THE schooner Mikado, owned by Mr. Gavin, of Cassempere, when between West Cape and Egmont's Bay last evening, was caught in a fearful hail storm, accompanied by lightning and thunder. The hail stones were one inch long and the fishing fleet had to be put under bare poles.

IT is reported that the Government have employed the services of a detective to endeavor to get at the bottom of the Margate horror. We trust that his efforts in bringing the real culprit to punishment may be crowned with success.

THE schooner Mikado is at Summerside with 18 barrels of mackerel, caught in the last two days. She reports the fish very plentiful along the shore; but outside the limit the American vessels are unable to obtain any fish. Two of the Americans were fishing inside the limit.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) A Warship Ashore.

HALIFAX, July 28. The United States warship Ossipee, while entering the harbor at 9 o'clock this morning, attempted to run up on the inside instead of the outside of the Point Pleasant buoy. The result was that she struck on the shoals about 100 yards inside the buoy. The big bats forward, including heavy steam launch, were lowered into the water and forward deck guns were run to after part of ship in order to lighten her, and at half tide she backed off without assistance. It is thought the ship has not suffered any serious injury.

The Imperial Mail Route.

OTTAWA, July 28. It is understood that Sir J. Blackwood, Secretary of the Imperial post office department, sails for Canada August 6, for the purpose of studying the advantages offered by the Canadian Pacific as an Imperial mail route to the East. He will be accompanied over the line to the Pacific Coast by Hon. Mr. McLellan, Postmaster-General. The report of Sir J. Blackwood, it is understood, will decide the prospects of the route.

The Moulders' Demand.

TORONTO, July 28. The moulders' demand for an immediate advance of 10 per cent. on piece work was withdrawn to-day, and the masters' proposition to pay 5 per cent. more, and another 5 per cent. the first of next March was accepted.

LONDON, July 28. More than thirteen members of Parliament, including eight ex-ministers, have signed a memorial to President Cleveland and Congress in favor of the settlement of the international dispute by arbitration.
