THE TALBOT ARRIVES.

The British cruiser Talbot arrived at Charlottetown yesterday forenoon about ten o'clock, with the intention of spending eight days here. But in the afternoon a telegram was received ordering the ship to proceed to Halifax, which she did today leaving about twelve o'clock. The Talbot it may be pointed out, is a twin screw second-class cruiser of 5,600 tons, 360 feet long, and an indicated horsepower of 8,000. She has a speed of 20 knots. Plurals of Nouns Ending in "O."

In the formation of the plural of nouns with this ending the general rule is that es is added to the singular, as in potatoes, cargoes, buffaloes, yet the following words add only s: Grotto, grotto, canto, cento, quarto, portico, octavo, duodecimo, tyro, solo (all, by the bye, foreign words), and also all nouns ending in io, as folio, folios; or, in fact, whenever o is immediately preceded by a vowel, as cameo, embryo, etc. A notable peculiarity is to be observed with regard to nouns substantive ending with the sound of o. If they be words of more than one syllable, they form the most part end simply in o, but if only of one syllable, they take an e after the o, thus, canto, potato, quarto, hero, but doe, foe, roe, sloe, toe, woe, etc. Yet other monosyllables, not nouns substantive, have no final e, as so, lo, no.—Literature of Typography.

Crabs and Earthquakes.

"To the Lamp-post"

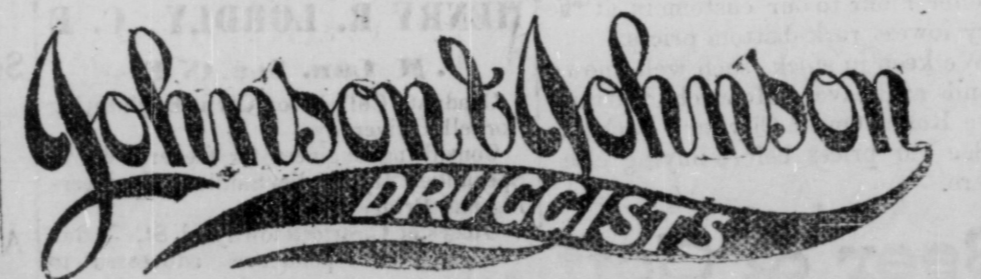

Local and Other Items.

CITY TAXES.—The defaulters list is ready for publication, and will be given to the newspapers in a few days. In the meantime those who have not yet paid up should do so.

DIED ABROAD.—Dr Edmund Walsh died in Cambridge, Mass, on Thursday last. The deceased was a brother-in-law of Mr P C Kelly, of Covehead, and was a native of this province. His body will be brought here for interment.

DROGGED HER ANCHOR.—During the blow yesterday the Italian bark Bertino, towed into port a week ago, dragged her anchor and drifted to a point off the ferry wharf. She is now lying between the ferry and Steam Navigation Company's wharves.

DREADFUL MURDER.—A dreadful tragedy was enacted in Toronto on Friday night, when Eliza Burrell, wife of a well to do mechanic, became demented and strangled her three children, Ethel, Stanley, and Harold, aged five, three and one and a half years respectively.

HOTEL AMALGAMATION.—Directors of four of the largest Toronto hotels, the Queen's, Rossin, Arlington and Walker House, have practically agreed upon a basis of amalgamation. The syndicate will be known as McGaw, Winnett & Co., and will be capitalized at \$900,000. It is proposed first of all to spend about \$150,000 upon the Rossin House.

PRESBYTERY.—The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island will meet on Tuesday, the first day of November, in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, at the hour of 11 a. m. Along with other business, the amount to be raised for augmentation will be allocated to the congregations; consequently a full attendance is imperative.—Thos F Fullerton, Clerk of Presbytery.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon William Trenholm was fined \$2 or 10 days for being drunk and incapable. Michael Evans, charged with being drunk and disorderly yesterday, was fined \$4 or 20 days while intoxicated, made himself obnoxious in and about a saloon on Water Street kept by a man named Howatt, and also acted in a disorderly manner on the ferry wharf.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Coban arrived from Montreal about half-past eight this morning, bringing a large general cargo and eight passengers. She will leave this evening for St. John's and Harbor Grace via Sydney. Her outward cargo will include 5000 bags oats, 200 brls vegetables and 71 brls apples between decks, and a deckload of horses, cattle and sheep.

LOBSTERS SEIZED.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian reports that the fishery cruiser Davies made a seizure of Egmont Bay, on Friday evening, consisting of a fishing boat containing a quantity of live lobsters. The lobsters were thrown overboard and the boat taken to Summerside together with a quantity of rope, etc. They also destroyed about 400 traps which they found set and baited.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The Grand Division meets at Fredericton this morning and after the evening session will adjourn to meet in Charlottetown, to-morrow, when the Grand Division will re-assemble in Victoria division room at 2.30 to complete its business. The public demonstration will be held at Grace church at 7.30, when the Rev Alfred Noon, Ph. D., P. M. W. Kirby, D. M. W. P., appointed to represent the National Division, and several members of the Grand Division will take part. The Royal Crusaders will be present and take some part with song. The ladies of the Victoria Division will banquet the Grand Divisions at the close of the demonstration. The full program will be arranged by the Grand Division at its session.

ANOTHER NEW LAMP.—A new lamp for use in districts where there is neither gas or electricity is now being largely used in Europe and will shortly be placed on the market here. In fact several have already been on exhibition in St. John. The new lamp consists of an adjustable Auer burner placed on an oil lamp the yellow flame of the oil being transformed into a blue one by atmospheric burners over which the mantle made of rare earths is placed. The lamp is not expensive at first, and is claimed to be much cheaper than any system of lighting at present known for isolated districts. There are no dangers of explosion; no generators to bother with; no removal of dirty by-products, no smoke, proven by holding a white substance over the light, and, above all, the white rays are steady and easy on the eyes. The lamp is portable. In this connection it corresponds to the Auer burner so largely used in cities and which is considered by the London Lancet, the great medical journal, to be the easiest light on the eyes for reading, etc.
