Canadian Teachers Fed. Will Meet In Vancouver

The week-long annual meeting of the Canadian Teachers Federation will open Monday in Vancouver with teachers from all provinces in attendance when the theme will be "Promoting Quality Teaching."

The Island representatives at the conference will be Mrs. Anne Riley, general secretary, Frank Costello, president, and Tom Hall, first vice-president of the P. E. I. Teachers Federation.

Speakers at the meeting will include professor George Tompkins, College of Education, University of B. C., who will discuss "Social Revolution in Quebec," and Octavio Brito Filho, Brazilian consul, who will talk on "Brazil."

The general sessions will wind up with a scenic drive and dinner.

Charge Finally Withdrawn After Several Adjudgments

After several weeks before the court during which he was remanded again and again, Ernest Cecil Rogerson, 19, of Victoria had a charge against him withdrawn in Queens County magistrate's court. Rogerson had been charged with attempt to commit an indictable offence.

(Continued from page 1) prisoners, carrying gardening tools to work, attacked their fellow inmates under the administration of the "selfish" prison to rehabilitate the second degree manslaughter. Pulau Senang - pleasure island - a pretty, 2,000-acre island in the blue waters of the South China Sea 12 miles south of Singapore and near the famous Raffles Lighthouse, was an experiment in "treating" secret society gangsters by modern penal methods.

Singapore Deputy Premier Lim Chin Chai said "this tragedy is a setback to the principle of prisons without walls and is a warning to the world."

Before the convicts reached Dutton he managed to trigger the island's alarm system linked to police headquarters in Singapore.

About 500 police raced to the Singapore waterfront and boarded fast launches.

In Penang, about 30 Malay fishermen armed with long spears headed for the island and were the first reinforcements to arrive.

Once the uprising was crushed a large group of prisoners were shifted to prisons on Singapore Island.

AWARDED O.B.E. Dutton, in his 40s, was awarded the Order of the British Empire this year for his work on the island.

Dutton is the Pulau Senang's first superintendent at the start of the rehabilitation experiment there in 1966. He was convinced the customary punishments were not breaking the secret societies control over their members.

The first detainees sent to the island built their own living quarters and other buildings. Later the prisoners constructed roads, produced most of their own vegetables and set up drama groups and study courses.

An official inquiry into the rioting was ordered.

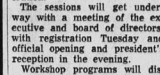

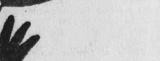

Alumni Scholarships Are Awarded By

Lynn Marie Murphy, 16, of Clermont, and Edward Francis O'Brien, 18, of Sherwood, have been awarded St. Dunstan's University Alumni scholarships. It was announced last night by Rev. Owen Sharkey, dean of studies at SDU. The amount of each scholarship is \$500.

The two winners led a group of 15 students representing high schools from across the Island in a set of competitive examinations held at St. Dunstan's last Friday.

Miss Murphy, who topped the competition, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Joseph Murphy of Clermont. A leading student each year during her four-year period at Kensington High School, and in all but two of her elementary school years.

During that time she has won three scholarships, a Canadian Legion essay award, a public speaking award, and prizes for his history theory and French. She also won the Governor-General's medal in grade 12.

She led Prince County in the provincial entrance examinations in 1961, and stood second on a province-wide basis.

In grade 11, Lynn was one of the three Island students picked by the department of education to attend the Drama Festival at Stratford, Ont. Sponsored by the Canada Council, the winners were chosen for their interest in drama, music, and reading, and for their academic ability.

Lynn has also worked as a librarian at Kensington High School, served on the yearbook staff, and taken an active part in the school's dramatic club. At SDU she plans to follow a general arts course.

Second place winner, Edward O'Brien, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerome O'Brien, Sherwood. Consistently near the top of his class through elementary and high school, Edward led in grades 11 and 12 at St. Dunstan's High School with average scores of 90 per cent.

1964 MEETING HERE

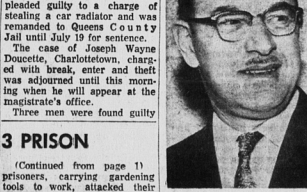
