

**Local and Other Items.**

TOTAL subscriptions to the *Herald* Irish Famine Fund amount to \$288,887.81 including \$1,779.20 received on the 14th. The latter amount includes \$1000 from the citizens of Chester, Pa., and vicinity.

The sale of John Seller's property took place yesterday. The farm at North River Bridge was bought by John McPhee, Esq., who owns the adjoining farm, for \$2,400, and the dwelling house and property on Euston Street, Charlottetown, formerly owned by Governor Laird, was purchased by William Boyle, Esq., for something over \$1900. Seller's paid \$750 for the farm about thirteen years ago, and over \$3000 for the Charlottetown property about five years ago. This shows how property has depreciated in value within the last few years.

YESTERDAY afternoon, an elderly woman—Mrs. Flynn, from Tracadie—suddenly fell amongst a lot of tubs before the Family Grocery on Queen Square. After being lifted and taken into Mr. Brace's store she, in a feeble tone, informed those present that her fall was owing to the fact that she was a sufferer from "heart disease." Sympathizing friends procured various restoratives, but it was soon discovered that the actual "disease" was of the Red heart character. In fact she was a humble worshipper at the shrine of Bacchus.

CAPT. JOHN McLEOD, of the P. E. Island schooner *Capella*, has been arrested in Halifax for abducting a young girl under 16 years of age, named Anderson, away from her home. The girl in company with three others of a similar age, spent several days with McLeod on the schooner, and were afterwards introduced to the Captain of a barque lying in the stream, where they were taken on board and stayed Friday night. On Saturday morning the police got on their track and brought them ashore.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning William Norton, arrested on complaint of his wife for habitual drunkenness and neglect, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. Hector McPhail, a half-witted individual, appeared upon complaint of Mr. Porter, charged with annoying Mr. P. continually. The Magistrate allowed the prisoner to be discharged upon the distinct understanding that he would be good in the future. Wm. Hennessy was yesterday further remanded, and will appear before the Stipendiary to-morrow morning.

METEORIC.—A brilliant meteoric display similar to the one seen here a short time ago, was witnessed at Amherst on Thursday evening. The sky, which was overcast, was suddenly so illuminated by the light of a meteor that a bright reflection was cast over objects as if a calcium light had shone upon them from a distance. It started from the east at a point a little more than midway from the horizon to the zenith, and took a westerly, zig-zag course; that it had the appearance of being 3 inches in diameter, with a long, luminous tail, graduating to a point, and after being visible about 15 seconds, disappeared some distance above the horizon.

THERE are about 5,000 Chinamen in New York and vicinity at present, and it is said to be likely that 5,000 more will be brought East to engage in various occupations. It appears that Mrs. Sargent and Mrs. Mathew Wilson, whose cousin is wife of Young Wing, Vice-Consul for China at Washington, are about to engage actively in the movement to bring Chinese East, particularly to New York and Philadelphia. Mrs. Sargent says when the present limited exodus of Chinese from San Francisco is accomplished by extra inducements to be offered the Mongolians will swarm to New York. She intends, with the assistance of her friends, to see what can be done with manufacturers for the extensive employment of Chinese workmen.

It is rumored, says the *Quotidian* of Levis, that the troubles which took place last year between the French-Canadian and Irish School-Boys' Societies will probably be repeated this summer. The same journal expresses the regret, in which we join, that satisfactory arrangements, which would prevent such quarrels and disturbances, have not been made. Notwithstanding these forebodings, it is to be hoped that it is not yet too late, by the exercise of prudence and forbearance, to arrive at such an understanding as will prevent the recurrence of the sad antagonism of which Quebec was the scene last year.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH ASSOCIATION.—A good audience gathered last evening in St. Paul's School-room to hear a paper read by the Rector on "The Bennett Judgment." The Rev. gentleman dealt with the subject under three heads—the teachings of the Reformers (Cramer and others) on the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; the teaching of the prayer-book as contained in the articles and communion service; and the terms of the judgment delivered by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. He was followed by Rev. Mr. Osborne, Messrs. Dixon, Palmer, Welsh, Maxwell and Williams. The latter being the only speaker differing from the Rector's views as to the results of the Bennett Judgment. Mr. Williams while agreeing with the Rector as to the injurious results of the Rev. Mr. Bennett's teaching differed from him as to the effect of the judgment delivered. He quoted the language on which Mr. Bennett was tried, and the terms of the verdict in the case—"that the appeal must be dismissed"—and claimed that though the Judicial Committee may have condemned the teaching of Mr. Bennett, they failed to convict him and have the decision while not compelling any Minister to adopt Mr. Bennett's views or sanctioning his doctrine, tolerates and allows any clergyman holding it. He cited the fact that a large and active party within the Church hold such views, and since the Bennett Case have not been prosecuted. The Rector briefly replied and the meeting closed.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

Special Dispatch to the *Examiner*.

GEORGETOWN, March 17, 4 p. m.  
The *Northern Light* landed her passengers at Guernsey Cove, about six miles west of Cape Bear, to-day. Some of the passengers just arrived at Georgetown.

OTTAWA, March 16.  
The House met at 3 25 this afternoon. After routine proceedings, which occupied some time, a petition was read from the Bishop of Nova Scotia and his clergy, against the deceased Wife's Sister's Bill; also, one on the same subject from the Metropolitan Bishop of Fredericton.

Sir John moved that when the House adjourned to-day, it stand adjourned till Thursday. This is to allow members and opportunity to attend the funeral of Mr. Holton to-morrow.

Sir John moved the Government business have precedence on Thursdays during the remainder of the Session. The House then passed to the order of the day and resumed the debate on the Budget.

McCallum believed the country had turned the corner. It was going to ruin under the late Government, but the measures of the present Government have guided the country out of the road to ruin, and now the people were rejoicing that they had changed their guides. He developed this idea referring to the manufacturers, the trader, the farmer, the laborer, the professional man, and showing in each case the difference between the position of affairs when the late Government went out and the present time. It being six o'clock the Speaker left the chair.

After recess, the debate on the Budget was continued during the evening, by Messrs. Oliver, Sproule, Gault and King. The burden of Oliver's story was that the N. P. was doing mischief generally, and benefiting nobody.

Sproule gave facts to show that the National Policy had done good already, and would do more good each year of its continuance.

King denied the statements of Sir Leonard, respecting New Brunswick, and endeavored to show that St. John city had lost nearly her whole trade, owing to the bad effects of the National Policy. He averred that gentlemen in the House from New Brunswick, supporting the Government, found themselves humiliated, because of pledges they had given in the strength of Sir Leonard's statements. He believed that if the census should be taken next year, the population of New Brunswick would be found to have decreased during the last ten years.

At the close of King's speech, Donville moved the adjournment of the debate.—The House adjourned immediately after.

LONDON, Feb. 16.  
The electoral campaign is very active. A number of Liberal and Conservative meetings were held in London and the provinces last night.

The *Daily Telegraph* says:—"Mr. Brand, Speaker of the Commons, after the announcement of the dissolution, placed his resignation in the hands of the Premier, on account of ill-health, but through the solicitation of the Government, consented to continue the performance of his duties, if elected, during the next Parliament."

The *Sportsman* says that, although Parole has arrived at Lincoln, and betting on him is 40 to 1, it means nothing. He will probably not start in the race.

A Berlin despatch says the Pope having made the concession that the names of the priests appointed to livings are henceforth to be officially communicated by the Bishops to the secular authorities. Peace between Berlin and the Vatican has become possible. About a thousand vacant livings will be refilled, and some vexatious clauses of the ecclesiastical laws repealed.

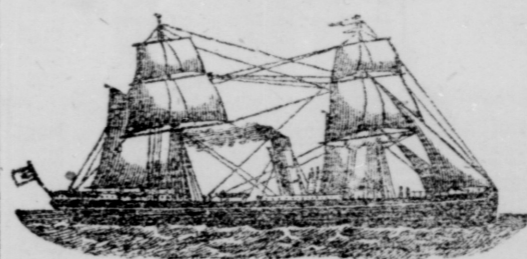
