British Parliament

LONDON, Feb. 22.

Mr. Childers stated that he had accepted the resignation of Col. Hende-son, Chief of the London Police.

The annexation of Burmah was confirmed by the Government in the House of Lords and House of Commons this evening.

Gladstone announced that the Government did not intend to suppress the Irish National Land League.

It was voted that the cost of the Burmah expedition be charged to Indian revenues.

Torpedoes Removed

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The torpedoes having been surreptitiously removed from the harbor of Salonica, the Turkish authorities boarded the Greek steamship Otonia, and arrested the captain on suspicion of having been concerned in the removal. They searched the vessel, but failing to find any torpedoes they released the captain.

Sir Charles Dilke's Case.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

It is understood the Queen's Proctor will intervene in the case of Sir Charles Dilke. The latter has intimated he desires to submit all information in his possession to disprove the allegation that the divorce of Crawford resulted from collusion.

Skating Match.

MONTREAL, Feb. 22.

The ten mile skating race for the R. K. Fox Championship Medal took place to-night. The ice was in magnificent condition. Five started. Brown won in 40 minutes, ten seconds, with Lee second.

Irish Evictions.

LONDON, Feb. 21.

It is stated that Mr. Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has so instructed the police and authorities as to render it virtually impossible to effect evictions.

Convicts Revolt.

PARIS, Feb. 22.

Nine hundred convicts in the Central Prison at Tours revolted, and mastered the guards. A force of troops was despatched and succeeded in suppressing the outbreak.

The International Fleet.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The international fleet will leave Suda Bay for Salinas upon the arrival of the Duke of Edinburgh, who is to command the fleet.

Inciting Insurrection.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

Two English cruisers will watch the coast of Crete in order to prevent the landing of Greek volunteers, bent on inciting an insurrection.

Loss by Fire.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Feb. 22.

The loss by yesterday's fire is much less than first reported. The total loss is now estimated at \$500,000; insurance \$400,000.

Threaten to Resign.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

The Greek Minister of War and Marine threaten to resign unless war against Turkey is at once declared.

Washington's Birthday.

LONDON, Feb. 22.

United States Minister Phelps gave a brilliant reception to-day in honor of Washington's birthday.
