dodgers won the opening game a week ago.

The intermediates were the first team at bat and lead-off man Gus Flynn scored the only run. He drew a walk, reached second as Phil Venot was safe on an error. Flynn raced to third when Jack Ready grounded to the infield. A walk to Elmer MacNeill loaded the bases and another walk to Eddy Lund forced in Flynn.

At this point, manager Tom MacFarlane called in MacDougall from the bullpen and the young right-hander came through with a Joe Black like relief performance. Starter Roger MacLeod moved to left field, replacing Brian MacCallum.

From then on it was a battle between pitchers Murphy and MacDougall. Murphy surrendered three singles, walked four and struck out eight while MacDougall gave up five hits, struck out seven and walked three.

The Stars tied the game up in the sixth inning. Kenny MacDonall drew a walk and went to second on Kip Ready's bent single. Duck MacLeod was passed intentionally loading the bases. Second later MacDonall scored on a passed ball.

Murphy fanned LeClair and forced Gillis to ground out to end the rally.

The Dodgers started getting to MacDougall in the seventh and eighth innings but two sparkling double plays got him out of trouble.

In the seventh inning Flynn led off with a walk. Phil Venot then smashed a hot grounder down to second but Smell Gillis gloved the ball, stepped on second and threw to first for the twin-killing.

Elmer MacNeill batted a solid single into right field to lead off

the Dodgers eighth. Eddy Lund smashed a pitch deep into center field but Kenny MacDonall raced back for the catch and threw to Kip Ready at first doubling MacNeill off the base.

The Dodgers got their lead-off man on base again in the ninth. This time Murphy reached first as Kip Ready took his foot off the bag before receiving the throw. Murphy stole second but was caught off the sack in a smart Don MacLeod to Purcell play.

The Dodgers defences cracked in the last of the ninth. Purcell of the Stars reached base when Eddy Lund dropped Harold Pineau's low throw. LeClair got to first and Purcell to third as Murphy threw wild to first. Eddy Lund, making a fine stop on the heave, injured his ankle, but was able to continue pitching.

Then the Dodgers trapped Purcell off third. They tossed the ball Ryan erred on a throw and Purcell scampered across the plate with the game winning run.

Second baseman Gus Flynn came up with the game's most spectacular defensive effort. Duck MacLeod drilled a hot grounder to the hole at second in the eighth inning. Flynn racing to his right, got the ball with a back-hand stab and threw to first for the out.

Marlene Stewart Wins Canadian Open Title

BRIGHTWOOD GOLF CLUB, N. S. (CP)—Stroking smoothly and wearing her trademark—a gay tartan cap—Marlene Stewart won her second Canadian women's open golf title here Saturday, but she still doesn't like the country.

While the win didn't give her as much of a thrill as her first Open win in 1951, she said she would always remember "this terrible tough course."

It was the second Canadian grand slam for the former Ontario star who won her fourth successive close title last week. She has held the Canadian women's close crown since 1951.

In winning Saturday she defeated Mary Gay of Kitchener and 8 in the final. Her opponent built up a commanding lead in the first nine holes, of which she won seven and lost one for a six hole edge. She was never pressed.

At the end of 18 holes she was eight up and added another point in the final ten holes, winning three long two and halving five.

EASY PATH FOR MARLENE
Little Marlene advanced with ease to the finals defeating Mrs. David B. Collison of Vancouver, Roma Neundorf, Scarborough, Rae Milligan, Jasper and Mrs. Maurice Glick of Baltimore.

Mary Gay didn't have it so easy. In fact the pretty 22-year-old was forced into extra holes of three or her four matches. Her semi-final 21-hole marathon with Barbara Brunning of Armonk, N. Y., was the best of the five-day play-off.

Defeated Mrs. E. M. Hodson of Hull, Que., Mrs. J. H. McCarter, Toronto and Shirley Fry, Victoria. The last two were 19-hole affairs.

For Mary it was her second loss in the open both by 9 and 8 scores. She lost to Edegar Anderson, Heloisa Montana, in 1952. She has been runner-up to Marlene twice in the close tournament but Saturday was the first time the two had met in an actual match.

Marlene called Mary "a wonderful player." She could easily have won if she'd been at her best.

It was apparent right from the outset that the uphill battle of the finals had taken the best out of the Kitchener girl. She looked visibly tired even before the final match started.

B.C. Wins Willingdon Cup; Gray Leads Maritimers

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—British Columbia's golfers, paying no more attention to a steady down-pour of rain than to an over-charged dew-fall blown in off the Pacific, won the Willingdon Cup interprovincial team championship Saturday with an aggregate medal score of 582.

Despite desperate bids by Quebec and Ontario, the west coast four-man team proved the most consistent and led the eight-team parade at every nine-hole check-off station in the 6-hole medal-play match. They took the cup for the sixth time in the 22 years it has been up for competition.

Quebec squeezed in ahead of Ontario for second place with 595 to the defending Ontario team's 598. The others were well back. Manitoba finished with 621, Alberta 633, the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island combination 638, Nova Scotia 638 and Saskatchewan 652.

Tall Doug Bajus, pride of the Point Grey club in Vancouver where he won low amateur honors in the Canadian open a month ago, had the best score of the day with 143, three over par for 36 holes.

Hamilton Man Wins Gold Medal At D.C.R.A. Shoot

SOUTH AFRICA, Ont. (CP)—A 45-year-old Hamilton marksman Saturday carried off the coveted governor-general's gold medal for the third time at the finish of the 86th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

Cms. Norman L. Beckett, a member of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry who has been competing on these ranges near Ottawa year after year, posted a score of 194 of a possible 200 to lead the field of 300 competitors.

Tied for second place carrying 192s were Lt.-Col. D. A. G. Horton-Smith of the British rifle team and RCMP Constable B. M. Anderson of Winnipeg.

CSM Beckett captured the gold medal in 1939 and, despite the fact that he was refused enlistment during the Second World War because of poor eyesight, came back to win again in 1947.

Saturday he carded a 49 of a possible 50 in 10 rounds from the 300-yard range, a 72 of a possible 75 firing 15 rounds from the 600 yards, and 73 of a possible 75 firing 15 rounds from 900 yards.

American Tennis Stars Win Trophy

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—American senior tennis stars Saturday wrapped up their sixth consecutive victory in the Gordon trophy competition with Canada by winning three of the four matches.

That made the final count 7-1 following a U. S. sweep of Friday's four matches. The Canadians never have won the cup, emblematic of supremacy in senior men's tennis between the two countries.

Canada's only break in American mastery came when Ray Summers of Toronto defeated John Sison of Los Angeles, 6-2, 6-3, in the top-rated singles match of the day.

In the other singles Harold Fields of Jamaica, N. Y., downed Ben Freedhoff of Toronto, 6-2, 6-2. Edward Chandler and Gerald Striford of San Francisco took their doubles seat from Summers and Bob Bernard of Oakville, Ont., 6-2, 6-1. Monte Ganger of Cleveland and Mel Gallagher of Los Angeles defeated Jack Aikman and Henry Johnson, Montreal 7-5, 6-3.

The defeat of Sison was the fourth match dropped by the Americans in the six-year history of the competition.
