TALES OF MISSIONARIES.

CANADIANS HAVE HAD A VERY HARD TIME—STRIPPED AND BEATEN.

Robert E. Steer, one of the secretaries of the Presbyterian missions, received several letters from missionaries in China and Japan. The following is an extract from the communication written by Rev. J. A. Fish, dated Nagasaki, Japan, July 28:

"A number of the outstations of my field have been looted. A native pastor and a native doctor and a student have been almost beaten to death because they refused to recant. Word of our Canadian Presbyterian friends is to the effect that in escaping to Yant Tsi from Ha Nan they were stripped of everything by robbers. There must be many lives in danger in far western China, persons so distant that it would take one or two months for the news to come in.

Under date of Canton, July 18, Rev. Henry B. Noyes writes: "So long as the viceroys of 11 provinces stand by their present agreement to abide by the treatise, protect foreigners and refuse allegiance to Tuan, the rebel prince, it does not look to me probable that there will be war in South China. It seems to me that it will be to the interest of foreign nations as well as the viceroys to confine their military operations to North China. If this is done I would hope that our work in South China would not be seriously affected."

The Rev. D. N. Lyons writes from Soo Chow on June 20, saying that Dr. Park and he were the only male missionaries left there. The local officials wished them to remain. Mr. Lyons adds: "I was constrained to offer my services to our consul general to help in the campaign against the Empress Dowager, but whether I would be more of a hindrance than a help may be a question."

COST OF WAR.

The ten months of war in South Africa up to Saturday leave the score at present as follows:—

Of the Boers, nine thousand are prisoners, an even 2000 are estimated to have been killed in battle or died of wounds. Probably more than another thousand are dead of disease or hardships.

Of the British, two thousand are still prisoners or missing, and the latest War Office return shows deaths as follows:—

ided from wounds or diseases, no one seems to have figures for. Five or six thousand was the number guessed at a couple of months ago by a Boer official in Pretoria, according to a correspondent. Of the British, 23,647 have been invalided home, and several thousand are still sick or wounded in the hospitals in South Africa.

The great bulk of the British loss is from disease, as usual in war. As the above table shows, the death from sickness number nearly one-half more than the deaths in action. Among the troops invalided home, the proportion of sick was for greater, outnumbering the wounded nearly two to one.

Altogether the British have had nearly 12,000 killed or wounded, and nearly 20,000 knocked out by disease. The Boers have had apparently about half as many killed or wounded, but only a comparatively small number sick, as was to be expected from their being thoroughly acclimated, better clothed, accustomed to the fare, and having sufficient local knowledge to avoid bad water, moving about and camping in small bodies, and having probably, a higher average of rugged health to begin with.

THE DEMON OF EXTRAVAGANCE.

It is an evil day when the Demon of Extravagance takes possession of a man or of a nation—a day beginning with laughter and boasting, but ending in bitter sorrow and the blackness of night. Who ever heard of a recklessly extravagant man being permanently prosperous. Everyone has noted how the man who persistently wastes his income, whether it be small or great, comes to grief in the end.

Ecce homo is not parsimony, but extravagance is wastefulness. Everyone has noted how differently two men having the same income live, when one is economical and the other extravagant. One perhaps secures for himself a family a pretty home, enjoys the simple comforts of life, and has money in the bank for a rainy day. The other spends all he earns and yet never seems to have anything. He may not be bad or dissipated, but he gets rid of his money without getting any satisfactory return for it and is des-

tute in his old age. All his hard work goes for nothing because he is extravagant. He spends his money on useless, unnecessary things when he has plenty and afterwards has to go without necessities. Of course it sometimes happens that a man's wages are too small for him to save anything, no matter how economical he may be, and then the fault is not his, but every one of these who is thrifty, sensible, far seeing and fond of his family, avoids getting into debt if it is within the range of possibility. A working man with a debt has not his sorrows to seek.

An extravagant business man, wasting his money on high living and foolish investments, ends in bankruptcy, while his economical rival, saving money to extend his business, prosper and grows rich. The economical man sometimes spends large amounts to carry out big projects, but he would never be able to do so if he did not husband his means and carefully guard against unnecessary expenditures on small things.

The economical man bears in mind the fact that the world goes through alternating periods of prosperity and depression that good times are invariably followed by bad times, and he regulates his expenditures accordingly. If he has contracted a debt during a period of depression he reduces it during a period of prosperity. He does not greatly raise his scale of expenditure in the good times because he knows that having once adopted a certain style of living it is difficult to return to the lower scale of expenditure when bad times come.
