However, you are a bit of a problem to yourself too, in relation to the problem they present. Your theory is correct, that children should be drilled in honest consideration of behavior at play—and that this is a parent or guardian's duty. But where you go wrong is in your attempts to sell your ideas to Mrs. X. My advice is, act upon your principles; don't be either evangelical or apologetic.

DO RIGHT THING
In going after your child's toys, taken by Rex, and in addressing your appeal, indirectly, to Mrs. X., your manner is a blend of self-righteousness and coaxing conciliation. This is a mistake. It "personalizes" the matter, making it a "rub," so to speak, between two households. And Mrs. X. reacts involuntarily with hostile defensiveness, feeling guilty without recognizing it.

You should supervise your children's play with other children, and act immediately to support fair rules, without appealing to the neighborhood elders, if misbehavior comes to your attention. If certain children are troublemakers, cope quietly to safeguard your rights—and don't talk about it. Remember the proverb: "He who tries to please everybody doesn't please anybody." M. H.

Let's Talk It Over

It seems pretty well established, we think, that the direct expansion method of refrigeration, using liquid ammonia as the freezing agent, is safe as far as rink crowds are concerned. The councillors who questioned the safety of this method of refrigeration performed a useful service to the community, perhaps, in that they forced the issue so that the matter was discussed openly before Summerside citizens, who received much interesting information regarding methods of refrigeration.

The dissenting councillors, feeling as they did, had a right, perhaps even a duty, to bring the matter before the public as they have done. According to a refrigeration expert present at the meeting, the very worst that could happen to the direct expansion system would be a split pipe leak, a remote possibility at best, and this emergency could be looked after by spraying the ice with water, ammonia gas being very readily soluble in H₂O.

The suggestion offered that a faint whiff of ammonia might cause a panic in a crowded rink is no doubt true. Real danger is not necessary to cause a panic. All you need is supposed danger. You can cause a panic in a crowded theatre by shouting "fire!" when there is no fire. Panic is sometimes caused by filling the minds of people with imaginary fears. But we feel sure that if customers of "Civic Stadium" are informed of precautions for safety in the refrigeration system, and of the remoteness of any danger, there will be no panic. All interested parties should do what they can to keep patrons informed.

As to a refrigeration company giving a written guarantee that its system presents no hazards, that would be a difficult thing to do much more specific phraseology. In life, especially in modern life, we are surrounded constantly by hazards. Children, on the way to "Civic Stadium" would be facing certain traffic hazards. Could the town of Summerside, for example, give householders a written guarantee that there are no hazards connected with the supply of electrical power to their homes? A frayed wire might cause a house to burn down. As long as human frailty is connected with the manipulation of machines, inevitably there will be hazards. All we can hope for is that those hazards are remote possibilities, which, we think, is the case with regard to direct expansion refrigeration.

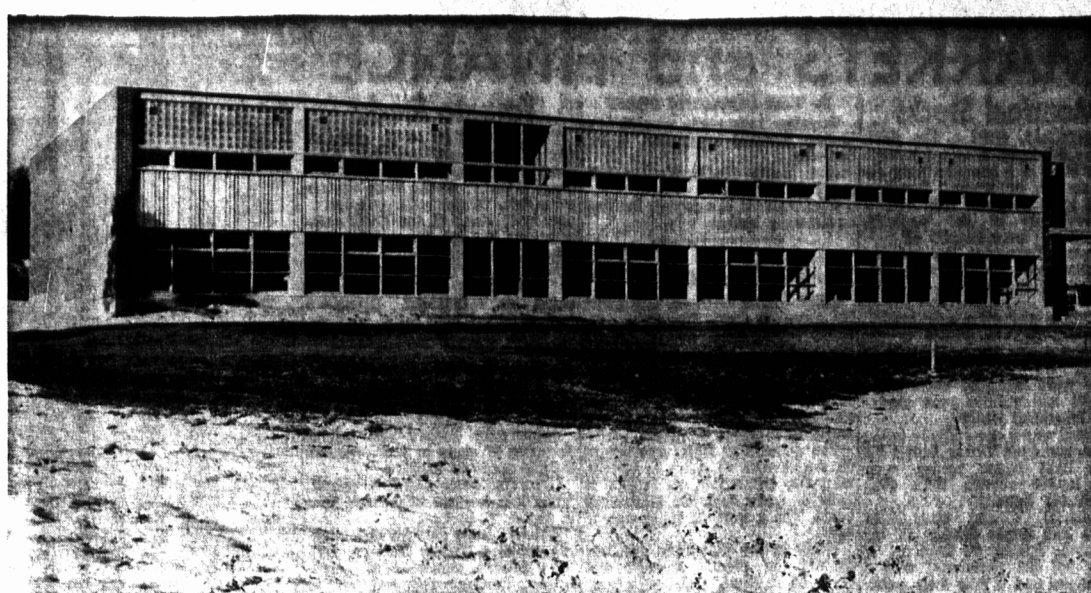

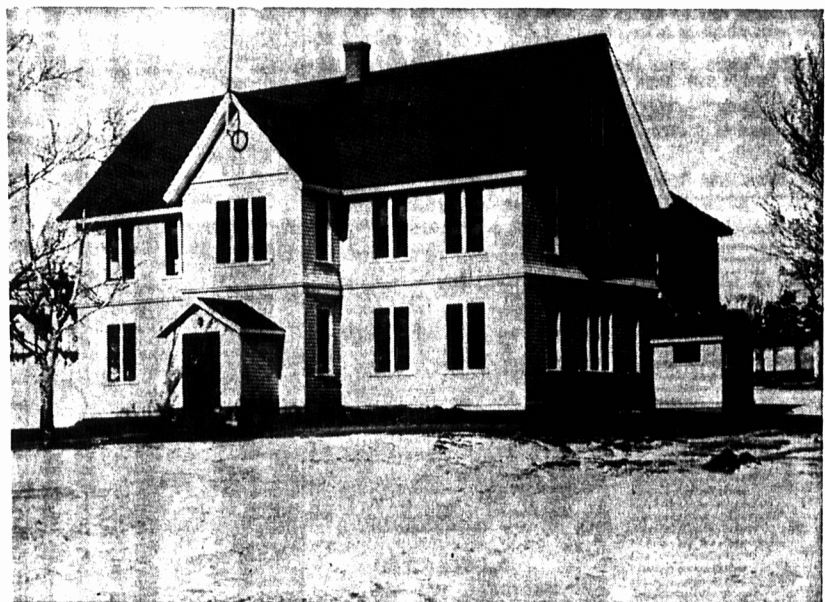

WHILE KENSINGTON citizens will officially open their new high school at 2:30 this afternoon, the important task of teaching the younger students continues in the Kensington elementary school.

Miss Olive Thompson, a teacher at Kensington for the past 30 years, was the general contractor. It contains 6 classrooms, laboratory, auditorium, offices and wash rooms. Mr. Thomas Hall is supervisor, and other teachers are

Opening This Afternoon Of New School At Kensington

At 2:30 this afternoon Miss Olive Thompson, who has been teaching school at Kensington for 30 consecutive years, will, in the presence of governmental, educational, and civic leaders, perform the honor of officially opening the beautiful new High School at Kensington.

Present for the ceremony will be Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P.; Hon. Keir Clark, Minister of Education; Mr. L.W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education; Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Director of Education; Hon. J. George MacKay, Minister of Highways; Mr. C.C. Baker; Rev. E.H. Bean, and Rev. L.P. Callaghan, and a large number of citizens.

Tea will be served by the ladies of the Community Club. The school, which has been occupied for several weeks, houses grades 9 to 12 inclusive, and is located on the northwest edge of town on land purchased from Mr. Patterson Walker. It is of brick and steel construction and is fire-proof throughout.

Mr. Thomas Hall is the supervisor and the other teachers are Elmer Power, Lorne Moase, John Murphy and Loretta MacDonald.

Members of the School Board are Ron Kennedy, chairman, Roy MacArthur, and Austin Pendergast. The building faces north and the front is trimmed with corrugated transite. The south side of the building is almost all glass blocks. There are two floors with the main floor consisting of six classrooms, a teachers' office and teachers' wash room. The classrooms are modern in every way and are well lighted. There are chalk boards at the front and on one side of the rooms, and at the rear of each room is a pin board for posting notices, etc.

On the ground floor are the laboratory, boiler room, janitor's store room, boys' and girls' wash rooms, kitchen and an auditorium with a seating capacity of 350 persons. In the laboratory are three lab tables capable of handling 30 pupils. These tables are equipped with hot and cold water and propane gas burners. The tables are made of fir plywood with acid resistant tops and were built by Mr. Gerald MacLean of Kensington.

The heating system is a hot water oil burning unit. The floors on the main floor are finished with asphalt tile and the walls have a fir plywood dado. The wash rooms have asphalt tile as well, but all other rooms on the ground floor have painted cement floors.

Approximately 100 students from grades 9 to 12 inclusive are presently enrolled in this school which cost \$83,900.

It was built by the firm of M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. and Mr. Keith Pickard was the architect. The Kensington Community Club made a donation of \$4,000, and a room was furnished by Canada Packers, Ltd. while another was furnished by W.J. Semple, Roy
