

Soviet Gov't Tells Russians Promised Better Life Here

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government has told its 232,000,000 people they are getting some of the long-promised better life.

Production of consumer goods has accelerated rapidly in recent years and average incomes have risen, according to a report on 1965 by the central statistical board.

It said the Soviet Union's 77,000,000 non-agricultural workers earned an average of 95 rubles (\$195.55) a month, up five rubles (\$5.55) from 1964 and was double the 1946 figure.

Counting bonuses and such social services as free medical care, the real average income of factory, office and commercial workers was 128 rubles (\$142.22) a month last year, the report said.

and in 1964 the increase over 1963 was 5.1 per cent.

The increasing rate of consumer goods production meant that promises made by former premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and renewed with greater emphasis by his successor, Alexei N. Kosygin, were being kept at least partially.

Two of the most closely watched items of consumer production are refrigerators and washing machines.

Refrigerator production rose from 309,000 units in 1962 to 1,675,000 last year, including a 48 per cent jump from 1964 to 1965. Washing machines were up from 463,700 in 1962 to 3,400,000 last year, up 20 per cent since 1964.

DIFFICULT TO COMPARE

Earnings in Canada and the United States are almost as much a week as the Soviet monthly figures. But differing conditions make direct comparisons difficult and for the Soviet people the important thing has been their progress upward.

Production of consumer goods in 1965 was listed as 8.5 per cent above 1964. In 1963, the gain had been three per cent over 1962.

South could not open the bidding with one club, an artificial bid designed for a stronger hand, so he opened with two clubs. The bidding by the Italians was thereafter natural, and the unbeatible slam (as the cards happened to lie) was reached.

West led the three of spades and Sinscalco (armed with a chart of West's hand drawn by his bidding) proceeded to make the contract.

He won the spade in dummy drew five rounds of trumps, and then cashed the K-A of spades to produce this position:

Sinscalco now played his last trump, forcing West to discard a heart, and then led the ace and another heart. West had to return a diamond and Sinscalco made the slam as a result of the endplay.

Ont. Medicare May Increase Doctor Income

TORONTO (CP)—The net income of Ontario doctors would increase overnight by \$12,000 a year if the provincial government's estimate of the per capita cost of state-sponsored medical care is correct, the legislature was told here.

Donald C. MacDonald, leader of the New Democratic Party, said that if the government's \$40 per capita estimated cost is correct then \$260,000,000 would be required to insure Ontario's 6,500,000 people in a year.

The NDP leader said that since there are 3,500 doctors in the province this would work out to a net income of \$31,500 province this would work out to a net income of \$31,500 for each doctor. Latest income tax statistics indicate that average net income for Ontario doctors is \$19,000.

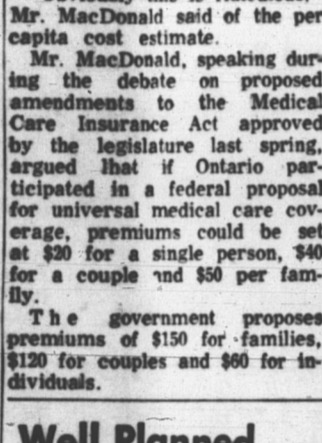
"Obviously this is ridiculous," Mr. MacDonald said of the per capita cost estimate.

Mr. MacDonald, speaking during the debate on proposed amendments to the Medical Care Insurance Act, approved by the legislature last spring, argued that if Ontario participated in a federal proposal for universal medical care coverage, premiums could be set at \$20 for a single person, \$40 for a couple and \$50 per family.

The government proposes premiums of \$150 for families, \$120 for couples and \$60 for individuals.

Well Planned On Grand Banks

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A deep-well drilling operation is to be conducted between May and September on the Grand Banks off the south coast of Newfoundland, where oil and gas tests have been carried out for the last two years.

Premier Smallwood told the legislature that Pan-American Oil Co., in conjunction with Imperial Oil Enterprises Ltd., is to drill two or three wells between 8,000 and 10,000 feet in the area 80-240 miles off the south coast.

Pan-American of Calgary, is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, Mr. Smallwood said.

Indian Woman Carver Dies

VANCOUVER (CP) — Mrs. Ellen Neel, described as one of the great Indian carvers and one of the few women to take up the craft, has died here.

Indian spokesmen said Mrs. Neel, 49, left behind a legacy of hundreds of totem poles of varying sizes, many of which are in museums and collections in all parts of the world.

She started carving commercially in 1937 after learning the art from her grandfather, Charlie James, whose work is also seen in many museums in Canada and the U.S.

Bonaventure Refit Contract Will Go To Lowest Bidder

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Production Minister Drury said in the Commons that in accordance with normal practice his department would expect to award a contract for refit of the aircraft carrier Bonaventure to the lowest bidder.

Davie Shipbuilding Ltd. of Lauzon, Que., Wednesday entered the low bid of \$5,768,682 for the job. Canadian Vickers Ltd. of Montreal bid \$5,863,341 and Saint John Shipbuilding and Drydock Co. Ltd. of Saint John, N.B., \$6,372,928.

T. C. Douglas, New Democratic Party leader, asked whether requests have been received from Saint John that the contract should be awarded to the Maritime firm on economic grounds.

Mr. Drury said representations have been received advocating award of the contract to Saint John on the grounds that the shipyard is competent and faces unemployment.

Tom Bell (PC—Saint John-Albert) asked whether, in view of the big spread in bids, the Saint John yard had taken into consideration factors other than price.

Mr. Drury said the Saint John firm itself was satisfied that it had entered a correct tender.

The minister also said in reply to further questions by Mr. Bell and Douglas Harkness, former Conservative defence minister, that the major portion of the contract will be on fixed price basis.

However, some required work on the carrier could not be accurately estimated until the ship was in drydock. All three yards had submitted tenders for this work as well as on the basis of the number of man-hours specified by the department.

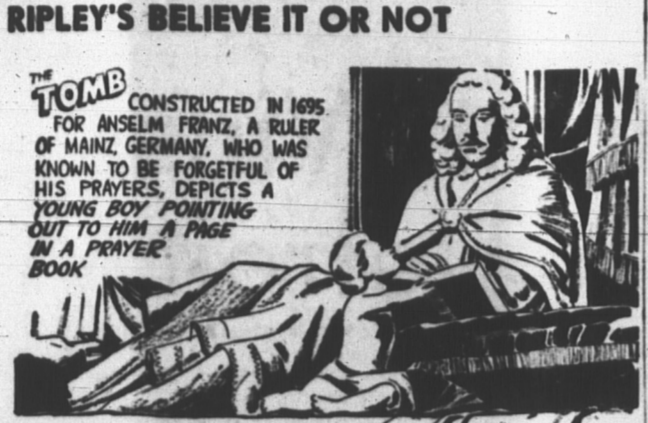

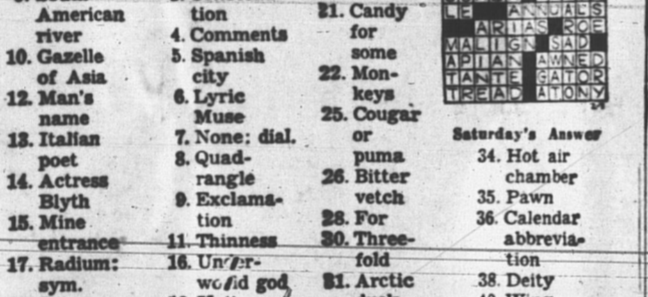
