NEW YORK (CP) — The Canadian labor movement believes it must retain its right to make decisions concerning its own national affairs, executive vice-president Joe Morris of the Canadian Labor Congress told the AFL-CIO convention here Friday.

Referring to differences which have brought attacks by certain segments of the AFL-CIO against the CLC and its officers for their position in the Great Lakes labor dispute and the Canadian government's maritime union trusteeship, Morris said:

"I am confident that I speak for the vast majority of trade unionists in our country and for the Canadian people generally, when I emphasize that the leadership of the Canadian labor movement has been moved to the AFL-CIO's Maritime Trades Department at which the CLC and its officers were condemned for their position in the trusteeship action and the department pledged to fight for removal of the trusteeship law."
