

Emerson Hopes For Grand Slam

MELBOURNE (AP) — Roy Emerson kept alive his hopes of a grand slam in world tennis this year by winning the Australian title for the second straight time Sunday but had to stage a great comeback to retain the championship.

Fred Stolle, also from Australia, had the Aussies' Davis Cup ace down 2-0 in sets and was leading 3-1 in the third when Emerson suddenly rose to his greatest heights and pulled out the match. The scores were 7-9, 2-6, 6-4, 7-5, 6-1.

For the first half of the match, Stolle could do no wrong. His big service was working perfectly and his ground strokes clipped the lines repeatedly. At 3-1 he looked like a sure winner but from that point on the match took an amazing change.

Emerson suddenly lifted his game broke back and within a matter of a few points was in complete command. The longer the match went the better he became as Stolle faltered under the pressure.

Australia's Margaret Smith again confirmed her edge over Billie Jean Moffit of Long Beach, Calif., advancing to the finals of the women's singles with a 6-1, 8-6 triumph. She was joined by Maria Bueno of Brazil, who downed South Africa's Annette Van Zyl, 6-2, 6-3.

Saints Defeat Dal 5-3; Play St. FX Tonight

St. Dunstan's University Saints, who departed from this city yesterday after receiving a royal sendoff from the student body, know full well that tonight's game with St. Francis Xavier University could give them a stranglehold on first place — if they win. As it is now, the Saints have won all five of their games, as has St. F.X. However, by the unique manipulation of the point system followed by the M.I.H.L., the Saints have 14 points, while St. F.X. has only 8. The game tonight is worth four points, so a victory would give them 18 points with only five games remaining in the schedule. With the exception of the two game series with St. Thomas, the Saints have beaten the other three teams with whom the games are scheduled. UNB, Mount "A", and Moncton University.

Although the Saints have their sights focused on a win tonight, they are fully aware that they must play much better than they did Saturday afternoon if they hope to topple the classy Xavier crew, who beat the Toronto Marlboros last Tuesday. The Saints had difficulty in finishing off their plays against Dal Saturday, and consequently came through with a performance 5-3 score somewhat less than usual. The game lacked the drive and excitement featured in the UNB game of a week ago, and even the fans had a trouble getting enthused.

Dalhousie opened the scoring at 2:11 of the first period on a goal by Dick Drmaj from close in. It wasn't until 10:39 that the Saints tied the count, Billy MacMillan making good on a screen shot from ten feet out. Macmillan picked up his second of the game at 15:29 on a goal mouth shot which made it 3-1. The ineffectiveness of the Saints' powerplay was evident in this first period when they held a two-man advantage for 37 seconds, yet they failed to get a good shot on goal.

THREE IN SECOND
Play evened up in the second period, at least territorially, but the Saints still fired home three unanswered goals. Vince Mulligan got the first at 4:10 on a screen shot from the point. Then Billy MacMillan collected his third of the game and twelfth of the season at 7:40. Denis DeCarufel, who assisted on four goals, carried the puck behind the Dal net and passed to MacMillan standing directly in front of the Tiger's cage. Two minutes later Andre Gelinias found a loose puck beside the Dal goaltender and promptly lifted it behind a surprised Ron

Seinewicz. At this point, it looked like the game would break wide open as the Saints poured on the pressure, but then they tapered off considerably.

In the third period, Dal came on strong and at 1:46 Ron Smyth beat George MacNeil on a screen shot from fifteen feet. Dal, Smyth scored again at 10:40 on a quick shot which eluded MacNeil.

St. Dunstan's outshot Dalhousie 46-18, with 21 of the Saints' shots coming in the first period.

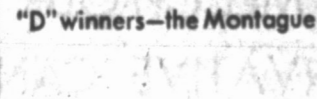
