PARTICULARS OF FIGHT AT PEKIN

From a Telegram to the Japanese Legation

FIGHTING STILL GOING ON ON AUGUST 19TH.

Chinese Made an Obstinate Resistance to Japanese.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, August 21.—The Japanese legation has received several important despatches, giving the latest information in regard to events in Pekin. A telegram dated the 19th of August at Tokio says: "After the entry was effected into Pekin by the allied troops, the Chinese troops, on August 15th, betook themselves to and remained in the Imperial Palace. "A body of the Japanese troops was called off to guard the Palace, and there they met with an obstinate resistance by the Chinese troops. Fighting is still going on. The headquarters of the Japanese army is in the legation, and the division is mainly quartered in the villages outside of Antingme."

THE WAR DISEASE SPREADING

Bulgaria and Roumania Now Going to Fight.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Referring to the tension between Roumania and Bulgaria the Vienna correspondent of the Daily Express says Bulgarian troops are being continually moved to the frontier. The Macedonian Revolutionary Committee has called 1,000 volunteers under the command of Bulgarian regular officers and will raid Roumanian territory. Three Roumanian army corps are mobilizing. King Charles, speaking to his officers on Sunday said: "Gentlemen, be ready for war. It can happen at any moment. You will prove yourselves worthy successors of the heroes of 1877."

CHICAGO MAN'S SACRIFICE.

Kills Himself So His Wife Might Get Insurance.

CHICAGO, August 18.—Charles Mielenz died of his own hands some time on Wednesday, near Southport Avenue, in order that his family might receive the benefit of \$2,000 insurance, which he carried in two German lodges. Mrs. Mielenz learned from the police last evening that her husband's body had been found. Mr. Mielenz conducted a wall paper and painting business, and it was not prosperous. On Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Mielenz received a letter from her husband in which he said: "It is the best you can do to let me go, so everybody can get what they have coming. I feel sorry for the children. You can get enough of money from my lodges to put \$1,000 in the business, and hold the balance for yourself and my dear children. It's hard to part, but I don't see any other way."

A STARTLING PIECE OF NEWS

Made Public by Mr. Julian Ralph.

RUSSIA ACTIVELY PLOTTING AGAINST BRITAIN.

Endeavoring to Break the Harmony With the United States.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Julian Ralph, in The Daily Mail, quotes from a "Diplomat of some standing," whose name is not given, who declares that Russia is vigorously endeavoring to secure American support and to break the harmony existing between the United States and Great Britain. "England," says the diplomat in question, "has no first class power except America, which offers her the slightest ground for hope of a friendly hearing of her case. The feeling of to-day will generate war against her tomorrow. Russia's plan, which is encouraged by Austria-Hungary, France and Germany is to strip Great Britain of all support,—to leave her naked before such a war begins."

AT SEA WITH A MADMAN.

Captain Wagner's Memorable Voyage in the Schooner Czar.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., August 18.—Forty-eight days at sea with a madman—days of anxiety and worry with a crew of foreigners who did not seem willing to watch over the prisoner under the hatch—days of gales and calms added to discomfort. These are features of the story of the latest voyage of the schooner Czar.

Captain Wagner is a changed man. When he left home he was the picture of health. Yesterday, as he stepped ashore from his schooner's boat, he looked twenty years older. First officer "Billy" Sorenson, who left here with the Czar on May 19 last, came home a raving maniac. He will be sent ashore soon, and to the Marine Hospital, after being under decks of the Czar in solitary confinement for more than a month and a half.

"It was an awful trip," said Captain Wagner. "I feel broken in health and I have lost fully twenty pounds since I left here in the spring. I feel sorry for my unfortunate officer, but really at times I thought that I would have to resort to very desperate measures to protect myself and men on the ship."

"It was not until we had made several hundred miles towards Alamo, Mex., our destination, that the mate began to act queer. To protect myself and the men from the maniac, I ordered him put under the hatches and guarded. I hated to do this, but it was absolutely necessary, as I did not like to iron him all the time during a long voyage."

"Wedges were made and these were driven into the hatches at the combings. He would play all manner of tricks to get out. He had to be watched all the time, and there was no telling what time he would elude his watchers, get on deck and secure a hatchet or some other instrument and brain us all."

"All of this time we were making an extremely slow trip. It seemed that we would never reach port. A month passed and we were still many hundred miles from San Francisco, and every minute of the weary days the maniac in the hold kept up his singing and howling. It was terrible."
