Co-op Housing Planned

An early start on "pilot projects" in the eastern and western sections of the province to provide housing for senior citizens was planned last night at a meeting of the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation.

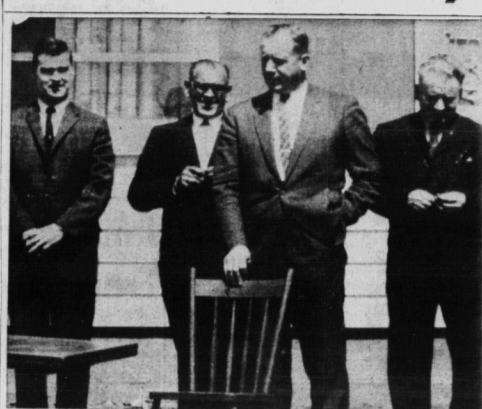
Directors of the corporation met with R.P. Gagne, manager of the Moncton office of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, and discussed various projects, plans, regulations, financing and general requirements for having applications approved.

G. Keith Pickard was appointed architect for the corporation and instructed to draw up sketches of designs of proposed homes along with plans and specifications.

Plans were made by the corporation to meet with municipal and village councils to discuss needs, locations and considerations. It was also decided to continue to study requirements. The projects immediately planned are one unit or two apartment units.

An immediate survey will follow in all municipalities in the province and it is anticipated 100 self-contained units will be constructed for the present. It is hoped that within two years there will be enough senior citizens to justify the minister said.

289 Quit Assembly in Midst of Debate

PARIS (Reuters)—A total of 289 deputies walked out of the French National Assembly Wednesday in protest against President de Gaulle's European policy.

The specific reason given for the walkout was the government's refusal to allow a vote at the end of the debate.

But a declaration read by one of the strength of the Republic did not join the walkout and some members of protesting parties were caught in the middle.

After the walkout the debate continued and a political spokesman protested against the "un-parliamentary methods" of the opposition.

Premier Pompidou told the remaining deputies it is not true that the assembly could have "useful, interesting" debates "only when a vote was involved."

He said he would have liked to hear the widest and most severe criticism of government policy, he said.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Prison officials declared Wednesday that erosion and the general age of Alcatraz federal prison made it easier for three bank robbers to escape Tuesday.

They also said there is a remote possibility the prisoners still are on the 12-acre island in San Francisco Bay.

Warden Allan Blackwell and Fred Wilkinson, assistant director of the bureau of prisons at Washington, D.C., held a press conference at the rock Wednesday.

"Alcatraz is old," Wilkinson said. "It is in a debilitated condition. It would take a lot of money—\$5,000,000—to bring it up to the standards we require for maximum security."

Both officers said the general erosion of pipes and concrete in the prison "unintentionally contributed to the escape of the bank robbers."
