Major Changes Called For By Winter Fair President

A revolutionary change in livestock shows would limit the number of animals shown by one exhibitor to not more than six, but would offer a minimum of \$150 for the first prize mature cow, to a maximum of \$225, was enthusiastically received here last night by a group of exhibitors who heard Don Oland, Atlantic Winter Fair president, outline the changes and improvements planned for Halifax in a speech showing beginning October 30.

This suggested change is in the future, as Mr. Oland reported on the suggestion from Canada's agriculture minister, Harry Hays, who proposed that the federal government would contribute \$20 to the total prize of \$150 if the fair would put up the \$100. The federal prize would pay \$75, it was suggested, if the fair would put up \$25.

Livestock showsmen present told The Guardian after the meeting they thought the suggestion excellent, as they draw coffee and munch on the steaks supplied by the department of agriculture through the minister, Hon. Andrew MacFay, in addition to Mr. Oland and his vice-president, Alex Lamond, who is chairman of the livestock show, and Watson Maxner, AWF manager, spoke to the group.

SOME CHANGES NOW

The reference to the much smaller exhibits by individual showmen, came following a discussion on an AWF change this year which calls for Angus, Galloway, Dual Purpose, Short-horn, Holsteins and Jersey cattle to be shown on Monday and Tuesday, November 2 and 3, and then leave the fair grounds Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning to make room for Hereford, Scotch Shorthorn, Ayrshire and Guernsey cattle to come in and be shown on Thursday and Friday.

Several Island breeders including Arthur MacRae of A. MacRae and Son, Sherwood

here when Mr. Oland discussed improvements and changes proposed for the Atlantic Winter Fair of which he is president. Mr. Lamond (right) is vice-president, and Mr. Parment is the fair director from this province.

Mr. Oland said the change would pose great difficulties of transportation — it might not be possible to get enough trucks to transport the cattle — and of getting the animals ready to show Thursday morning at 10 o'clock when the first call will be called.

The change is being made in this year because there is just not enough barn space at the fair grounds, Alex Lamond explained. But there are hopes of getting extra building accommodations in two or three years time, said Mr. Oland who added that additional cattle would not be necessary if the idea of fewer entries and bigger prizes becomes a reality.

Hon. Mr. MacRae intimated that he will meet shortly with representatives of the beef breeds in the province to discuss the possibility of a move toward that objective at the Provincial Exhibition here.

BIGGER PRIZES

Bigger prizes will be offered at the AWF in most regular classes it was revealed, with a \$100 offered for the champion steer this fall. Extra prize money is offered by breed associations — the Hereford, for example, if the champion steer is offered \$150 additional, not to exceed \$1,000. Mr. Oland suggested that objective at the Provincial Exhibition here.

Improvements were promised in many phases next autumn. They include parking accommodations, sleeping quarters, restaurant facilities, washing facilities for cattle and arrangements for admission tickets and passes.

Ladies present were told there are many special prizes added this year in baking, for example, and Fair Manager Maxner hoped there will be a number of Island bread entries this year. Mr. Oland suggested the bread could be flown in by Eastern Provincial IFA during the day of the judging, and "we'll arrange to meet the
