Cavendish Team Wins Competition

The National Park Life Guard demonstrations were held yesterday evening at Stanhope Beach. There were several life saving demonstrations performed before an audience of some 3000 spectators along with demonstrators in general first aid which was supervised by Jim Benthan and Sinclair Cutcliffe.

In all there were three different rescues performed in the competition from between life

guards from Stanhope and the lifeguards from Cavendish. The first, the surf board demonstration was won by Scotty Linkletter who represented the Cavendish district. The rescue was comprised of a lifeguard paddling out to a victim who was 350 yards out from shore, placing him on the surfboard and to return to shore as quickly as possible. Linkletter's time was 96 seconds going out and 130 on the return trip for a total of 3:46.

The winner of the boat race which also has a course of 700 yards was Doug Moore of the Stanhope team. His time going out was 96 seconds and his return time was 5:37. The winner of the last and deciding event, the torpedo buoy race, was Dave Walters of the Cavendish team. His time swimming out was 4:08 and his return trip with the victim was 6:15. This last and deciding event made Cavendish the winners of the demonstrations which is their fourth victory in six years.

Along with these demonstrations the guards also put on a demonstration on five different methods of resuscitation which may be used in case of a drowning accident.

The demonstration was considered to be a success and a lot of the credit goes to the Life Guard Supervisor, George MacGuigan who supervised the meet.

Art Exhibition Opening Tonight

A witty lady from the world of art tonight opens an exhibition of splendid photographs by Roloff Beny in a supper-time ceremony at Confederation Art-Gallery.

Dorothy Cameron, who is currently engaged as consultant to the National Gallery of Canada, co-ordinating "Sculpture '67," a Centennial project, will speak briefly as she opens the exhibition at a reception arranged by the Gallery Women's Committee.

Gallery director Monerleff Williams commented enthusiastically that the exhibition, "Pleasure of Photography," is "a lovely show," after he and his staff had hung the photographs.

The patience of a bird-watcher for the dramatic moment when the sun will give him the greatest contrast between highlight and shadow.

He has a perceptive eye for architectural detail, rendering with exquisite clarity marble screens or inlaid floors. He has inspired Seekers of England to use these photographs as the basis for sumptuous upholstery material in black and white.

The Beny exhibition consists of nearly sixty photographs, ranging in size up to six feet in height.

It will be open at 5:30 today and will hang in the gallery, along with The Royal Canadian Academy "In Retrospect," until the end of the Summer Festival.

Reports Wilson Received Order

LONDON (AP) — British newspaper reports said Sunday President Johnson gave Prime Minister Wilson an aircraft order worth £370,000,000 (\$111,000,000) during the British leader's visit to Washington last week.

The order was for British Rolls Royce Spey aircraft engines and parts to be used in U.S. Air Force A-7 Corsair planes. A spokesman for Rolls Royce said: "Although this has been forecast and is expected, there is no confirmation of the order yet."

The United States has promised to help Britain offset her military orders from the United States by buying from Britain where possible.

The reported Rolls Royce order would represent nearly a third of £116,000,000 (\$348,000,000) worth of U.S. defence orders placed here to offset Britain's purchase from the United States of 50 swing-wing F-111 aircraft, along with earlier orders for Phantom and Hercules aircraft.

CRITIC'S COMMENTS

Detonator Blast Kills Two Boys

BLAIRMORE, Alta. (CP) — Two boys were killed and three others injured Saturday when a box of detonators exploded near an abandoned mine shaft a half-mile south of this Crownst Pass community.

Miles Knight, 12, was killed almost instantly. Warren Rinke, 11, died in hospital.

The injured boys are Louis Knight, 6; Peter Knight, 10 and Larry Rinke, 8.

Police said they had not determined where the boys obtained the detonators or what caused them to explode.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says clear skies and light winds were reported in nearly all sections of the Maritimes late Sunday. Along the south shore of Nova Scotia, fog associated with a distant storm over the Atlantic were visible.

This developing storm is moving along a track from the Virginia Capes toward the Grand Banks. The outer fringes of the cloud layers associated with it are expected to extend just to the ocean coast of Nova Scotia today.

All three Maritime Provinces should have a generally sunny day, with only a few cloudy periods.

LONDON (AP) — David Lafferty, a 27-year-old former RAF intelligence officer, has a record for staying underground in a cave — but he doesn't know it.

The Englishman by mid-day Sunday had beaten by hours the record of 126 days set by a Frenchman, Antoine Senni, in Nice last year.

Lafferty's home since March 27 has been a 40-by-15-foot chamber 350 feet down in Cheddar Caves. His only link with the world has been a telephone line with Gerald Robertson, manager of the caves.

Lafferty has lost all track of time.

The experiment is twofold — to advertise the Cheddar Caves and test man's endurance underground.

Robertson said: "Sometimes he talks for 10 minutes, sometimes for two. He varies between moods of depression and moods of great elation."

"He's grown very lethargic lately. He can't be bothered to wash out his frying pan. He just throws everything in for a meal. I tell him he must do exercises or play a game of darts."

"We have to be extremely careful what we say at this stage so that he cannot guess what the date is. He was an intelligence officer and has been trained to pick up information from casual conversation."

TO BE TOLD TODAY
Lafferty, who thinks he's been down only about 100 days, will be told the truth today after he has beaten the record by a full day.

And then he will speak by telephone to his German-born

wife and two-year-old daughter, Jackie.

Doctors will keep a close, almost hourly check on him until he comes up Thursday.

Lafferty volunteered for the experiment for money and qualified for a £500 (\$1,500) prize put up by Viscount Weymouth, owner of the caves, when he reached 100 days underground. He gets £5 for each day he remains in the cave after the hundred.

A physiologist and a psychologist will go down to see Lafferty today and conduct tests until he emerges Thursday.

Drugged Youth Leaps To Death

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — A 20-year-old Berkeley youth, reported by friends to be under the influence of the hallucinatory drug LSD for the first time, jumped from a third-story window to his death Sunday.

Vernon L. Cox took an oral dose of the drug at about 9 p.m. Saturday and jumped from an apartment window across the street from his home shortly after 1 a.m. Sunday, companions told police.

A witness to Cox's behavior under the influence of the drug, Ronald E. Ryer, 23, who lived in the building from which Cox jumped, said the dead youth and his roommate, Kenneth D. Tavalin, 19, were both having their first experience with LSD at the time.

Ryer said Cox became loud and violent after going under the influence of the drug, had hallucinations and had to be forcibly restrained several times from leaving the building. Ryer said he insisted he was taking a trip to Europe.

The last time he tried to leave and was stopped, he entered a room, slammed the door, ran to the window and jumped, witnesses told police.

Earthquakes Hit Tashkent

MOSCOW (AP) — The biggest central Asian city of Tashkent was hit Sunday by more earthquakes.

Tass, the Soviet news agency, reported five tremors shook the city, the strongest registering 5.5 on the international 10-point scale. Tass said no damage was done by the latest tremors, which brought the total registered in the city to 618 since April 26.
