

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

BETTER TIMES IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Special dispatches of the 16th inst. to the St. John Telegraph report:—

As a sign that trade is improving in a permanent manner in Glasgow, it is mentioned that men employed in one of the largest chemical works in this city have had their wages increased to what they were previous to the reduction made some time since. This has been done without any pressure.

In Manchester Friday's quotations were higher and more firmly adhered to than during the present excitement. Transactions quite limited, as prices are beyond the reach of buyers, except for small and urgent business.

Owing to the revival of the iron and coal trades and the advance in the prices of fuel, the Starbridge fire brick manufacturers have put up their prices for fire bricks by five shillings per 1,000, cement and clay one shilling per ton, gas retorts sixpence per foot, and all other goods are raised 10 per cent. Another advance is considered imminent.

STOCK EXCHANGES.

The war signs throughout Europe begin to effect the money market and stocks and securities on the European houses are already falling in consequence of the unfavorable news.

FREIGHTS.

There are a larger number of vessels at New York ready for cargoes for any part of the world than for a long time, and a despatch last night announced that freights for grain and produce are offered at exceedingly low prices.

A Shocking Occurrence.

A shocking occurrence is reported from Glen Cove, a short distance from St. John, N. B. A woman named Clark was found dead in her own house with her body badly burned about the neck and arms. The cause of her death is as yet a mystery. Coroner Rigby states that on Saturday at four o'clock he arrived with a jury at the scene. He says: As he entered the kitchen of the house where the accident occurred, there was before his eyes the remains of the unfortunate woman in the fireplace. She was sitting on the ashes, her back against the wall, her head erect, eyes staring wildly, knees pointed towards her chin, with the elbows resting on her knees, and the charred arms from her elbows to the finger ends pointing upwards. The body was almost nude, save some tattered and burned portions of a chemise which partly covered the remains. The hair was dishevelled and somewhat singed, and her face bore the expression of having suffered intense agony. Beside the corpse stood the little grand daughter patting deodant on the back, the mother of the child in her excitement at the sight revealed to her, having forgotten to take the little one away. Another look around the room displayed fragments of an oil lamp and shade scattered about the floor; also portions of clothing in which large holes were burned. There was oil on the floor, and what little covering was on the woman was saturated with it. It is rumored that the woman was murdered. Spots of what appeared to be blood were seen on the bed room door, and a hatchet with the appearance of blood upon it was found on the premises. The daughter of deceased gave it as her opinion that that there was foul play in the case. As the woman was burned about the head it is just possible that she may have been struck on the head with the hatchet and then her clothes set fire to, the perpetrator doing the latter deed with the hope of making it appear that death was accidental. While we are rather inclined to discredit the foul play theory, it cannot be denied that a murder might have taken place notwithstanding. The deceased was the wife of a well-known character, named Robert Clarke, who spent the greater part of his time in the Penitentiary.
