TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, May 21. The steamer Ganos, from Mantanzas for Boston, with sugar, collided last evening in a thick fog, 20 miles east of Boston light, with the steamer Pembroke, of the Warren Line, for Liverpool, and the former sank in forty fathoms of water and is a total loss.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, May 22. At a private meeting organized by Irreconcilables, to protest against the sentence of Healy Helfmann, after a number of inflammatory speeches resolutions were passed censuring the acts of Russia, and blaming France for crushing the right of asylum, and hoping that the revolutionists in Russia would triumph.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 21. The Governor General of Charkoff has issued a proclamation forbidding the persecution of Jews and stating that the Jews, equally with all other faithful subjects of the Czar, are under protection of the law.

LONDON, May 23. The Standard's despatch from Durban says the Boers have defeated the Kaffirs. They lost 70 men killed.

A Constantinople despatch says: Abdul Bey, the ex-Chief of the Albanian League, has been court-martialed and condemned to death.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, May 21. The Commissioners appointed to discuss the new treaty with France are Messrs. Rivers, Wilson and Kennedy.

DUBLIN, May 21. The priest, Father Sheehy, arrested at Killmallock, under the coercion act, has been a prominent member of the Land League since its foundation, and was one of its original organizers, having attended its first meeting in this city.

Father Sheehy and his fellow prisoners, arrested yesterday, were conveyed to Naas jail under a strong escort.

NEW YORK, May 21. A London despatch says that the debate in the House of Commons on Father Sheehy's arrest continued till midnight, and revealed a remarkable agreement among various sections of the Irish Liberal members in condemning the action of the Government, in refusing to give the cause which led to the arrest on reasonable suspicion. The moderate members predicted worse results would follow from an act which would be regarded as an insult to the religious sentiment of the Irish nation in classing the priest as a village ruffian.

DUBLIN, May 21. Great excitement prevails at New Pallas. A flying column, with two guns, led by Limbrick to assist the sheriff in making seizures for rent in the district. This is the first active service undertaken by one of the five flying columns at present organized in Ireland.
