Jottings from the Old Country.

EMIGRATION.—The emigration returns for the past month show an enormous increase from Palestine to England, and forwarded on to Canada by Messrs. Pitt and Scott, carriers, 44 St. Paul's churchyard, London. They were placed in a number of small boxes, peculiarly constructed, so that they could obtain food, air and water, and were let out and re-packed in England previous to their reshipment by the Allan mail steamer "Moravian."

STRANGE FREIGHT.—A quantity of live bees have been successfully conveyed from Palestine to England, and forwarded on to Canada by Messrs. Pitt and Scott, carriers, 44 St. Paul's churchyard, London. They were placed in a number of small boxes, peculiarly constructed, so that they could obtain food, air and water, and were let out and re-packed in England previous to their reshipment by the Allan mail steamer "Moravian."

OATHS IN PARLIAMENT.—Mr. Tillet, M. P., for Norwich, will move on the 15th that it is not within the proper functions of the House of Commons to enquire into or trouble itself about the religious opinions of any person elected to serve in Parliament; that it is a reasonable presumption that any person elected to serve in Parliament is loyal to the Crown and Constitution; that any member speaking or acting disloyally outside of the House is obnoxious to the laws relating to treason and sedition; that any member speaking or acting disloyally within the House is amenable to the House, which has ample power to protect its own character and dignity; and that there is, therefore, in the opinion of the House, no necessity for any oath or affirmation on the occasion of, and as a preliminary to, a member taking his seat.

THE CAT.—A return has just been issued of the number of persons in the army and navy who have been punished by flogging for the ten years ending December 31st, 1878. In 1869 21 soldiers were flogged, and in each succeeding year the number increased until it reached 41 in 1879. In the navy the reverse has been the case, in 1869 there being 61 men flogged, which number diminished each year until 1878, when only 8 men received the punishment. The highest number of lashes awarded in any case was 48, and the lowest 8, which latter number was only inflicted once, while the former was adopted in the majority of cases.

OXFORD COMMEMORATION.—Oxford commemoration took place on Wednesday. The undergraduates indulged in their customary noisy demonstrations before the concert in the Sheldonian Theatre, which preceded the principal event of the day. The vice-chancellor, Dr. Evans, conferred the honorary degree upon several gentlemen, including Lord Aberdare, Mr. Fawcett, Sir R. Temple, Mr. Lister, the surgeon, Mr. Millais, and Mr. G. F. Watts. The Postmaster-General was the most popular with the gallery.

ROYAL FAVOR WANTED.—On the 29th of August, 1822, the Queen, then a child, and called Princess Alexandrina, was riding through Kensington-gardens in a pony carriage. As the vehicle was driven down the broad path by the water side, an immense retriever came bounding from the lake with a large stick held crosswise in its mouth, and running beneath the pony so frightened the animal that the carriage was overturned on to the footway, and the Princess thrown out. Before, however, the weight of the carriage could come upon the child, a soldier who had been watching the party sprang forward, and seizing the Princess by dress, at the risk of being himself dangerously injured by the falling chaise, swung her safely into his arms. Amongst the crowd which collected, a subscription, amounting to 18s., was made up and handed over to the brave fellow who had saved the future Queen of England from a terrible and agonizing death, and the pony being presently quieted and the carriage righted, the Princess and her attendants proceeded toward the palace, the man who had saved her life being told to follow them. This, with some difficulty, his thigh having been badly cut against the carriage step, he did, and arriving soon after in the ante-room, he was presented with the magnificent sum of one guinea and the thanks of the Duchess of Kent for saving her dear child's life, with a promise that something more should be done for him. That man was John Maloney, a linesman in the 73rd Foot, and for four years he waited patiently for the "something." An accident disabling his wife, he wrote to the Duchess reminding her of her promise, and asking assistance on behalf of his injured helpmate. Three weeks later an answer came, stating that General Lord Harris would shortly be the bearer of a gift from the Duchess, and ten days afterwards John Maloney was ordered into the presence of the General himself "John Maloney," said the General, "I feel great pleasure in presenting you with £5, the gift of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, for your gallant and manly conduct in saving her dear child's life on the 29th of August, 1822, in Kensington Gardens; but you are to understand that this is an acquittance, and you are not to make any further appeal to her Highness." And an acquittance it was, for although Maloney falling ill and having left the 73rd, more than one application was made, except a few shillings given him from the poor-box of the metropolitan police-courts, not another penny has he received, and to-day, eighty years of age, in feeble health, with failing sight, and a wife as aged and infirm as himself, the man who saved the Queen's life is dependent for his subsistence upon the charity of the streets, and an army pension of sixpence a day. It is sincerely to be hoped

that the committee at work will do something to relieve the distress of this poor old couple, for if help does not speedily arrive there will be no alternative for them but to end their days in the parish work-house.

The Power of Small Sums.

As illustrative of the proverb "many micksles make a muckle," the annual Saturday Hospital collection made in the manufacturing districts of Birmingham, England, a few weeks ago, realized the handsome amount of \$18,500. This collection was instituted about eight years ago by the working men, and has raised annually from \$15,000 to \$20,000, which is divided among the numerous Hospitals of the town. This is additional to the "Hospital Sunday" collection in all places of worship in that town and neighborhood, usually taken up during the month of November, and which realizes from \$20,000 to \$25,000. As the various hospitals are carried on a non-sectarian basis, all denominations unite in this annual collection. This "Hospital Sunday" has become an institution of the town, it being about twenty years since it was first inaugurated, and the principle has been adopted by a number of the larger towns of England, and even in far-off Australia some Birmingham men have succeeded in working up a sentiment in its favor.

The Pacific Railway.

SPECULATIONS CONCERNING THE CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY.—SIR CHARLES TUPPER GOING TO ENGLAND.—IS THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY GOING TO BE RELINQUISHED BY THE GOVERNMENT?

(Montreal Witness.)

It would appear from rumors which are in circulation that the Dominion Government is seriously considering the project whereby they will be relieved of the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway. The immediate cause of these rumors is the fact that Sir Charles Tupper has secured his passage for England. Of course the object of his sudden visit is a subject of speculation, and rumor connects it with the Pacific Railway, and it is even said that Sir Alexander Galt has for some time been in communication with a company of English capitalists who are willing to undertake the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway on terms very advantageous to the Government. The advertisement for English navvies for the road, which has attracted so much attention here, is said to have been really in the interests of this company. It is pointed out in support of this theory that Sir Charles is going home to arrange the matter, that the chief engineer, Mr. Charles Schreiber, who started out for the North West, was recalled, it is supposed, for the purpose of giving the necessary information to Sir Charles concerning the position of the road.

Latest News Notes.

The Austrian ministry has been reconstructed.

Shaefer challenges Slosson to play a thousand point billiard match for \$1,000.

Russia favors a naval demonstration of the Powers to enforce the decisions of the Conference.

It is announced that the Minister of War has decided to form a camp of 24,000 men at Adrianople.

Latest despatches from Buenos Ayres announce that the city was surrounded by national troops on the 26th inst., and summoned to capitulate within 24 hours.

An answer to the British ultimatum has been received from Abdul Rahman Khan. Its tenor is said to raise doubts in regard to Khan's sincerity. It is generally satisfactory.

Mr. Forster, chief secretary for Ireland, informed Mr. Parnell that he must oppose his bill granting £200,000 for the relief of the distress in Ireland—that it would do more harm than good.

The Standard says: "We understand that after a somewhat excited meeting of the Cabinet a resolution was adopted to support Mr. Labouchere's motion to rescind the vote of the House regarding Bradlaugh.

Mr. Bradlaugh addressed 10,000 persons at Northampton on Saturday, and spoke in London on Sunday. Various other meetings have been held in London and elsewhere in his favor.
